- *To a certain or fairly significant extent or degree; fairly.*
- *To the greatest extent; completely.*
- *Actually or truly or to an extreme.*
- *All the way.*
- *Very; really (used as an intensifier).*
- *To the utmost or most absolute extent or degree; absolutely; completely.*
- *To a degree (not used with a negative).*
- *Of an unusually noticeable or exceptional or remarkable kind (not used with a negative).*

fearfully	Dreadfully; extremely. <i>She was fearfully worried for the welfare of her family.</i>
frightfully	Very (used for emphasis). <i>It was frightfully hot.</i>
fully	No less or fewer than (used to emphasize an amount). <i>He didn't fully understand.</i>
immensely	To an exceedingly great extent or degree. <i>Was immensely more important to the project as a scientist than as an administrator.</i>
in all respects	To or toward the inside of.
in every respect	To or toward the inside of.
moderately	To a moderately sufficient extent or degree. <i>The event was moderately successful.</i>
most	Almost. <i>The king cobra is the most dangerous snake.</i>
outright	Without reservation or concealment. <i>Logging has been banned outright.</i>
particularly	Uniquely or characteristically. <i>The team's defence is excellent particularly their two centre backs.</i>
positively	With certainty; so as to leave no room for doubt. <i>Only three drivers tested positively for excess alcohol following accidents in the area.</i>

rather	To some (great or small) extent. <i>I d rather you didn t tell him.</i>
really	Used as intensifiers <i>real</i> is sometimes used informally for <i>really</i> rattling is informal. <i>Really there are only three options.</i>
reasonably	With good sense or in a reasonable or intelligent manner. <i>Ski wear which looks good and is reasonably priced.</i>
relatively	Regarded in comparison with something else rather than absolutely; quite. <i>The situation is relatively calm now.</i>
remarkably	In a way that is worthy of attention. <i>Remarkably she hung on to her job.</i>
slightly	To a small degree; not considerably. <i>Slightly built.</i>
somewhat	To a moderately sufficient extent or degree. <i>A somewhat thicker book.</i>
terribly	In a terrible manner. <i>I m terribly sorry.</i>
thoroughly	Completely and absolutely good is sometimes used informally for thoroughly. <i>He searched the house thoroughly.</i>
to some degree	Imprecise but fairly close to correct.
to some extent	Imprecise but fairly close to correct.
totally	Completely; absolutely. <i>I m sorry I totally didn t mean it.</i>
uncommonly	Exceptionally; very. <i>He is an uncommonly good talker.</i>
utterly	Completely and without qualification; used informally as intensifiers. <i>Utterly miserable.</i>
very	Used as intensifiers; `real` is sometimes used informally for `really`; `rattling` is informal. <i>The river rose very quickly.</i>
wholly	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent <i>whole</i> is often used informally for <i>wholly</i> . <i>The distinction is not wholly clear.</i>
