Give a guarantee or promise of.

*The contract **stipulates** the dates of the payments.*

teach

Work as a teacher.

*I ll **teach** you to throw rocks at my windows.*

train

Create by training and teaching.

*They **trained** him to be a warrior.*

upskill

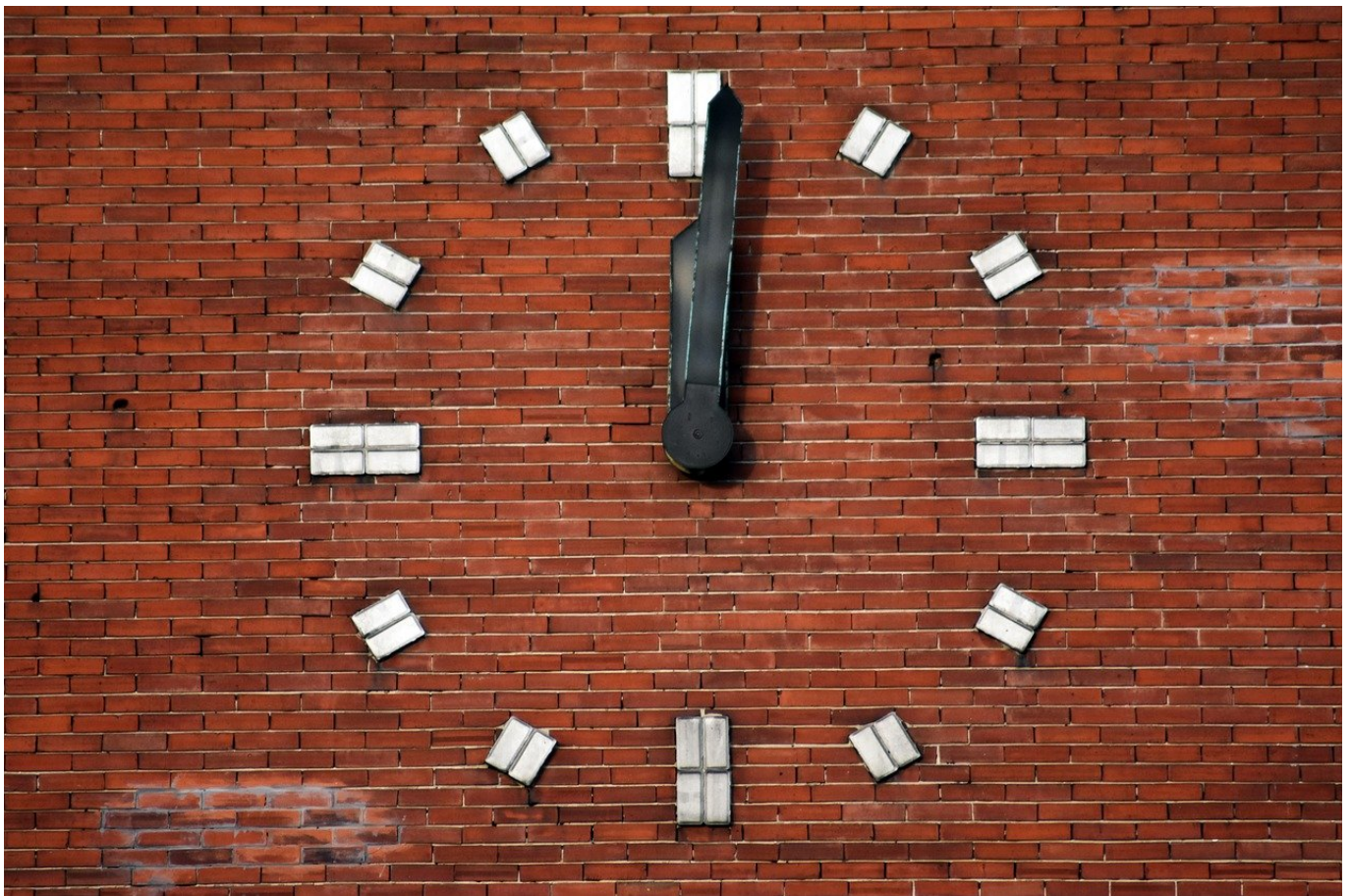
Teach (an employee) additional skills.

*They will provide grants of up to 75 for staff who decide to **upskill**.*
