### Definitions of "Queries" as a noun

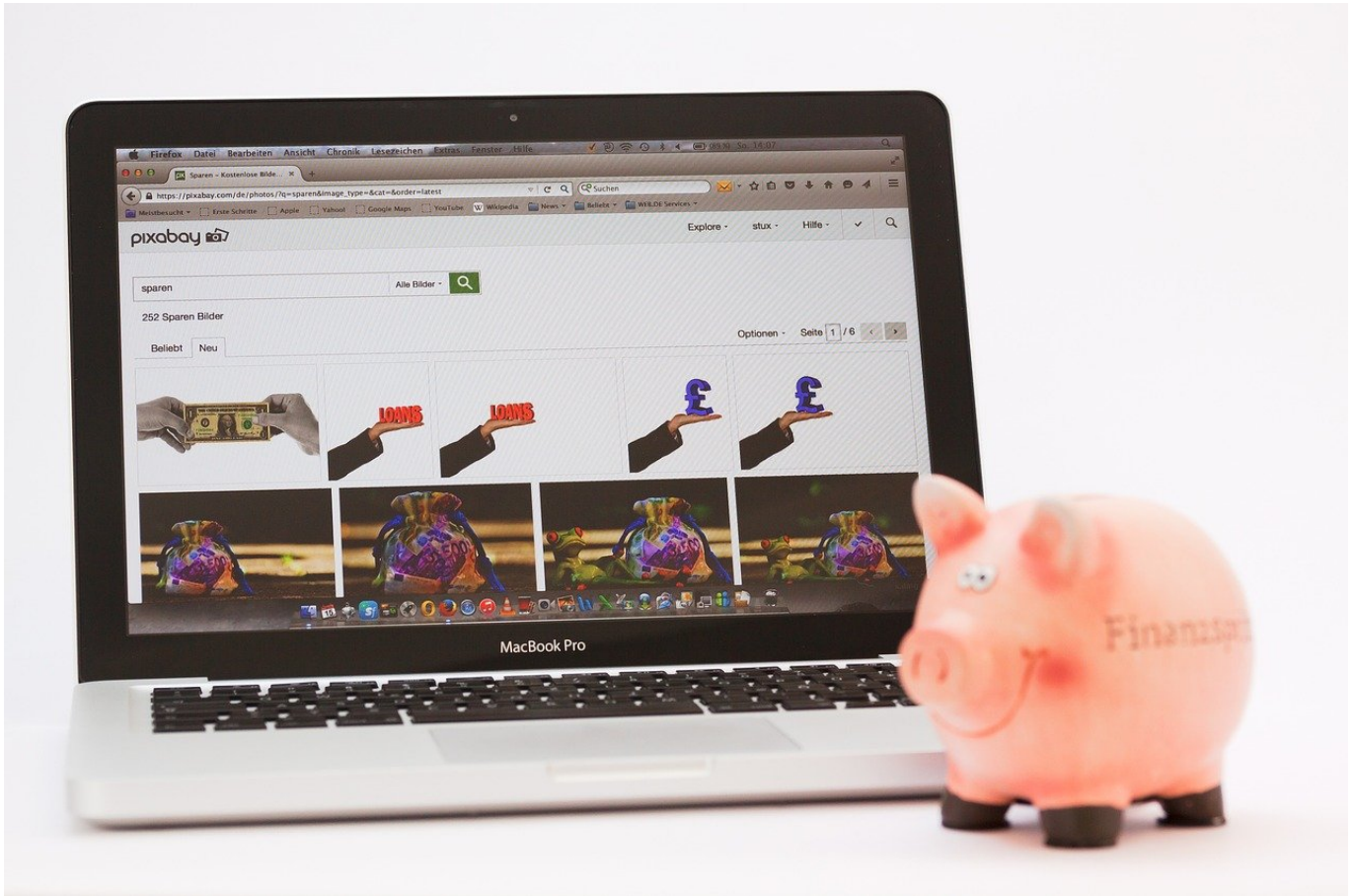

- question** An instance of questioning.

