According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “query” as a noun can have the following definitions:

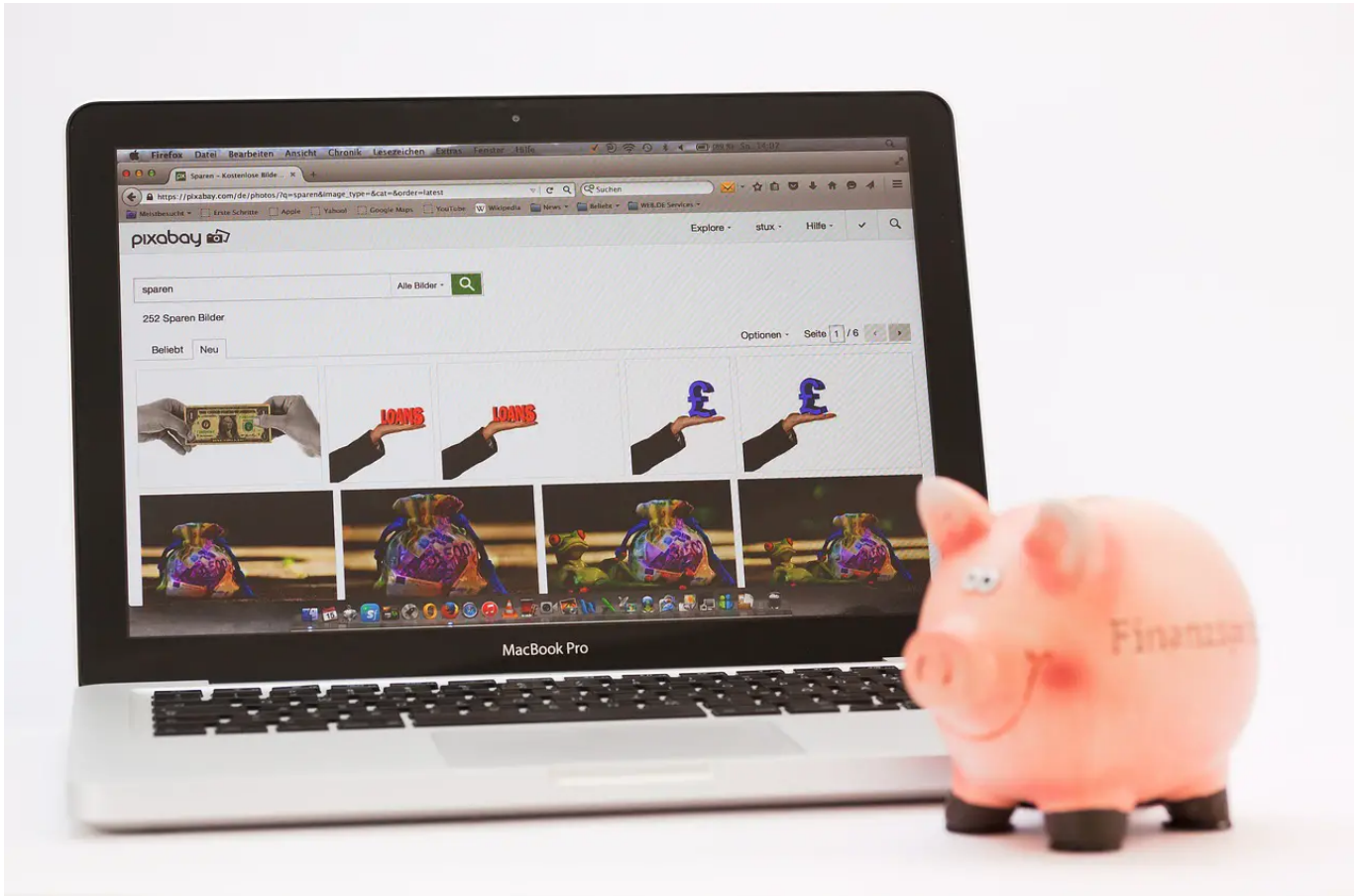
- *Used in writing or speaking to question the accuracy of a following statement or to introduce a question.*
- *A question mark.*
- *An instance of questioning.*
- *A question, especially one expressing doubt or requesting information.*



## Synonyms of "Query" as a noun (9 Words)

- doubt** A feeling of uncertainty or lack of conviction.  
*Some **doubt** has been cast upon the authenticity of this account.*
- enquiry** An instance of questioning.  
A systematic investigation of a matter of public interest.
- inquiry** *Eventually the independent **inquiry** was published which found that there was no case to answer.*
- interrogation** A transmission that will trigger an answering transmission from a transponder.  
*He had trouble phrasing his **interrogations**.*
- question** An instance of questioning.  
*We hope this leaflet has been helpful in answering your **questions**.*
- question mark** An instance of questioning.
- reservation** A statement that limits or restricts some claim.  
*The **reservation** of positions for non Americans.*
- suspicion** Cautious distrust.  
*He was arrested on **suspicion** of murder.*

**uncertainty**      The state of being uncertain.  
Times of **uncertainty** and danger.

## Query as a Verb

### Definitions of "Query" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "query" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Put a question or questions to (someone).*
- *Pose a question.*
- *Ask a question about something, especially in order to express one's doubts about it or to check its validity or accuracy.*



## Synonyms of "Query" as a verb (22 Words)

**ask**

Require or ask for as a price or condition.  
*It s about time we **asked** Pam to dinner.*

**call in question**

Read aloud to check for omissions or absentees.

**call into question**

Utter a sudden loud cry.

