<u>clarity</u>	The quality of being coherent and intelligible. <i>When she awoke the clarity was back in her eyes.</i>
cleanness	The state of being clean; without dirt or other impurities.
clearness	Free from obscurity and easy to understand; the comprehensibility of clear expression.
decency	The quality of being polite and respectable. <i>A loose dress rather too low cut for decency.</i>
freedom from adulteration	Immunity from an obligation or duty.
freedom from contamination	The condition of being free; the power to act or speak or think without externally imposed restraints.
freshness	An alert and refreshed state. <i>His freshness passion and focus got him cast in leading roles.</i>
goodness	Moral excellence or admirableness. <i>A belief in the basic goodness of mankind.</i>
<u>honesty</u>	A European plant with purple or white flowers and round, flat, translucent seed pods which are used for indoor flower arrangements. <i>It was not in all honesty an auspicious debut.</i>
honor	The state of being honored. <i>A man of honor.</i>
honour	A course of degree studies more specialized than for an ordinary pass. <i>Mrs Young had the honour of being received by the Queen.</i>
innocence	A state or condition of being innocent of a specific crime or offense. <i>The healthy bloom in her cheeks gave her an aura of innocence.</i>
integrity	Internal consistency or lack of corruption in electronic data. <i>He expects to find in us the common honesty and integrity of men of business.</i>
lack of corruption	The state of needing something that is absent or unavailable.
lack of pollution	The state of needing something that is absent or unavailable.
morality	Concern with the distinction between good and evil or right and wrong; right or good conduct. <i>A bourgeois morality.</i>

nobility of soul	The state of being of noble birth.
nobility of spirit	The state of being of noble birth.
piety	Righteousness by virtue of being pious. <i>Acts of piety and charity.</i>
pureness	A woman's virtue or chastity.
rectitude	Morally correct behaviour or thinking; righteousness. <i>Mattie is a model of rectitude.</i>
righteousness	Adhering to moral principles. <i>We had little doubt about the righteousness of our cause.</i>
saintliness	The quality of resembling a saint. <i>Her selfless behaviour borders on saintliness.</i>
sinlessness	The state of being unsullied by sin or moral wrong; lacking a knowledge of evil.
uprightness	The condition or quality of being honourable or honest; rectitude. <i>There is a general lack of uprightness in these postmodern times.</i>
virtue	Morality with respect to sexual relations. <i>Mike was extolling the virtues of the car.</i>
virtuousness	The quality of doing what is right and avoiding what is wrong.
whiteness	United States educator who in 1865 (with Ezra Cornell) founded Cornell University and served as its first president (1832-1918). <i>Only the whiteness of her cheeks gave any indication of the stress from which she was suffering.</i>
worthiness	The quality or state of having merit or value. <i>Doubts about the worthiness of writing novels.</i>

chastity

Morality with respect to sexual relations.
*Vows of **chastity**.*

Make clean remove dirt marks or stains from.
*We are not completely sure that the elections will be **clean** and fair.*

The state or quality of being clean or being kept clean.
*She had an obsession with personal **cleanliness** and spent much of her time in the bathroom.*

diaper	A fabric (usually cotton or linen) with a distinctive woven pattern of small repeated figures.
disinfect	Destroy microorganisms or pathogens by cleansing. <i>Chlorine has been used to disinfect water in pools for many years.</i>
disinfection	The process of cleaning something, especially with a chemical, in order to destroy bacteria. <i>Instruments must undergo high level disinfection before reuse.</i>
fumigate	Treat with fumes, expose to fumes, especially with the aim of disinfecting or eradicating pests. <i>We got sulphur candles to fumigate the house.</i>
guiltless	Having no guilt; innocent. <i>People are forever criticizing the service and I am not myself guiltless in this.</i>
honour	A title of respect or form of address given to a circuit judge, a US mayor, and (in Irish or rustic speech) any person of rank. <i>Mrs Young had the honour of being received by the Queen.</i>
hygiene	Conditions or practices conducive to maintaining health and preventing disease, especially through cleanliness. <i>Personal hygiene.</i>
hygienic	Tending to promote or preserve health. <i>Hygienic surroundings with plenty of fresh air.</i>
innocence	The quality of innocent naivete. <i>The trial established his innocence.</i>
innocent	The young children killed by Herod after the birth of Jesus (Matt. 2:16). <i>She is a poor innocent young creature.</i>
irreproachable	Beyond criticism; faultless. <i>Of irreproachable character.</i>
naivete	Lack of sophistication or worldliness. <i>His greatest fault was his political naïvet.</i>
pristine	Clean and fresh as if new; spotless. <i>Handed her his pristine white handkerchief.</i>
sanitary	Free from filth and pathogens. <i>A sanitary washroom.</i>
sanitation	Conditions relating to public health, especially the provision of clean drinking water and adequate sewage disposal. <i>They could afford to erect new dwellings with a reasonable standard of construction and sanitation.</i>

shy	Lacking self-confidence. <i>Don t shy away from saying what you think.</i>
sinless	Free from sin. <i>The sinless life of Christ.</i>
sterilize	Make infertile. <i>In some countries people with genetically transmissible disabilities are sterilized.</i>
toilet	A room building or cubicle containing a toilet or toilets. <i>A public toilet.</i>
unimpeachable	Free of guilt; not subject to blame. <i>An unimpeachable witness.</i>
unspotted	Without soil or spot or stain. <i>The network of avian enthusiasts ensures that no rarity goes unspotted.</i>
unstained	Not having a coating of stain or varnish. <i>An apron keeps his clothing unstained.</i>
<u>untainted</u>	(of reputation) free from blemishes. <i>The island remains virtually untainted by commercialism.</i>
washing	The action of washing oneself or laundering clothes bed linen etc. <i>Avoid over enthusiastic washing.</i>
