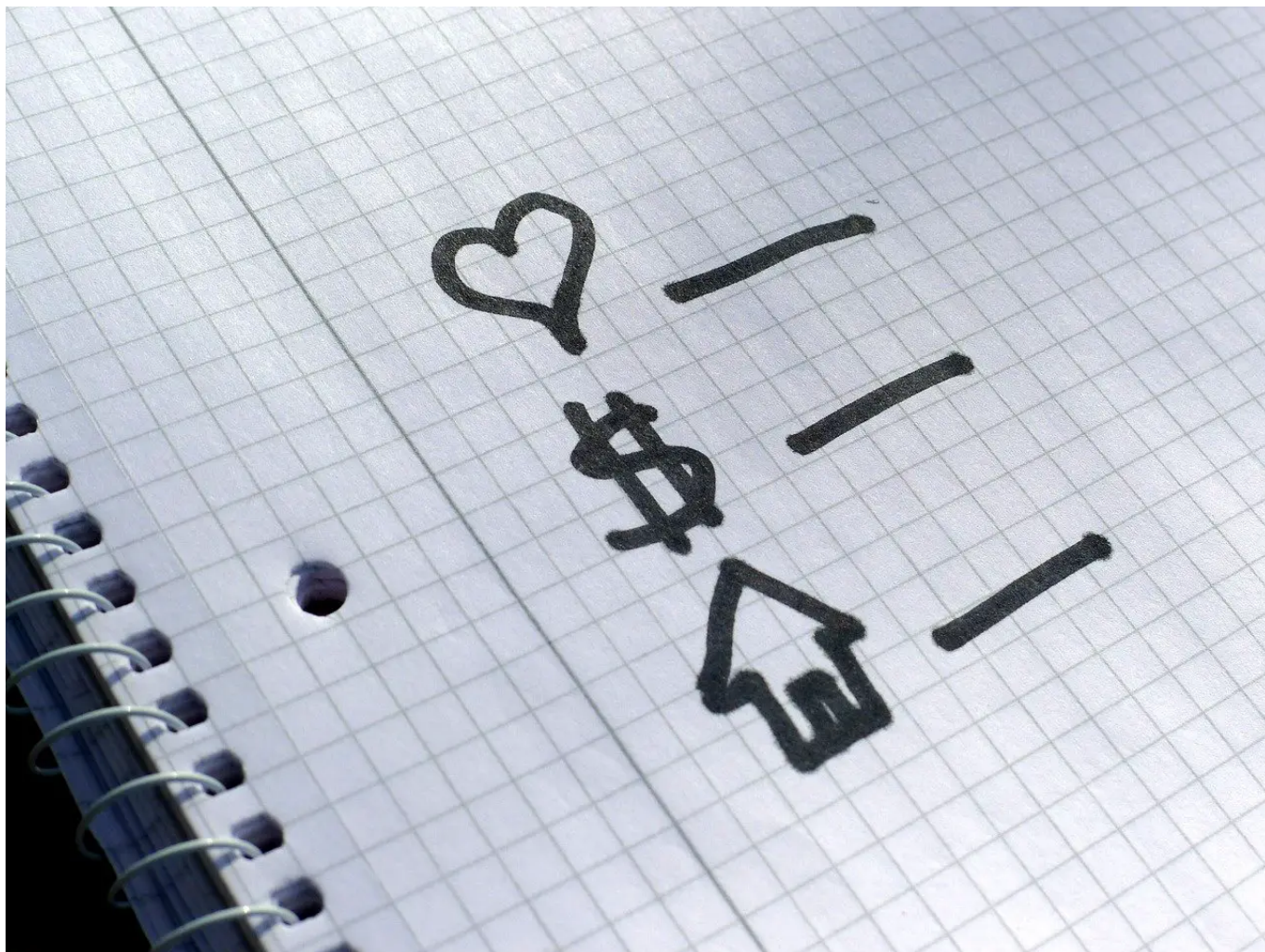

Definitions of "Questionnaire" as a noun

- *A form containing a set of questions; submitted to people to gain statistical information.*
- *A set of printed or written questions with a choice of answers, devised for the purposes of a survey or statistical study.*

exam

A set of questions or exercises evaluating skill or knowledge.
*He was likely to fail his **exams** again.*

examination

The action or process of conducting an examination.
*He scraped through the **examinations** at the end of his first year.*

form

A set order of words a formula.
*They both had **form**.*

opinion poll

A vague idea in which some confidence is placed.