**cast aspersions on**

Form by pouring (e.g., wax or hot metal) into a cast or mold.

**challenge**

Issue a challenge to.

*The watchman did not **challenge** him.*

**dispute**

Take exception to.

*The point has been much **disputed**.*

**doubt**

Consider unlikely or have doubts about.

*I **doubt** my ability to do the job.*

**entertain doubts about**

Take into consideration, have in view.

**express reservations about**

Obtain from a substance, as by mechanical action.

<b>express suspicions about</b>	Indicate through a symbol, formula, etc.
<b>feel uneasy about</b>	Undergo passive experience of.
<b>harbour reservations about</b>	Maintain (a theory, thoughts, or feelings).
<b>harbour suspicions about</b>	Keep in one's possession; of animals.
<b>have reservations about</b>	Get something; come into possession of.
<b>have suspicions about</b>	Suffer from; be ill with.
<b><u>inquire</u></b>	Inquire about. <i>The task of political sociology is to <b>inquire</b> into the causes of political events.</i>
<b>object to</b>	Be averse to or express disapproval of.
<b>question</b>	Pose a series of questions to. <i>Four men were being <b>questioned</b> about the killings.</i>
<b>raise doubts about</b>	Bring up.
<b>raise objections to</b>	Raise in rank or condition.
<b><u>suspect</u></b>	Believe or feel that (someone) is guilty of an illegal, dishonest, or unpleasant act, without certain proof. <i>I <b>suspect</b> he is a fugitive.</i>
<b>throw doubt on</b>	Utter with force; utter vehemently.

## Usage Examples of "Query" as a verb

- *Many people queried whether any harm had been done.*
- *'Why not?' he queried.*
- *I rang the water company to query my bill.*
- *When these officers were queried, they felt unhappy.*

## Associations of "Query" (30 Words)

<b>answer</b>	Give the correct answer or solution to. <i>She must <b>answer</b> for her actions.</i>
<b>answerable</b>	Responsible for. <i>Parents are <b>answerable</b> for their child s acts.</i>
<b>ask</b>	Require or ask for as a price or condition. <i>People are always <b>asking</b> questions.</i>
<b><u>askance</u></b>	With a side or oblique glance. <i>A waiter looked <b>askance</b> at his jeans.</i>

<b>asking</b>	The verbal act of requesting.
<b>curiosity</b>	Something unusual — perhaps worthy of collecting. <i>Curiosity got the better of me so I called him.</i>
<b>curious</b>	Strange; unusual. <i>She was <b>curious</b> to know what had happened.</i>
<b>dubious</b>	Hesitating or doubting. <i>I was rather <b>dubious</b> about the whole idea.</i>
<b>enigma</b>	A person or thing that is mysterious or difficult to understand. <i>Madeleine was still an <b>enigma</b> to him.</i>
<b>enquire</b>	Conduct an inquiry or investigation of.
<b>examination</b>	The action or process of conducting an examination. <i>A medical <b>examination</b> is conducted without delay.</i>
<b>inquire</b>	Inquire about. <i>Annie <b>inquired</b> after her parents.</i>
<b>inquiry</b>	A systematic investigation of a matter of public interest. <i>All lines of <b>inquiry</b> are open.</i>
<b>inquisitor</b>	A questioner who is excessively harsh. <i>The professional <b>inquisitors</b> of the press.</i>
<b>interrogate</b>	(of an electronic device) transmit a signal to (another device, especially one on a vehicle) to obtain information about identity, condition, etc. <i>He was <b>interrogated</b> by MI6.</i>
<b>interrogation</b>	Formal systematic questioning. <i>He had conducted hundreds of criminal <b>interrogations</b>.</i>
<b>interrogative</b>	Relating to verbs in the so called interrogative mood. <i>A hard <b>interrogative</b> stare.</i>
<b>interrogatory</b>	Relating to the use of or having the nature of an interrogation. <i>She abandoned her <b>interrogatory</b> monologue.</i>
<b>interview</b>	Conduct an interview in television newspaper and radio reporting. <i>The job candidate <b>interviewed</b> everywhere.</i>
<b>interviewer</b>	A person who interviews someone, especially as a job. <i>She took time to answer questions from radio <b>interviewers</b>.</i>
<b>nosy</b>	Offensively curious or inquisitive. <i>Stop being so <b>nosy</b>.</i>
<b>pardon</b>	Grant a pardon to. <i>He was <b>pardoned</b> for his treason.</i>
<b>poser</b>	A person who poses for a photographer or painter or sculptor.

<b>question</b>	Pose a question. <i>We hope this leaflet has been helpful in answering your <b>questions</b>.</i>
<b>reply</b>	A statement either spoken or written that is made to reply to a question or request or criticism or accusation. <i>Clough scored the first goal and Speed hit a late <b>reply</b>.</i>
<b>solution</b>	A homogeneous mixture of two or more substances frequently but not necessarily a liquid solution. <i>He used a <b>solution</b> of peroxide and water.</i>
<b>solve</b>	Find the solution. <i>Did you <b>solve</b> the problem.</i>
<b><u>theoretically</u></b>	In a way that relates to the theory of a subject or area of study rather than its practical application. <i>The method has been studied <b>theoretically</b>.</i>
<b><u>why</u></b>	The cause or intention underlying an action or situation especially in the phrase the whys and wherefores. <i>The <b>whys</b> and wherefores of these procedures need to be explained to students.</i>
<b>wonder</b>	A thing or a quality of something that causes wonder. <i>She <b>wondered</b> whether it would snow tonight.</i>
