## Synonyms of "Puzzle" as a noun (12 Words)

### conundrum

A question asked for amusement, typically one with a pun in its answer; a riddle.

*One of the most difficult **conundrums** for the experts.*

### enigma

A person or thing that is mysterious or difficult to understand.

*Madeleine was still an **enigma** to him.*

### mystery

Something that is difficult or impossible to understand or explain.

*The **mystery** of Christ.*

### **mystifier**

A particularly baffling problem that is said to have a correct solution.

### paradox

A person or thing that combines contradictory features or qualities.

*Parmenides was the original advocate of the philosophical power of **paradox**.*

### **poser**

A person who habitually pretends to be something he is not.

<b>problem</b>	(in chess) an arrangement of pieces in which the solver has to achieve a specified result. <i>A <b>problem</b> family.</i>
<b>puzzler</b>	A person who solves puzzles as a pastime. <i>That s a real <b>puzzler</b>.</i>
<b>question</b>	An instance of questioning. <i>Edward was the only one she obeyed without <b>question</b>.</i>
<b>question mark</b>	A sentence of inquiry that asks for a reply.
<b>riddle</b>	A coarse sieve (as for gravel). <i>The <b>riddle</b> of her death.</i>
<b>teaser</b>	A worker who teases wool. <i>Promotional <b>teasers</b> in every commercial break.</i>

- Realization dawned as the pieces of the puzzle fell into place.
- A book with picture puzzles.

- *Solve or understand something by thinking hard.*
- *Be a mystery or bewildering to.*
- *Think hard about something because one cannot understand it.*
- *Cause (someone) to feel confused because they cannot understand something.*

- *Be uncertain about; think about without fully understanding or being able to decide.*



## Synonyms of "Puzzle" as a verb (52 Words)

<a href="#"><u>amaze</u></a>	Surprise (someone) greatly; fill with astonishment. <i>He has been <b>amazed</b> by the quality of the employees at the bank.</i>
<b>ask oneself about</b>	Direct or put; seek an answer to.
<b>baffle</b>	Restrain the emission of (sound, fluid, etc). <i>To <b>baffle</b> the noise further I pad the gunwales.</i>
<b>beat</b>	Shape by beating. <i>Her heart was <b>beating</b> fast.</i>
<b>bemusing</b>	Cause to be confused emotionally.
<a href="#"><u>bewilder</u></a>	Be a mystery or bewildering to. <i>His reaction had <b>bewildered</b> her.</i>
<a href="#"><u>bewildering</u></a>	Be a mystery or bewildering to.

<b>brood about</b>	Be in a huff and display one's displeasure.
<b>chew over</b>	Chew (food); to bite and grind with the teeth.
<b>cogitate on</b>	Use or exercise the mind or one's power of reason in order to make inferences, decisions, or arrive at a solution or judgments.
<b>comprehend</b>	Include, comprise, or encompass. <i>I simply couldn't <b>comprehend</b> what had happened.</i>
<b>consider</b>	Show consideration for take into account. <i>They <b>considered</b> the possibility of a strike.</i>
<b>contemplate</b>	Think intently and at length, as for spiritual purposes. <i>I <b>contemplated</b> leaving school and taking a full time job.</i>
<a href="#"><u>decipher</u></a>	Convert (a text written in code, or a coded signal) into normal language. <i>Can you <b>decipher</b> this letter.</i>
<a href="#"><u>decode</u></a>	Convert code into ordinary language. <i>A handbook to help parents <b>decode</b> street language.</i>
<b>deliberate on</b>	Discuss the pros and cons of an issue.
<b>dumbfound</b>	Be a mystery or bewildering to. <i>She was <b>dumbfounded</b> at the sight that met her eyes.</i>
<b>find the key to</b>	Accept and make use of one's personality, abilities, and situation.
<b>flummox</b>	Perplex (someone) greatly; bewilder. <i>I was completely <b>flummoxed</b> by the whole thing.</i>
<b>get</b>	Take vengeance on or get even. <i>Where did she <b>get</b> these news.</i>
<b>get to the bottom of</b>	Be a mystery or bewildering to.
<b>give much thought to</b>	Manifest or show.
<b>gravel</b>	Cover with gravel. <i>They <b>gravelled</b> the road.</i>
<b>make head or tail of</b>	Behave in a certain way.
<b>make sense of</b>	Give certain properties to something.
<b>meditate on</b>	Reflect deeply on a subject.
<b>mull over</b>	Reflect deeply on a subject.
<b>muse over</b>	Reflect deeply on a subject.
<b>mystify</b>	Make mysterious. <i><b>Mystify</b> the story.</i>
<b>mystifying</b>	Make mysterious.