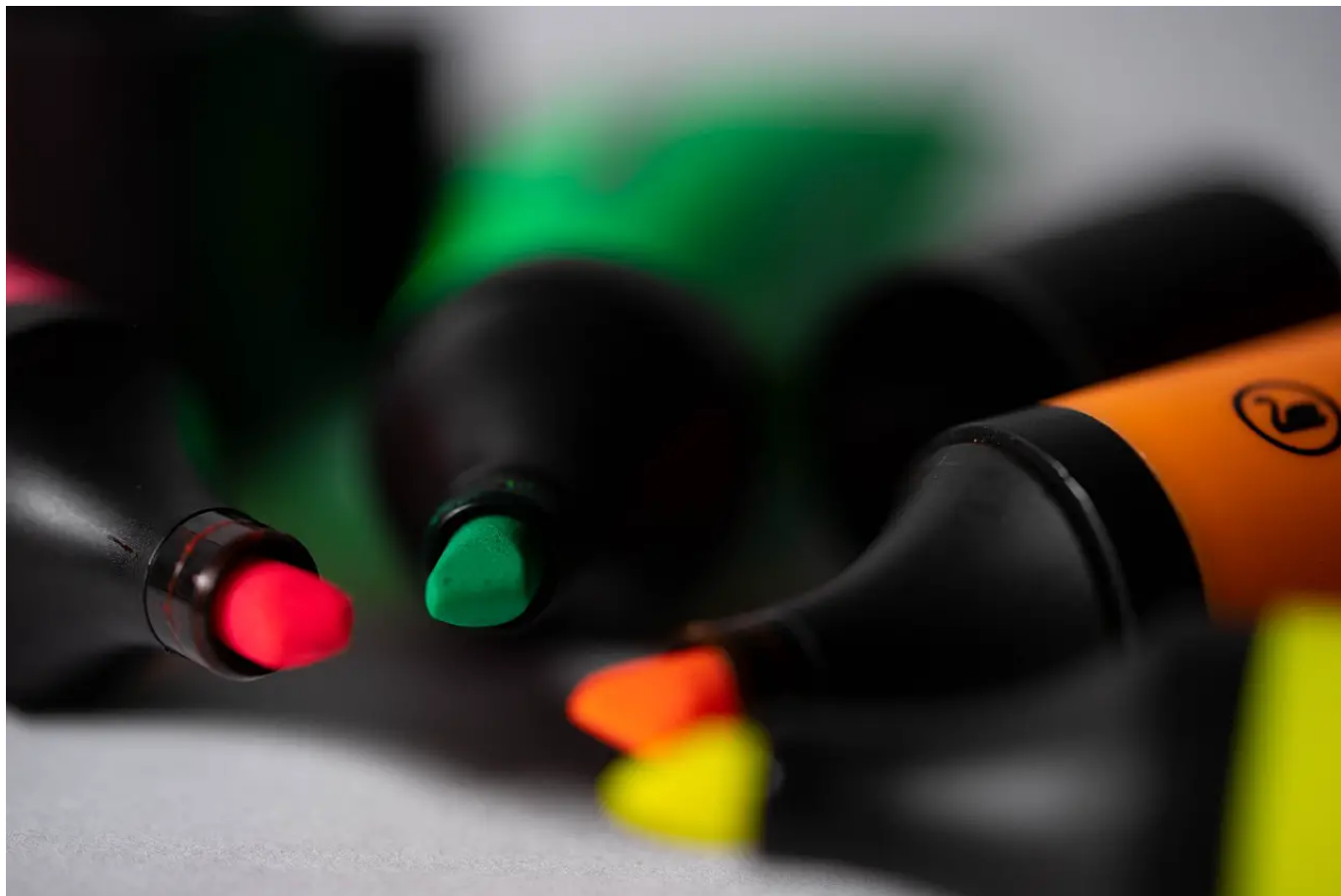
question sheet

Uncertainty about the truth or factuality or existence of something.

quiz

A test of knowledge, especially as a competition between individuals or teams as a form of entertainment.
*A pub **quiz**.*

set of questions	The act of putting something in position.
survey form	The act of looking or seeing or observing.
	The act of undergoing testing.
test	<i>When the test was stolen the professor had to make a new set of questions.</i>



Associations of "Questionnaire" (30 Words)

albedo	The proportion of the incident light or radiation that is reflected by a surface, typically that of a planet or moon. <i>The lunar maria have a lower albedo than the surrounding terrain.</i>
answer	Give the correct answer or solution to. <i>Answer a question.</i>
answering	Replying. <i>An answering glance.</i>
<u>appellant</u>	The party who appeals a decision of a lower court.

checklist	A list of items (names or tasks etc.) to be checked or consulted.
data	A collection of facts from which conclusions may be drawn. <i>Statistical data.</i>
demographic	Relating to the structure of populations. <i>The demographic trend is towards an older population.</i>
examination	The action or process of conducting an examination. <i>An examination of marketing behaviour.</i>
inquire	Inquire about. <i>Annie inquired after her parents.</i>
inquiry	A systematic investigation of a matter of public interest. <i>New areas of inquiry emerged in the course of the conference.</i>
interrogative	Relating to verbs in the so called interrogative mood. <i>A hard interrogative stare.</i>
interrogatory	Relating to the use of or having the nature of an interrogation. <i>She abandoned her interrogatory monologue.</i>
labile	Easily broken down or displaced. <i>An emotionally labile person.</i>
poll	Convert into a pollard. <i>There were some beautiful willows and now the idiot Parson has polled them into wretched stumps.</i>
