

repent Feel regret or penitence about.

Marian came to **repent** her hasty judgement.

Remorse for your past conduct.

repentance Each person who turns to God in genuine **repentance** and faith will be

saved.

rue Feel remorse for; feel sorry for; be contrite about.

To his **rue** the error cost him the game.

sceptical Denying or questioning the tenets of especially a religion.

The public were deeply **sceptical** about some of the proposals.

scruple Raise scruples.

I had no **scruple**s about eavesdropping.

A person or institution against whom an action is brought in a court of law;

suspect the person being sued or accused.

I **suspect** he is a fugitive.

A feeling or belief that someone is guilty of an illegal, dishonest, or

suspicion unpleasant action.

He was arrested on **suspicion** of murder.

Openly distrustful and unwilling to confide.

Police were called when staff became **suspicious**.

trepidation Trembling movements or motion.

The men set off in fear and **trepidation**.

uneasiness Inability to rest or relax or be still.

I sensed the **uneasiness** of people around me.
