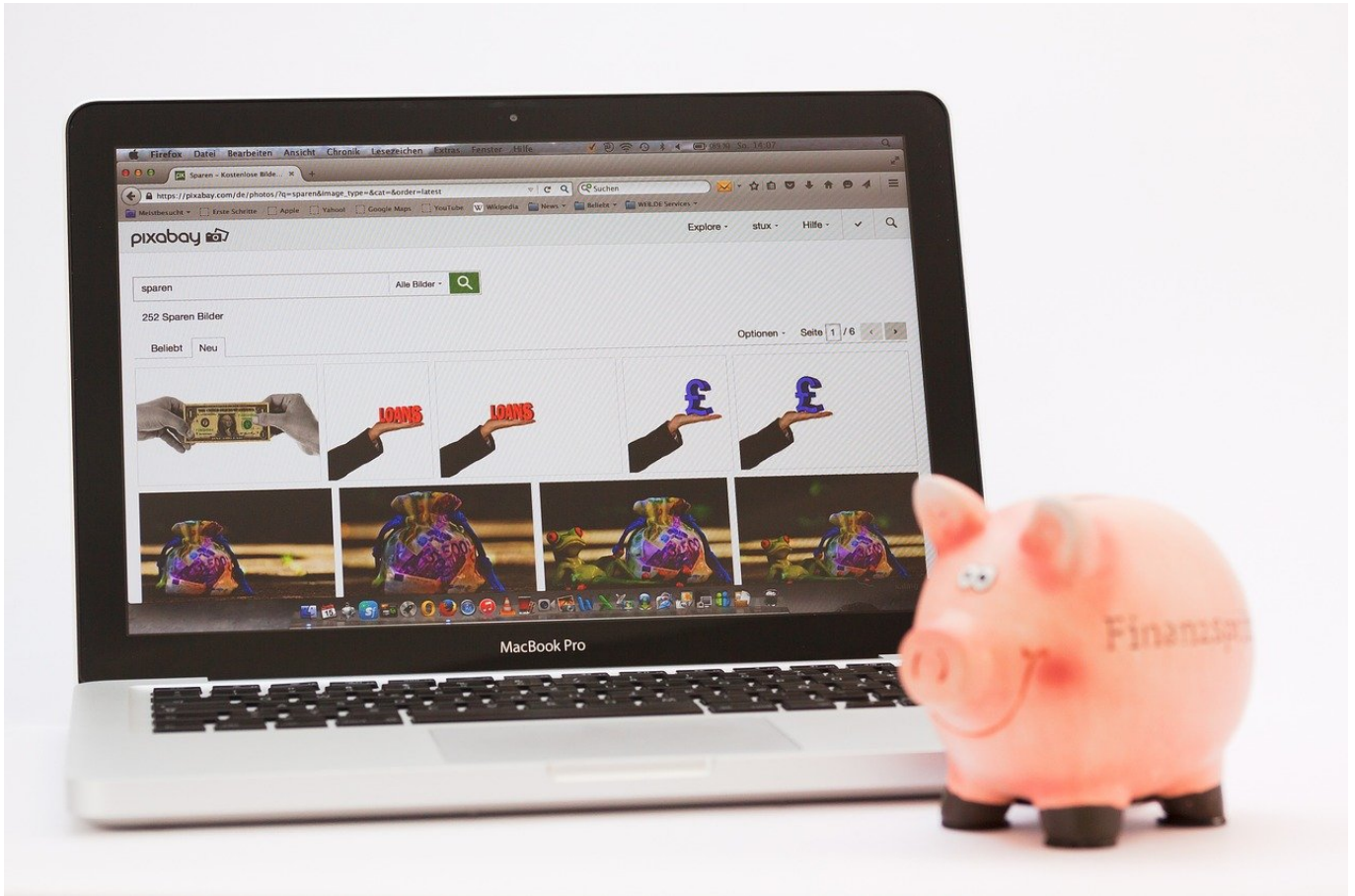

question Ask someone questions especially in an official context.
*The suspect was **questioned** by the police.*

answer	Give the correct answer or solution to. <i>Their answer was to sue me.</i>
answerable	Morally or legally responsible to a higher authority. <i>Straightforward and answerable questions.</i>
ask	Require or ask for as a price or condition. <i>How much further I asked.</i>
<u>askance</u>	Directed to one side with or as if with doubt or suspicion or envy- Elizabeth Bowen. <i>Her eyes with their misted askance look.</i>
asking	The verbal act of requesting.
curiosity	An unusual or interesting object or fact. <i>Curiosity got the better of me so I called him.</i>

curious	Strange; unusual. <i>Traffic was slowed by curious rubberneckers.</i>
dubious	Of questionable value. <i>I was rather dubious about the whole idea.</i>
enigma	A person or thing that is mysterious or difficult to understand. <i>Madeleine was still an enigma to him.</i>
enquire	Have a wish or desire to know something.
examination	The action or process of conducting an examination. <i>The role of the planning system has come under increasing critical examination.</i>
inquire	Inquire about. <i>The task of political sociology is to inquire into the causes of political events.</i>
inquiry	A systematic investigation of a matter of public interest. <i>All lines of inquiry are open.</i>
inquisitor	A questioner who is excessively harsh. <i>The professional inquisitors of the press.</i>
interrogate	Ask questions of (someone) closely, aggressively, or formally. <i>He was interrogated by MI6.</i>
interrogation	A sentence of inquiry that asks for a reply. <i>Would he keep his mouth shut under interrogation.</i>
interrogative	Some linguists consider interrogative sentences to constitute a mood. <i>An interrogative adverb.</i>
interrogatory	Conveying a question; questioning. <i>She abandoned her interrogatory monologue.</i>
interview	Perform well or badly at an interview. <i>A half hour interview with the prime minister.</i>
interviewer	A person who conducts an interview. <i>She took time to answer questions from radio interviewers.</i>
nosy	Showing too much curiosity about other people's affairs. <i>They don't nosy into your business like some people.</i>
pardon	Grant a pardon to. <i>I know Catherine will pardon me.</i>
poser	A particularly difficult or baffling question or problem.
question	Pose a series of questions to. <i>There is no question about the validity of the enterprise.</i>

reply	A statement either spoken or written that is made to reply to a question or request or criticism or accusation. <i>I am writing in reply to your letter.</i>
solution	The action of separating or breaking down dissolution. <i>An internet marketing firm specializing in e commerce solutions.</i>
solve	Settle, as of a debt. <i>Did you solve the problem.</i>
<u>theoretically</u>	In a way that relates to the theory of a subject or area of study rather than its practical application. <i>The method has been studied theoretically.</i>
<u>why</u>	The cause or intention underlying an action or situation especially in the phrase the whys and wherefores. <i>Why don t I give you a lift.</i>
wonder	A thing or a quality of something that causes wonder. <i>Athens was a place of wonder and beauty.</i>
