- *Make more specific.*
- *Describe or portray the character or the qualities or peculiarities of.*
- *Officially recognize or establish (someone) as a practitioner of a particular profession or activity.*
- *Be or make properly entitled to be classed in a particular way.*

- *Specify as a condition or requirement in a contract or agreement; make an express demand or provision in an agreement.*

Work as a teacher.

*I ll **teach** you to throw rocks at my windows.*

**train**

Create by training and teaching.

*They **trained** him to be a warrior.*

**upskill**

Teach (an employee) additional skills.

*They will provide grants of up to 75 for staff who decide to **upskill**.*

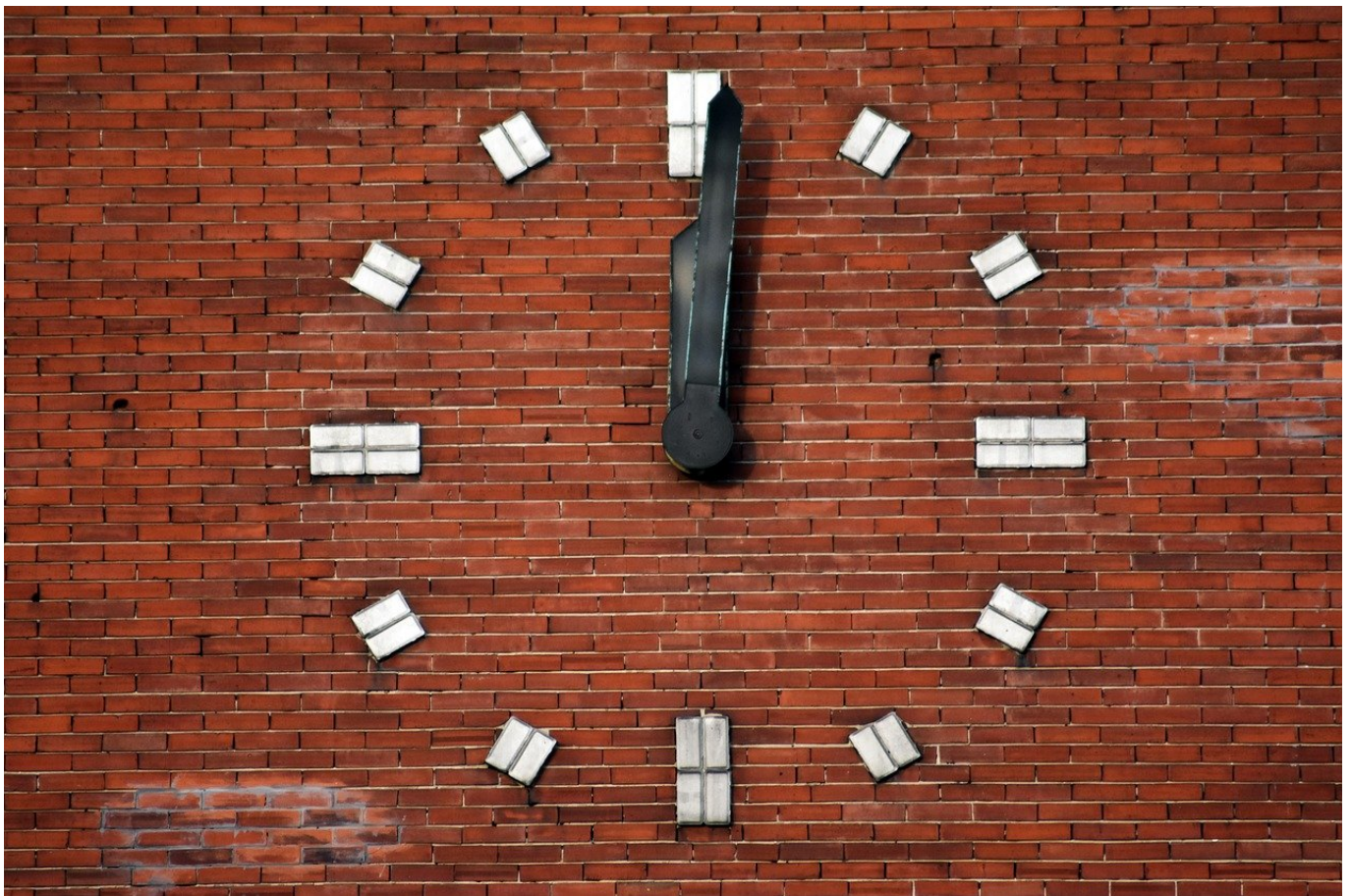

<b><u>exclusion</u></b>	The state of being excommunicated. <i>He had a hand in my <b>exclusion</b> from the committee.</i>
<b>exemption</b>	A deduction allowed to a taxpayer because of his status (having certain dependents or being blind or being over 65 etc). <i>Vehicles that may qualify for <b>exemption</b> from tax.</i>
<b>favour</b>	Bestow a privilege upon. <i>I ve come to ask you a <b>favour</b>.</i>
<b>fit</b>	Be the right size or shape fit correctly or as desired. <i>Felt relaxed and <b>fit</b> after their holiday.</i>
<b>immunity</b>	The condition in which an organism can resist disease. <i>The rebels were given <b>immunity</b> from prosecution.</i>
<b><u>impunity</u></b>	Exemption from punishment or freedom from the injurious consequences of an action. <i>Protestors burned flags on the streets with <b>impunity</b>.</i>
<b>legalize</b>	Make legal. <i>The Swiss parliament <b>legalized</b> cannabis.</i>
<b><u>mercy</u></b>	Leniency and compassion shown toward offenders by a person or agency charged with administering justice. <i>His death was in a way a <b>mercy</b>.</i>
<b><u>permit</u></b>	An official document giving someone authorization to do something. <i>Weather <b>permitting</b> guests can dine outside on the veranda.</i>
<b>perquisite</b>	A right reserved exclusively by a particular person or group (especially a hereditary or official right). <i>The <b>perquisites</b> of celebrity are intoxicating.</i>
<b><u>prefer</u></b>	Give preference to one creditor over another. <i>He was eventually <b>preferred</b> to the bishopric of Durham.</i>
<b><u>prerogative</u></b>	Arising from the prerogative of the Crown usually delegated to the government or the judiciary and based in common law rather than statutory law. <i>In some countries higher education is predominantly the <b>prerogative</b> of the rich.</i>
<b>privilege</b>	Bestow a privilege upon. <i>He has been accustomed all his life to wealth and <b>privilege</b>.</i>