<b>nonplus</b>	Be a mystery or bewildering to. <i>Diane was <b>nonplussed</b> by such an odd question.</i>
<b>perplex</b>	Make more complicated. <i>They were <b>perplexing</b> a subject plain in itself.</i>
<b>piece together</b>	Repair by adding pieces.
<b>ponder</b>	Reflect deeply on a subject. <i>I <b>pondered</b> the question of what clothes to wear for the occasion.</i>
<b>pose</b>	Assume a posture as for artistic purposes. <i>We don't know the woman who <b>posed</b> for Leonardo so often.</i>
<b>rack one's brains about</b>	Stretch to the limits.
<b>reason out</b>	Decide by reasoning; draw or come to a conclusion.
<b>reflect on</b>	Be bright by reflecting or casting light.
<b>solve</b>	Find the solution. <i><b>Solve</b> an equation.</i>
<b>sort out</b>	Arrange or order by classes or categories.
<b>stick</b>	Come or be in close contact with stick or hold together and resist separation. <i>She <b>sticks</b> to her principles.</i>
<b>stupefy</b>	Make dull or stupid or muddle with drunkenness or infatuation. <i>The amount they spend on clothes would appal their parents and <b>stupefy</b> their grandparents.</i>
<b>think hard about</b>	Judge or regard; look upon; judge.
<b>think out</b>	Bring into a given condition by mental preoccupation.
<b>think through</b>	Have or formulate in the mind.
<b>turn over in one's mind</b>	Pass to the other side of.
<b>understand</b>	Be understanding of. <i>You don't need to explain I <b>understand</b>.</i>
<b>unravel</b>	Undo (twisted, knitted, or woven threads). <i>The sweater <b>unraveled</b>.</i>
<b>untangle</b>	Free from a tangled or twisted state. <i>He knew he'd have to <b>untangle</b> a financial mess and somehow restore investor confidence.</i>
<b>vex</b>	Be a mystery or bewildering to. <i>Thou shalt not <b>vex</b> a stranger.</i>
<b>wonder about</b>	Have a wish or desire to know something.

## Associations of "Puzzle" (30 Words)

<b>abstruse</b>	Difficult to understand; obscure. <i>The professor's lectures were so <b>abstruse</b> that students tended to avoid them.</i>
<b><u>arcane</u></b>	Understood by few; mysterious or secret. <i>The <b>arcane</b> science of dowsing.</i>
<b>baffle</b>	Be a mystery or bewildering to. <i>A <b>baffle</b> plate.</i>
<b>confound</b>	Mistake one thing for another. <i>The inflation figure <b>confounded</b> economic analysts.</i>
<b><u>conundrum</u></b>	A question asked for amusement, typically one with a pun in its answer; a riddle. <i>One of the most difficult <b>conundrums</b> for the experts.</i>
<b>convoluted</b>	Highly complex or intricate and occasionally devious. <i><b>Convoluted</b> legal language.</i>
<b>crossword</b>	A puzzle in which words corresponding to numbered clues are to be found and written in to squares in the puzzle. <i>She settled down to do the <b>crossword</b>.</i>

<u>cryptic</u>	Having a secret or hidden meaning- John Gunther. <i><b>Cryptic</b> plumage is thought to minimize predation.</i>
<b>cryptogram</b>	A piece of writing in code or cipher.
<u>enigma</u>	A difficult problem. <i>Madeleine was still an <b>enigma</b> to him.</i>
<b>enigmatic</b>	Difficult to interpret or understand; mysterious. <i>Prophetic texts so <b>enigmatic</b> that their meaning has been disputed for centuries.</i>
<b>esoteric</b>	Confined to and understandable by only an enlightened inner circle. <i>A compilation of <b>esoteric</b> philosophical theories.</i>
<b>esoterica</b>	Secrets known only to an initiated minority. <i>A professor of such <b>esoterica</b> as angelology and comparative shamanism.</i>
<u>inexplicable</u>	Incapable of being explained or accounted for. <i><b>Inexplicable</b> errors.</i>
<b>jigsaw</b>	A portable power saw with a reciprocating blade; can be used with a variety of blades depending on the application and kind of cut; generally have a plate that rides on the surface that is being cut. <i>Help the police put all the pieces of the <b>jigsaw</b> together.</i>
<u>labyrinthine</u>	Resembling a labyrinth in form or complexity. <i>A <b>labyrinthine</b> network of tortuous footpaths.</i>
<u>maze</u>	Be dazed and confused. <i>They were trapped in a menacing <b>maze</b> of corridors.</i>
<b>memento</b>	A reminder of past events. <i>You can purchase a <b>memento</b> of your visit.</i>
<b>mysterious</b>	Having an import not apparent to the senses nor obvious to the intelligence; beyond ordinary understanding. <i>The new insurance policy is written without cryptic or <b>mysterious</b> terms.</i>
<u>mystery</u>	A religious belief based on divine revelation, especially one regarded as beyond human understanding. <i>A <b>mystery</b> guest.</i>
<u>puzzling</u>	Causing one to be puzzled; perplexing. <i>A <b>puzzling</b> statement.</i>
<b>rebus</b>	A puzzle in which words are represented by combinations of pictures and individual letters; for instance, apex might be represented by a picture of an ape followed by a letter X.
<b>recondite</b>	Difficult to penetrate; incomprehensible to one of ordinary understanding or knowledge. <i>Some <b>recondite</b> problem in historiography.</i>

<b>riddle</b>	Set a difficult problem or riddle. <i>They started asking <b>riddles</b> and telling jokes.</i>
<b>secret</b>	Given in confidence or in secret. <i>A <b>secret</b> bride.</i>
<b>sibylline</b>	Having a secret or hidden meaning. <i>Thoroughly <b>sibylline</b> in most of his pronouncements.</i>
<b>solve</b>	Find the solution to (a problem or question) or understand the meaning of. <i><b>Solve</b> for x.</i>
<u><b>trivia</b></u>	Details, considerations, or pieces of information of little importance or value. <i>We fill our days with meaningless <b>trivia</b>.</i>
<u><b>unfathomable</b></u>	(of water or a natural feature) impossible to measure the extent of. <i>Mountains of <b>unfathomable</b> scale.</i>
<u><b>unsolved</b></u>	Not solved. <i>An <b>unsolved</b> mystery.</i>
