<b>expanse</b>	A wide scope. <i>The green <b>expanse</b> of the forest.</i>
<b>extent</b>	The size or scale of something. <i>To a certain <b>extent</b> she was right.</i>
<b>good deal</b>	Moral excellence or admirableness.
<b>great deal</b>	A person who has achieved distinction and honor in some field.
<b>group</b>	A combination of atoms having a recognizable identity in a number of compounds. <i>I now belong to my local drama <b>group</b>.</i>
<b>length</b>	The length of a horse boat etc as a measure of the lead in a race. <i>He awkwardly lowered his <b>length</b> into the small car.</i>
<b>load</b>	The amount of electricity supplied by a generating system at any given time. <i>I do at least six <b>loads</b> of washing a week.</i>
<b>mass</b>	The common people generally. <i>A <b>mass</b> of cyclists.</i>
<b>measure</b>	Measuring instrument having a sequence of marks at regular intervals used as a reference in making measurements. <i>The dimensions were in imperial <b>measure</b>.</i>
<b>number</b>	The number is used in calling a particular telephone. <i>The weight of <b>numbers</b> turned the battle against them.</i>
<b>quota</b>	A limitation on imports. <i>The <b>quota</b> for Japanese imports was negotiated.</i>
<b>size</b>	A person or garment corresponding to a particular numbered size. <i>Firms of all <b>sizes</b>.</i>

**total** A quantity obtained by the addition of a group of numbers.

*He scored a **total** of thirty three points.*

**volume** Physical objects consisting of a number of pages bound together.

*The kids played their music at full **volume**.*

**weight** A unit used to measure weight.

*He was at least fifteen stone in **weight**.*

<b>magnitude</b>	A number assigned to the ratio of two quantities two quantities are of the same order of magnitude if one is less than 10 times as large as the other the number of magnitudes that the quantities differ is specified to within a power of 10. <i>Events of tragic <b>magnitude</b>.</i>
<b>measurable</b>	Capable of being measured. <i>A <b>measurable</b> figure in literature.</i>

<b>quantify</b>	Define the application of (a term or proposition) by the use of all, some, etc., e.g. 'for all x if x is A then x is B'. <i>Can you <b>quantify</b> your results.</i>
<b>quota</b>	A limitation on imports. <i>The county is falling short of its <b>quota</b> of blood donations.</i>
<b>subtrahend</b>	The number to be subtracted from the minuend.
<b>sum</b>	Be a summary of. <i>The abstract <b>summarizes</b> the main ideas in the paper.</i>
<b>surveying</b>	The work of examining and reporting on the general condition of a building, especially for a prospective buyer. <i>Many estate agents have no expertise in property <b>surveying</b>.</i>
<b>tachometer</b>	An instrument which measures the working speed of an engine (especially in a road vehicle), typically in revolutions per minute.
<b>touchstone</b>	A piece of fine-grained dark schist or jasper formerly used for testing alloys of gold by observing the colour of the mark which they made on it. <i>They tend to regard grammar as the <b>touchstone</b> of all language performance.</i>
<b>voltmeter</b>	An instrument for measuring electric potential in volts.
