An independent variable associated with a function or proposition and determining its value For example in the expression $y = F(x)$ the arguments of the function F are x and x and the value is y .
*There was some **argument** about the decision.*

cavil	An evasion of the point of an argument by raising irrelevant distinctions or objections.
<u>dodge</u>	An elaborate or deceitful scheme contrived to deceive or evade. <i>The grant system's widespread use as a tax dodge.</i>
evasion	The act of physically escaping from something (an opponent or a pursuer or an unpleasant situation) by some adroit maneuver. <i>The protestations and evasions of a witness.</i>
exception	A deliberate act of omission. <i>All her children were brilliant the only exception was her last child.</i>
grouse	The flesh of the grouse as food.
<u>grumble</u>	A complaint. <i>The main grumble is that he spends too much time away.</i>
minor criticism	A young person of either sex.
moan	A sound resembling a human moan. <i>There were moans about the car's feeble ventilation.</i>
<u>protest</u>	The act of protesting a public often organized manifestation of dissent. <i>A protest march.</i>
<u>query</u>	An instance of questioning. <i>If you have any queries please telephone our office.</i>
quiddity	The inherent nature or essence of someone or something. <i>His quirks and quiddities.</i>

Definitions of "Quibble" as a verb

- *Evade the truth of a point or question by raising irrelevant objections.*
- *Argue over petty things.*
- *Argue or raise objections about a trivial matter.*

Synonyms of "Quibble" as a verb (18 Words)

avoid the issue	Refrain from doing something.
be ambiguous	Work in a specific place, with a specific subject, or in a specific function.
be evasive	Be identical to; be someone or something.
bicker	Argue over petty things. <i>Couples who bicker over who gets what from the divorce.</i>
brabble	Argue over petty things.
carp about	Raise trivial objections.
cavil at	Raise trivial objections.
complain about	Express complaints, discontent, displeasure, or unhappiness.
<u>equivocate</u>	Be deliberately ambiguous or unclear in order to mislead or withhold information. <i>The government have equivocated too often in the past.</i>
find fault with	Decide on and make a declaration about.
fudge	Adjust or manipulate (facts or figures) so as to present a desired picture. <i>The authorities have fudged the issue.</i>
hedge	Enclose or bound in with or as it with a hedge or hedges. <i>The animals were hedged in.</i>
object to	Express or raise an objection or protest or criticism or express dissent.
pettifog	Quibble about petty points. <i>He will rather pettifog and turn common barrator than be out of employment.</i>
prevaricate	Speak or act in an evasive way. <i>He seemed to prevaricate when journalists asked pointed questions.</i>
raise trivial objections to	Bid (one's partner's suit) at a higher level.
squabble	Quarrel noisily over a trivial matter. <i>The boys were squabbling over a ball.</i>

Usage Examples of "Quibble" as a verb

- *They are always quibbling about the amount they are prepared to pay.*

- *Let's not quibble over pennies.*

Associations of "Quibble" (30 Words)

altercation	A noisy argument or disagreement, especially in public. <i>I had an altercation with the ticket collector.</i>
argue	Present reasons and arguments. <i>Sociologists argue that inequalities in industrial societies are being reduced.</i>
bicker	(of a flame or light) flash, gleam, or flicker. <i>Couples who bicker over who gets what from the divorce.</i>
brawl	A noisy fight in a crowd. <i>A street brawl.</i>
bustle	Move in an energetic and busy manner. <i>The cheerleaders bustled about excitingly before their performance.</i>
cavil	A petty or unnecessary objection. <i>They cavilled at the cost.</i>
<u>cohere</u>	Form a unified whole. <i>Religion can cohere social groups.</i>
<u>commotion</u>	A disorderly outburst or tumult. <i>She was distracted by a commotion across the street.</i>
confuse	Make (someone) bewildered or perplexed. <i>A lot of people confuse a stroke with a heart attack.</i>
debate	Argue about (a subject), especially in a formal manner. <i>He debated whether he should leave the matter alone or speak to her.</i>
<u>disagree</u>	Have or express a different opinion. <i>The sea crossing disagreed with her.</i>
<u>dissent</u>	The act of protesting a public often organized manifestation of dissent. <i>Dissent to the laws of the country.</i>
fight	The inclination or ability to fight or struggle. <i>Siblings are always fighting.</i>
flurry	Move in an agitated or confused manner. <i>There was a brief flurry of activity in the hall.</i>
<u>flutter</u>	An act of fluttering. <i>A couple of butterflies fluttered around the garden.</i>
<u>fuss</u>	A protest or dispute of a specified degree or kind. <i>He didn't want to make a fuss.</i>

logic	The system of operations performed by a computer that underlies the machine's representation of logical operations. <i>Aristotelian logic.</i>
nitpick	Engage in fussy or pedantic fault-finding. <i>The state is nitpicking about minor administrative matters.</i> Anxiety; mental uneasiness.
perturbation	<i>The term distress connotes some degree of perturbation and emotional upset.</i>
<u>quarrel</u>	Have a disagreement over something. <i>Some people quarrel with this approach.</i>
rash	Marked by defiant disregard for danger or consequences. <i>A rash of bank robberies.</i>
<u>scholar</u>	A university student holding a scholarship. <i>A phrase borrowed from the Indian scholar Ananda Coomaraswamy.</i>
scuffle	Move in a hurried, confused, or awkward way, making a rustling or shuffling sound. <i>There were minor scuffles with police.</i>
sophism	A clever but false argument, especially one used deliberately to deceive.
sophistry	The use of clever but false arguments, especially with the intention of deceiving. <i>Trying to argue that I had benefited in any way from the disaster was pure sophistry.</i>
<u>spat</u>	A young oyster or other bivalve. <i>Oysters spat.</i>
squabble	A quarrel about petty points. <i>Family squabbles.</i>
tiff	A quarrel about petty points. <i>Joanna had a tiff with her boyfriend.</i>
<u>wrangle</u>	Herd and care for. <i>Wrangle horses.</i>