pollster	A person who conducts or analyses opinion polls. <i>A pollster conducts public opinion polls.</i>
query	Ask a question about something, especially in order to express one's doubts about it or to check its validity or accuracy. <i>I rang the water company to query my bill.</i>
react	Show a response or a reaction to something. <i>The hydrogen and the oxygen react.</i>
reactive	Showing a response to a stimulus. <i>A proactive rather than a reactive approach.</i>
reconnaissance	The act of reconnoitring (especially to gain information about an enemy or potential enemy). <i>Conducting client reconnaissance.</i>
reconnoiter	Explore, often with the goal of finding something or somebody.
reexamine	Look at again; examine again.
rejoinder	A defendant's answer to the plaintiff's reply or replication. <i>It brought a sharp rejoinder from the teacher.</i>

reply	A statement either spoken or written that is made to reply to a question or request or criticism or accusation. <i>He was gone before we could reply to his last remark.</i>
<u>respond</u>	Respond favorably or as hoped. <i>To partner s opening one heart it is dangerous to respond two clubs.</i>
respondent	The codefendant especially in a divorce proceeding who is accused of adultery with the correspondent. <i>The respondent defendant.</i>
<u>responsive</u>	Responding readily and with interest. <i>A flexible service that is responsive to changing social patterns.</i>
review	Hold a review of troops. <i>All areas of the company will come under review.</i>
riposte	A quick, clever reply to an insult or criticism. <i>You ve got a strange sense of honour Grant riposted.</i>
statistic	A datum that can be represented numerically. <i>The statistics show that the crime rate has increased.</i>
<u>survey</u>	Make a survey of for statistical purposes. <i>I surveyed the options.</i>
