## Puddle as a Noun

### Definitions of "Puddle" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “puddle” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A small body of standing water (rainwater) or other liquid.*
- *Something resembling a pool of liquid.*
- *Clay and sand mixed with water and used as a watertight covering for embankments.*
- *A mixture of wet clay and sand that can be used to line a pond and that is impervious to water when dry.*
- *A circular patch of disturbed water made by the blade of an oar at each stroke.*
- *A small pool of liquid, especially of rainwater on the ground.*

## Puddle as a Verb

### Definitions of "Puddle" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "puddle" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Knead (clay and sand) into puddle.*
- *Work (mixed water and clay) to separate gold or opal.*
- *Work a wet mixture, such as concrete or mud.*
- *Dip into mud before planting.*
- *Eliminate urine.*
- *Make into a puddle.*
- *Line (a hole) with puddle.*
- *Subject to puddling or form by puddling.*
- *Make a puddle by splashing water.*



- *Stir (molten iron) with iron oxide in a furnace, to produce wrought iron by oxidizing carbon.*
- *Dabble or wallow in mud or shallow water.*
- *Mix up or confuse.*
- *Mess around, as in a liquid or paste.*
- *Wet or cover (a surface) with water, especially rainwater.*
- *Wade or dabble in a puddle.*
- *(of liquid) form a small pool.*

<b>micturate</b>	Eliminate urine. <i>She became unable to go out for more than about ten minutes without having to <b>micturate</b>.</i>

<b>pass water</b>	Eliminate from the body.
<b>pee-pee</b>	Eliminate urine.

<b>wee-wee</b>	Eliminate urine.





## Usage Examples of "Puddle" as a verb

- *Puddled mire.*
- *The cobbles under our feet were wet and puddled.*
- *Rivulets of water coursed down the panes, puddling on the sill.*
- *My father helped puddle the iron that has braced this city's rising towers.*
- *Puddle iron.*
- *He dug and puddled a large pond.*
- *Puddle young plants.*
- *Children are playing and puddling about in the dirt.*
- *The ducks and geese puddled in the backyard.*
- *Open-hearth steelmaking eventually eliminated puddling altogether.*



## Associations of "Puddle" (30 Words)

<b>backwater</b>	A place or situation in which no development or progress is taking place. <i>The country is an economic <b>backwater</b>.</i>
<b>bathing</b>	Immersing the body in water or sunshine.
<b>bog</b>	Cause to slow down or get stuck. <i>The island is a wilderness of <b>bog</b> and loch.</i>
<b>brook</b>	A natural stream of water smaller than a river (and often a tributary of a river). <i>The Lake District boasts lovely lakes and babbling <b>brooks</b>.</i>
<b>coastal</b>	Of or relating to a coast. <i>The Atlantic <b>coastal</b> plain.</i>
<b>creek</b>	A natural stream of water smaller than a river (and often a tributary of a river). <i>A sandy beach in a sheltered <b>creek</b>.</i>
<b>gully</b>	A fielder at gully. <i>He was caught in the <b>gully</b> by Jones.</i>
<b>lagoon</b>	A stretch of salt water separated from the sea by a low sandbank or coral reef.
<b>lake</b>	A body of (usually fresh) water surrounded by land. <i>The EU wine <b>lake</b>.</i>
<b>lamprey</b>	Primitive eellike freshwater or anadromous cyclostome having round sucking mouth with a rasping tongue.
<b>loch</b>	A lake. <i><b>Loch</b> Lomond.</i>
<b>marshy</b>	Soft and watery. <i>A <b>marshy</b> coastline.</i>
<b>muddy</b>	Cause to become muddy. <i>The original colours were blurred into <b>muddy</b> pink and yellow.</i>
<b>narrow</b>	A narrow channel connecting two larger areas of water. <i>A <b>narrow</b> scrutiny.</i>
<b>pond</b>	Hold back or dam up flowing water or another liquid to form a pond. <i>He s relatively unknown on this side of the <b>pond</b>.</i>
<b>pool</b>	Join or form a pool of people. <i>The body lay in a <b>pool</b> of blood.</i>
<b>riparian</b>	Relating to or situated on the banks of a river. <i>All the <b>riparian</b> states must sign an agreement.</i>
<b>river</b>	A large natural stream of water flowing in a channel to the sea a lake or another river. <i>The <b>river</b> was navigable for 50 miles.</i>
<b>sea</b>	Used to refer to waves as opposed to calm sea. <i>Heavy <b>seas</b>.</i>



<b>soggy</b>	Wet and soft. <i>We squelched through the <b>soggy</b> ground.</i>
<b><u>stagnant</u></b>	(of a body of water or the atmosphere of a confined space) having no current or flow and often having an unpleasant smell as a consequence. <i>A <b>stagnant</b> ditch.</i>
<b><u>stream</u></b>	The act of flowing or streaming continuous progression. <i>A perfect trout <b>stream</b>.</i>
<b>swampy</b>	Soft and watery. <i><b>Swampy</b> bayous.</i>
<b><u>swim</u></b>	An act or period of swimming. <i>My brain is <b>swimming</b> after the bottle of champagne.</i>
<b>swimmer</b>	A trained athlete who participates in swimming meets. <i>Caribou are good <b>swimmers</b>.</i>
<b><u>swimming</u></b>	The act of swimming. <i><b>Swimming</b> eyes.</i>
<b>tarn</b>	A small mountain lake. <i>Malham <b>Tarn</b>.</i>
<b><u>vale</u></b>	A valley (used in place names or as a poetic term). <i>The <b>Vale</b> of Glamorgan.</i>
<b><u>valley</u></b>	A long depression in the surface of the land that usually contains a river. <i>The <b>valley</b> floor.</i>
<b><u>wet</u></b>	Cause to become wet. <i>The baby was <b>wet</b> and needed changing.</i>
