### Definitions of "Publish" as a verb

According to the Oxford Dictionary of English, "publish" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- Prepare and issue for public distribution or sale.
- Prepare and issue (a book, journal, piece of music, etc.) for public sale, distribution, or readership.
- Communicate (a libel) to a third party.
- Formally announce or read (an edict or marriage banns).
- Make (content) available online.
- Put into print.
- Prepare and issue the work of (a particular writer.
- Print (something) in a book or journal so as to make it generally known.
- Have (one's written work) issued for publication.
