aim

The direction or path along which something moves or along which it lies.
*He took **aim** and fired.*

ambition	Desire and determination to achieve success. <i>Young men and women with ambition.</i>
design	A preliminary sketch indicating the plan for something. <i>Inside the design reverts to turn of the century luxe.</i>
desire	Something desired. <i>They were clinging together in fierce desire.</i>
<u>drift</u>	A continuous slow movement from one place to another. <i>After so much drift any expression of enthusiasm is welcome.</i>
end	Either of the halves of a sports field or court defended by one team or player. <i>Both ends wrote at the same time.</i>
essence	The choicest or most essential or most vital part of some idea or experience. <i>Locke s scepticism about our ability to penetrate to the real essences of things.</i>
<u>gist</u>	The choicest or most essential or most vital part of some idea or experience. <i>I decided to spend the night at his place catching up on all the gist from the wedding.</i>
goal	A cage or basket used as a goal in other sports. <i>The decisive opening goal.</i>
hope	A specific instance of feeling hopeful. <i>It revived their hope of winning the pennant.</i>
idea	A mental impression. <i>Nineteenth century ideas about drinking.</i>
implication	Something that is inferred (deduced or entailed or implied). <i>His resignation had political implications.</i>
<u>import</u>	Having important effects or influence. <i>The import of his announcement was ambiguous.</i>
intent	Intention or purpose. <i>With alarm she realized his intent.</i>
<u>intention</u>	A person's plans, especially a man's, in respect to marriage. <i>She was full of good intentions.</i>
meaning	Implied or explicit significance. <i>He gave me a look full of meaning.</i>
message	A significant political, social, or moral point that is being conveyed by a film, speech, etc. <i>A campaign to get the message about home security across.</i>

object	A person or thing to which a specified action or feeling is directed. <i>Small objects such as shells.</i>
objective	The objective case. <i>Examine with high power objective.</i>
plan	A drawing or diagram made by projection on a horizontal plane especially one showing the layout of a building or one floor of a building. <i>The UN peace plan.</i>
purpose	The quality of being determined to do or achieve something firmness of purpose. <i>State pensions are considered as earned income for tax purposes.</i>
scheme	A schematic or preliminary plan. <i>The occupational sick pay scheme.</i>
sense	Relating to or denoting a coding sequence of nucleotides complementary to an antisense sequence. <i>I can't see the sense in leaving all the work to you.</i>
significance	The message that is intended or expressed or signified. <i>Adolescent education was felt to be a social issue of some significance.</i>
signification	The message that is intended or expressed or signified. <i>Film comes closer than other forms of signification to resemblance of reality.</i>
spirit	The prevailing or typical quality, mood, or attitude of a person, group, or period of time. <i>We seek a harmony between body and spirit.</i>
substance	A particular kind of matter with uniform properties. <i>DNA is the substance of our genes.</i>
target	The location of the target that is to be hit. <i>The airport terminal was the target of a bomb.</i>
tenor	A singing voice between baritone and alto or countertenor the highest of the ordinary adult male range. <i>Although I disagreed with him I could follow the tenor of his argument.</i>
wish	A thing that is or has been wished for. <i>The Queen had sent her best wishes for a speedy recovery.</i>

Synonyms of "Purport" as a verb (7 Words)

aim	Point or direct (a weapon or camera) at a target. <i>She had aimed the bottle at Gary s head.</i>
claim	Lay claim to as of an idea. <i>A most unwelcome event claimed his attention.</i>
lay claim	Put into a certain place or abstract location.
pretend	Represent fictitiously as in a play or pretend to be or act like. <i>Children pretending to be grown ups.</i>
profess	Teach a subject as a professor. <i>A people professing Christianity.</i>
propose	Propose or intend. <i>He proposed to attend the meeting.</i>
purpose	Reach a decision. <i>God has allowed suffering even purposed it.</i>

- *The letter purports to express people's opinion.*
- *She is not the person she purports to be.*

accusatory	Containing or expressing accusation- O.Henry. <i>He pointed an accusatory finger in her direction.</i>
advise	Recommend. <i>I advised him that the rent was due.</i>

advocate	A lawyer who pleads cases in court. <i>Care managers can become advocates for their clients.</i>
affirmation	The act of affirming or asserting or stating something. <i>He nodded in affirmation.</i>
aim	Direct (a missile or blow) at someone or something. <i>It was created with the conscious aim of answering immediate needs.</i>

aver	Report or maintain. <i>He averred that he was innocent of the allegations.</i>
bluff	The act of bluffing in poker deception by a false show of confidence in the strength of your cards. <i>His bluff succeeded in getting him accepted.</i>
claim	Lay claim to as of an idea. <i>A strong legal claim to the property.</i>
declaration	A statement of taxable goods or of dutiable properties. <i>A declaration of independence.</i>
declaratory	Having the function of declaring or explaining something. <i>The decision was declaratory of the law.</i>
demur	Enter a demurrer. <i>Normally she would have accepted the challenge but she demurred.</i>
exaction	The action of demanding and obtaining something from someone, especially a payment. <i>The billions flow in through 28 taxes and countless smaller exactions.</i>
heading	A horizontal (or nearly horizontal) passageway in a mine. <i>This topic falls under four main headings.</i>
incriminate	Suggest that someone is guilty. <i>He refused to answer questions in order not to incriminate himself.</i>
insist	Postulate positively and assertively. <i>He insisted on answers to his allegations.</i>

intent	Intention or purpose. <i>With alarm she realized his intent.</i>
objective	The objective case. <i>An objective appraisal.</i>
offer	The verbal act of offering. <i>He had to offer some resistance to her tirade.</i>
proffer	Present for acceptance or rejection. <i>She proffered a glass of wine.</i>
proponent	A person who advocates a theory, proposal, or course of action. <i>A strong proponent of the free market and liberal trade policies.</i>
<u>propose</u>	Propose or intend. <i>The senator proposed to abolish the sales tax.</i>
propound	Put forward, as of an idea. <i>He began to propound the idea of a social monarchy as an alternative to Franco.</i>
statement	The act of affirming or asserting or stating something. <i>The hope is that they will fill the stands and terraces to make a statement about the importance of this club.</i>
<u>suggest</u>	Suggest the necessity of an intervention in medicine. <i>The seduction scenes suggest his guilt and her loneliness.</i>
suggestion	Persuasion formulated as a suggestion. <i>There is no suggestion that he was involved in any wrongdoing.</i>
<u>suitor</u>	A man who courts a woman. <i>She decided to marry her suitor.</i>
