below	Below deck. <i>He jumped from the window into the moat below.</i>
beneath	Hidden behind an appearance. <i>Upper layers can be removed to reveal internal parts beneath.</i>
curtail	Terminate or abbreviate before its intended or proper end or its full extent. <i>Curtail drinking in school.</i>
declension	A class of nouns or pronouns or adjectives in Indo-European languages having the same (or very similar) inflectional forms. <i>The first declension in Latin.</i>
declivity	A downward slope. <i>A thickly wooded declivity.</i>
decrease	The amount by which something decreases. <i>The amount of homework decreased towards the end of the semester.</i>
demoralize	Cause (someone) to lose confidence or hope. <i>She hastened her daughter's steps lest she be demoralized by beholding the free manners of these mad English.</i>
descend	Make a sudden attack on. <i>The chords descended in spectacular style from the upper register to the lower.</i>
descending	Moving down a scale of quality. <i>A rocky descending path.</i>
descent	A downward slope. <i>A descent on the Channel ports.</i>
diminish	Make or become less. <i>The trial has aged and diminished him.</i>
downgrade	The property possessed by a slope or surface that descends. <i>Downgrades by debt rating agencies outnumber upgrades by five to one.</i>

downturn	A worsening of business or economic activity. <i>A downturn in the housing market.</i>
downward	On or toward a surface regarded as a base. <i>The downward course of the stream.</i>
drop	An act of dropping supplies or troops by parachute. <i>The first drops of rain splashed on the ground.</i>
fall	An act of falling or collapsing. <i>The fall of the House of Hapsburg.</i>
falling	Moving from a higher to a lower level, typically rapidly and without control. <i>Falling temperature.</i>
located	Situated in a particular spot or position. <i>Valuable centrally located urban land.</i>
low	Ranking below other people or things in importance or class. <i>A low cut black dress.</i>
lower	In or into a lower position. <i>Lower a rating.</i>
reduce	Reduce in size reduce physically. <i>Reduce one's standard of living.</i>
reduction	The action or fact of making something smaller or less in amount, degree, or size. <i>Special reductions on knitwear.</i>
rundown	(especially of a building or area) in a poor or neglected state after having been prosperous. <i>He gave his teammates a rundown on the opposition.</i>
settle	Dispose of make a financial settlement. <i>Her mood settled into lethargy.</i>
shrinkage	The process, fact, or amount of shrinking. <i>Shrinkage is the retail trade's euphemism for shoplifting.</i>
shrinking	The act of becoming less. <i>The shrinking market has provoked a massive price war.</i>
sink	Fall or sink heavily. <i>He saw the coffin sink below the surface of the waves.</i>
sit	Be or remain in a particular position or state. <i>He was about to sit for his Cambridge entrance exam.</i>

substrate

A material which provides the surface on which something is deposited or inscribed, for example the silicon wafer used to manufacture integrated circuits.