**question** Ask someone questions especially in an official context.  
*The suspect was **questioned** by the police.*

<b>answer</b>	Give the correct answer or solution to. <i>Their <b>answer</b> was to sue me.</i>
<b>answerable</b>	Morally or legally responsible to a higher authority. <i>Straightforward and <b>answerable</b> questions.</i>
<b>ask</b>	Require or ask for as a price or condition. <i>How much further I <b>asked</b>.</i>
<b><u>askance</u></b>	Directed to one side with or as if with doubt or suspicion or envy- Elizabeth Bowen. <i>Her eyes with their misted <b>askance</b> look.</i>
<b>asking</b>	The verbal act of requesting.
<b>curiosity</b>	An unusual or interesting object or fact. <i><b>Curiosity</b> got the better of me so I called him.</i>

<b>curious</b>	Strange; unusual. <i>Traffic was slowed by <b>curious</b> rubberneckers.</i>
<b>dubious</b>	Of questionable value. <i>I was rather <b>dubious</b> about the whole idea.</i>
<b>enigma</b>	A person or thing that is mysterious or difficult to understand. <i>Madeleine was still an <b>enigma</b> to him.</i>
<b>enquire</b>	Have a wish or desire to know something.
<b>examination</b>	The action or process of conducting an examination. <i>The role of the planning system has come under increasing critical <b>examination</b>.</i>
<b>inquire</b>	Inquire about. <i>The task of political sociology is to <b>inquire</b> into the causes of political events.</i>
<b>inquiry</b>	A systematic investigation of a matter of public interest. <i>All lines of <b>inquiry</b> are open.</i>
<b>inquisitor</b>	A questioner who is excessively harsh. <i>The professional <b>inquisitors</b> of the press.</i>
<b>interrogate</b>	Ask questions of (someone) closely, aggressively, or formally. <i>He was <b>interrogated</b> by MI6.</i>
<b>interrogation</b>	A sentence of inquiry that asks for a reply. <i>Would he keep his mouth shut under <b>interrogation</b>.</i>
<b>interrogative</b>	Some linguists consider interrogative sentences to constitute a mood. <i>An <b>interrogative</b> adverb.</i>
<b>interrogatory</b>	Conveying a question; questioning. <i>She abandoned her <b>interrogatory</b> monologue.</i>
<b>interview</b>	Perform well or badly at an interview. <i>A half hour <b>interview</b> with the prime minister.</i>
<b>interviewer</b>	A person who conducts an interview. <i>She took time to answer questions from radio <b>interviewers</b>.</i>
<b>nosy</b>	Showing too much curiosity about other people's affairs. <i>They don't <b>nosy</b> into your business like some people.</i>
<b>pardon</b>	Grant a pardon to. <i>I know Catherine will <b>pardon</b> me.</i>
<b>poser</b>	A particularly difficult or baffling question or problem.
<b>question</b>	Pose a series of questions to. <i>There is no <b>question</b> about the validity of the enterprise.</i>

<b>reply</b>	A statement either spoken or written that is made to reply to a question or request or criticism or accusation. <i>I am writing in <b>reply</b> to your letter.</i>
<b>solution</b>	The action of separating or breaking down dissolution. <i>An internet marketing firm specializing in e commerce <b>solutions</b>.</i>
<b>solve</b>	Settle, as of a debt. <i>Did you <b>solve</b> the problem.</i>
<b><u>theoretically</u></b>	In a way that relates to the theory of a subject or area of study rather than its practical application. <i>The method has been studied <b>theoretically</b>.</i>
<b><u>why</u></b>	The cause or intention underlying an action or situation especially in the phrase the whys and wherefores. <i><b>Why</b> don t I give you a lift.</i>
<b>wonder</b>	A thing or a quality of something that causes wonder. <i>Athens was a place of <b>wonder</b> and beauty.</i>
