Definitions of "Quantify" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “quantify” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Use as a quantifier.*
- *Express as a number or measure or quantity.*
- *Define the application of (a term or proposition) by the use of all, some, etc., e.g. ‘for all x if x is A then x is B ’.*
- *Express or measure the quantity of.*

*To a certain **extent** she was right.*

[gauge](#) Measure the dimensions of an object with a gauge.
*The wire is **gauged**.*

[magnitude](#) A number assigned to the ratio of two quantities two quantities are of the same order of magnitude if one is less than 10 times as large as the other the number of magnitudes that the quantities differ is specified to within a power o.
*A problem of the first **magnitude**.*

measurable Capable of being measured.
*He had the worst **measurables** in the draft for his position.*

measure	Measuring instrument having a sequence of marks at regular intervals used as a reference in making measurements. <i>Cost cutting measures.</i>
measurement	The size, length, or amount of something, as established by measuring. <i>A hand is a measurement used for measuring horses.</i>
micrometer	A gauge that measures small distances or thicknesses between its two faces, one of which can be moved away from or towards the other by turning a screw with a fine thread.
<u>number</u>	Place a limit on the number of. <i>The form of English pronouns reflects their number and gender.</i>
numeral	A symbol used to represent a number. <i>He learned to write the numerals before he went to school.</i>
numerate	Having a good basic knowledge of arithmetic; able to understand and work with numbers. <i>Teachers should ensure that their pupils are literate and numerate.</i>
numeration	The action or process of calculating or assigning a number to something.
numeric	Of or relating to or denoting numbers. <i>A numeric symbol.</i>
numerical	Relating to or having ability to think in or work with numbers. <i>The numerical superiority of the enemy.</i>
plumb	Adjust with a plumb line so as to make vertical. <i>They are valuable aids in plumbing the frames and keeping the side of the ship fair.</i>
<u>quantifiable</u>	Able to be expressed or measured as a quantity. <i>The benefits are not easily quantifiable.</i>
<u>quantity</u>	The figure or symbol representing a quantity. <i>He had a quantity of ammunition.</i>
<u>sum</u>	Find the sum of two or more amounts. <i>They could not afford such a sum.</i>
surveying	The practice of measuring angles and distances on the ground so that they can be accurately plotted on a map. <i>Many estate agents have no expertise in property surveying.</i>
tachometer	An instrument which measures the working speed of an engine (especially in a road vehicle), typically in revolutions per minute.
touchstone	A basis for comparison; a reference point against which other things can be evaluated. <i>They tend to regard grammar as the touchstone of all language performance.</i>

voltmeter Meter that measures the potential difference between two points.

yardstick A standard used for comparison.
