<b>exchequer</b>	The account at the Bank of England in which is held the Consolidated Fund, into which tax receipts and other public monies are paid. <i>An important source of revenue to the sultan s <b>exchequer</b>.</i>
<b><u>finances</u></b>	The branch of economics that studies the management of money and other assets.
<b>fund</b>	Financial resources. <i>A vast <b>fund</b> of information.</i>
<b>funds</b>	Assets in the form of money.
<b>handbag</b>	A container used for carrying money and small personal items or accessories (especially by women).
<b>kitty</b>	(in bowls) the jack.
<b>money</b>	Wealth reckoned in terms of money. <i>He borrowed <b>money</b> to modernize the shop.</i>
<b>money bag</b>	The official currency issued by a government or national bank.
<b>pochette</b>	A woman's small handbag shaped like an envelope.
<b>pocketbook</b>	A wallet, purse, or handbag. <i>That car is too expensive for my <b>pocketbook</b>.</i>
<b><u>pool</u></b>	A swimming pool. <i>Everyone contributed to the <b>pool</b>.</i>
<b>pouch</b>	A lockable bag for mail or dispatches. <i>A tobacco <b>pouch</b>.</i>
<b>prize</b>	A thing, especially an amount of money or a valuable object, that can be won in a game of chance. <i>The <b>prize</b> was a free trip to Europe.</i>
<b>reserves</b>	Civilians trained as soldiers but not part of the regular army.
<b>resources</b>	The ability to deal resourcefully with unusual problems. <i>The local library is a valuable resource.</i>
<b>reward</b>	A recompense for worthy acts or retribution for wrongdoing. <i>Virtue is its own <b>reward</b>.</i>
<b>shoulder bag</b>	A cut of meat including the upper joint of the foreleg.
<b>treasury</b>	The funds or revenue of a state, institution, or society. <i>The old town is a <b>treasury</b> of ancient monuments.</i>
<b>wallet</b>	A pocket-size case for holding papers and paper money.

*Great **wealth** is not a sign of great intelligence.*

- *Gather or contract into wrinkles or folds; pucker.*
- *(with reference to the lips) pucker or contract, typically to express disapproval or irritation.*



## Synonyms of "Purse" as a verb (8 Words)

<b><a href="#">compress</a></b>	Squeeze or press (two things) together. <i><b>Compress</b> the data.</i>
<b>contract</b>	Enter into a contractual arrangement. <i>The local authority will <b>contract</b> with a wide range of agencies to provide services.</i>
<b>pout</b>	Make a sad face and thrust out one's lower lip. <i>He shrugged and <b>pouted</b> his lips.</i>
<b>press together</b>	Squeeze or press together.
<b>pucker</b>	Draw together into folds or puckers. <i>She <b>puckered</b> her lips.</i>
<b>screw up</b>	Turn like a screw.
<b>tighten</b>	Narrow or limit. <i>He <b>tightened</b> up the clips.</i>

**wrinkle**

Become wrinkled or crumpled or creased.  
*This fabric won't **wrinkle**.*



**Usage Examples of "Purse" as a verb**

- *Under stress his lips would **purse** slightly.*
- *Marianne took a glance at her reflection and **purse** her lips disgustedly.*
- ***Purse** one's lips.*

<b>coin</b>	Make coins by stamping metal. <i>Gold and silver <b>coins</b>.</i>
<b>commemorative</b>	An object such as a stamp or coin made to mark an event or honour a person. <i>A <b>commemorative</b> plaque.</i>
<b>dollar</b>	A piece of paper money worth one dollar. <i>The <b>dollar</b> sign means little to him.</i>
<b>drachma</b>	Formerly the basic unit of money in Greece.
<b>foldable</b>	Capable of being folded up and stored.
<b>lose</b>	Miss from one's possessions lose sight of. <i>This clock will neither gain nor <b>lose</b> a second.</i>
<b>misplace</b>	Place or position wrongly; put in the wrong position. <i><b>Misplaced</b> modifiers.</i>
<b>numismatist</b>	A collector and student of money (and coins in particular).
<b>packet</b>	Make up into or wrap up in a packet. <i>A hectic social life could cost a <b>packet</b>.</i>
<b>paperback</b>	Having a flexible binding. <i>The shelves were stacked with well thumbed <b>paperbacks</b>.</i>
<b>pickpocket</b>	A thief who steals from the pockets or purses of others in public places. <i>I think someone <b>pickpocketed</b> me in Brighton on my way to the station.</i>
<b>pocket</b>	Of a suitable size for carrying in a pocket. <i>There were <b>pockets</b> of disaffection in parts of the country.</i>
<b>portmanteau</b>	A word blending the sounds and combining the meanings of two others, for example motel or brunch. <i>A <b>portmanteau</b> word combining smoke and fog.</i>
<b>pouch</b>	Make part of a garment hang like a pouch. <i>He stopped <b>pouched</b> his tickets and plodded on.</i>
<b>pucker</b>	Draw together into folds or puckers. <i>A <b>pucker</b> between his eyebrows.</i>
<b>robber</b>	A person who commits robbery.
<b>sack</b>	Put in a sack. <i>They were given the <b>sack</b>.</i>

**suitcase**

A case with a handle and a hinged lid, used for carrying clothes and other personal possessions.

*Three huge **suitcases** and a plethora of hand baggage.*

**thief**

A person who steals another person's property, especially by stealth and without using force or threat of violence.

*The **thief** stole the drugs from a doctor's surgery.*

**traveling**

The act of going from one place to another.

**wallet**

A pocket-size case for holding papers and paper money.

**wrapper**

Cloak that is folded or wrapped around a person.

*She put a **wrapper** over her nightdress.*
