### Definitions of "Quarrel" as a noun

- *A heated argument or disagreement, typically about a trivial issue and between people who are usually on good terms.*
- *A reason for disagreement with a person, group, or principle.*



## Synonyms of "Quarrel" as a noun (10 Words)

### argument

An independent variable associated with a function or proposition and determining its value For example in the expression  $y = F(x)$  the arguments of the function  $F$  are  $x$  and  $x$  and the value is  $y$ .  
*I ve had an **argument** with my father.*

**difference of opinion** The quality of being unlike or dissimilar.

### disagreement

A conflict of people's opinions or actions or characters.  
***Disagreement** between the results of the two assessments.*

### **dissension**

Disagreement that leads to discord.  
*The mill was the cause of a **dissension** in 1620.*

### **dustup**

An angry dispute.

### **fight**

The inclination or ability to fight or struggle.  
*There was **fighting** in the streets.*

### **row**

The act of rowing as a sport.  
*A mackerel sky filled with **rows** of clouds.*

### **run-in**

An angry dispute.

### **words**

Words making up the dialogue of a play.  
*He has a gift for **words**.*

### wrangle

A dispute or argument, typically one that is long and complicated.  
*An insurance **wrangle** is holding up compensation payments.*

- *She made the mistake of picking a quarrel with John.*

<b>argue</b>	Present reasons and arguments. <i>He <b>argued</b> for extra resources.</i>

<b>argufy</b>	Present reasons and arguments. <i>It won't do to <b>argufy</b> I tell you.</i>
<b>attack</b>	Attack someone physically or emotionally. <i>In February the Germans <b>attacked</b> Verdun.</i>
<b>be against</b>	Have an existence, be extant.
<b>be anti</b>	Have the quality of being; (copula, used with an adjective or a predicate noun.

<b>be at odds</b>	Work in a specific place, with a specific subject, or in a specific function.
<b>be at variance</b>	Spend or use time.
<b>be hostile to</b>	Spend or use time.
<b>be in opposition to</b>	Represent, as of a character on stage.
<b>carp at</b>	Raise trivial objections.
<b>cavil at</b>	Raise trivial objections.
<b>censure</b>	Rebuke formally. <i>The company was heavily <b>censured</b> by inspectors from the Department of Trade.</i>
<b>complain about</b>	Express complaints, discontent, displeasure, or unhappiness.
<b><u>condemn</u></b>	Prove or show to be guilty or unsatisfactory. <i>She could see in his eyes that her stumble had <b>condemned</b> her.</i>
<b><u>contradict</u></b>	Be in contradiction with. <i>He did not <b>contradict</b> what he said last week.</i>
<b>criticize</b>	Indicate the faults of (someone or something) in a disapproving way. <i>The paper <b>criticized</b> the new movie.</i>
<b><u>differ</u></b>	Be of different opinions. <i>These two tests <b>differ</b> in only one respect.</i>
<b><u>disagree</u></b>	(of food, climate, or an experience) have an adverse effect on. <i>The results <b>disagree</b> with the findings reported so far.</i>
<b>dispute</b>	Have a disagreement over something. <i>The estate <b>disputes</b> that it is responsible for the embankment.</i>
<b>fail to agree</b>	Fall short in what is expected.
<b>fall out</b>	Assume a disappointed or sad expression.
<b><u>fault</u></b>	Of a rock formation be broken by a fault or faults. <i>The people of Caesarea <b>faulted</b> greatly when they called King Herod a god.</i>
<b>fight</b>	Fight against or resist strongly. <i>I will <b>fight</b> for a fairer society.</i>
<b>find fault with</b>	Decide on and make a declaration about.
<b>find lacking</b>	Obtain through effort or management.
<b>have a fight</b>	Have a personal or business relationship with someone.
<b>have a misunderstanding</b>	Cause to move; cause to be in a certain position or condition.

<b>have a row</b>	Have as a feature.
<b>impugn</b>	Dispute the truth, validity, or honesty of (a statement or motive); call into question. <i>The father does not <b>impugn</b> her capacity as a good mother.</i>
<b>object to</b>	Be averse to or express disapproval of.
<b>oppose</b>	Set into opposition or rivalry. <i>The board <b>opposed</b> his motion.</i>
<b>pick holes in</b>	Pull lightly but sharply with a plucking motion.
<b>rebut</b>	Prove to be false or incorrect. <i>But he their sharp assault right boldly did <b>rebut</b>.</i>
<b>row</b>	Propel with oars. <i><b>Row</b> the boat across the lake.</i>
<b>scrap</b>	Make into scrap or refuse. <i>A bold decision was taken to <b>scrap</b> existing plant.</i>
<b>take exception to</b>	Serve oneself to, or consume regularly.
<b>take issue with</b>	Make use of or accept for some purpose.

- *He will quarrel like hell if he see black pods on the trees.*
- *We quarreled over the question as to who discovered America.*
- *Some people quarrel with this approach.*
- *Stop quarrelling with your sister.*

<a href="#"><u>contention</u></a>	Heated disagreement. <i>The captured territory was the main area of <b>contention</b> between the two countries.</i>
<a href="#"><u>contentious</u></a>	(of a person) given to provoking argument. <i>A <b>contentious</b> issue.</i>
<b>contentiousness</b>	An inclination to be quarrelsome and contentious.
<a href="#"><u>controversy</u></a>	A contentious speech act; a dispute where there is strong disagreement. <i>The announcement ended a protracted <b>controversy</b>.</i>
<b>counterattack</b>	Make a counterattack.
<b>debate</b>	Argue with one another. <i>There has been much <b>debate</b> about prices.</i>
<b>declamatory</b>	Vehement or impassioned in expression. <i>A long <b>declamatory</b> speech.</i>
<a href="#"><u>disagreement</u></a>	The speech act of disagreeing or arguing or disputing. <i>There was some <b>disagreement</b> about the details.</i>
<a href="#"><u>discord</u></a>	Lack of agreement or harmony between things. <i>A prosperous family who showed no signs of <b>discord</b>.</i>
<b>discussion</b>	The action or process of talking about something in order to reach a decision or to exchange ideas. <i>We had a good <b>discussion</b>.</i>
<b>disproof</b>	A set of facts that prove that something is untrue. <i>The answer ought to turn on considerations that are susceptible to verification or <b>disproof</b>.</i>
<b>disputatious</b>	Inclined or showing an inclination to dispute or disagree, even to engage in law suits. <i>A <b>disputatious</b> lawyer.</i>
<b>dispute</b>	Coming into conflict with. <i>An industrial <b>dispute</b>.</i>
<a href="#"><u>enthuse</u></a>	Utter with enthusiasm. <i>Public art is a tonic that can <b>enthuse</b> alienated youth.</i>

<b>gainsay</b>	Speak against or oppose (someone). <i>None could <b>gainsay</b> her.</i>
<b>hassel</b>	Norwegian chemist noted for his research on organic molecules (1897-1981).
<b>hotspot</b>	A small area with a relatively high temperature in comparison to its surroundings. <i>Fire engines were required to visit the scene again last night after <b>hotspots</b> appeared to be in danger of re igniting.</i>
<b>impugn</b>	Dispute the truth, validity, or honesty of (a statement or motive); call into question. <i>The father does not <b>impugn</b> her capacity as a good mother.</i>
<b>quarrelsome</b>	Given to or characterized by quarrelling. <i>A moody <b>quarrelsome</b> man.</i>
<b>refutable</b>	Able to be refuted.
<b>refute</b>	Overthrow by argument, evidence, or proof. <i>A spokesman totally <b>refuted</b> the allegation of bias.</i>
<b>rivalry</b>	The act of competing as for profit or a prize. <i>There always has been intense <b>rivalry</b> between the clubs.</i>
<b>row</b>	The act of rowing as a sport. <i>Visualize the subject in the form of a sheet of paper divided into columns and <b>rows</b>.</i>
<b>squabble</b>	A noisy quarrel about something trivial. <i>Family <b>squabbles</b>.</i>
<b>wrangle</b>	A dispute or argument, typically one that is long and complicated. <i><b>Wrangle</b> horses.</i>
