## Synonyms of "Quote" as a noun (12 Words)

<b>bid</b>	An offer of a price, especially at an auction. <i>A takeover <b>bid</b>.</i>
<b>charge</b>	The price charged for some article or service. <i>A cavalry <b>charge</b>.</i>
<b>citation</b>	An official award (as for bravery or service) usually given as formal public statement. <i>The majority of the <b>citations</b> are to work published during the past twenty years.</i>
<b>cost</b>	Value measured by what must be given or done or undergone to obtain something. <i>Healthcare <b>costs</b>.</i>
<b>estimate</b>	A written statement indicating the likely price that will be charged for specified work or repairs. <i>At a rough <b>estimate</b> staff are recycling a quarter of paper used.</i>

**estimated price** A judgment of the qualities of something or somebody.

**figure** An amount of money.  
*Figure 1 shows an ignition circuit.*

**price** Cost of bribing someone.  
*The parable of the pearl of great **price**.*

**quotation** A passage or expression that is quoted or cited.  
*A great argument with much **quotation** of Darwin.*

**quotation mark** A short note recognizing a source of information or of a quoted passage.  
(in the UK) a tax on commercial land and buildings paid to a local authority; (in Northern Ireland and formerly in the UK) a tax levied on private property.

**rate** *The literacy **rate**.*

**tender** A formal proposal to buy at a specified price.

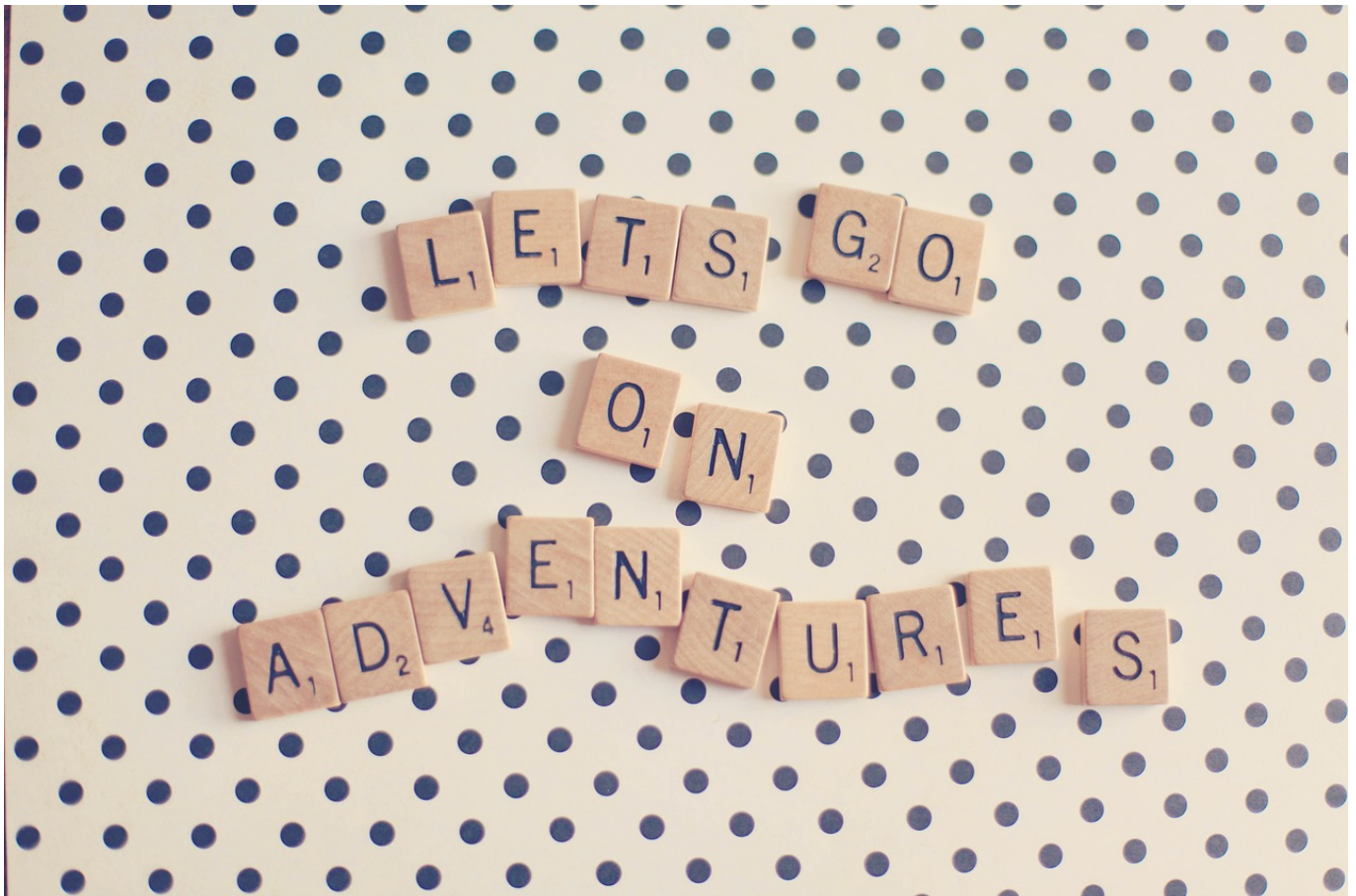
## Quote as a Verb

### Definitions of "Quote" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "quote" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Repeat or copy out (words from a text or speech written or spoken by another person.*
- *Name at (specified odds).*

- Put forward or describe someone or something as being.
- Mention or refer to (someone or something) to provide evidence or authority for a statement or opinion.
- Put quote marks around.
- Repeat a statement by (someone.
- Repeat a passage from.
- Give someone (the estimated price of a job or service.
- Give (a company) a quotation or listing on a stock exchange.
- Name the price of.
- Refer to for illustration or proof.



## Synonyms of "Quote" as a verb (24 Words)

### **bid**

Make a statement during the auction undertaking to make a certain number of tricks with a stated suit as trumps if the bid is successful and one becomes the declarer.

*The prophet **bid** all people to become good persons.*

<b><u>cite</u></b>	Praise (someone, typically a member of the armed forces) in an official report for a courageous act. <i>The writ <b>cited</b> only four of the signatories of the petition.</i>
<b><u>echo</u></b>	Ring or echo with sound. <i>His words <b>echoed</b> John F Kennedy.</i>
<b>estimate</b>	Judge tentatively or form an estimate of quantities or time. <i>I <b>estimate</b> this chicken to weigh three pounds.</i>
<b><u>give</u></b>	Give as a present make a gift of. <i>A dinner <b>given</b> in honour of an American diplomat.</i>
<b>identify</b>	Identify as in botany or biology for example. <i>The men identified themselves as federal police.</i>
<b><u>instance</u></b>	Cite (a fact, case, etc.) as an example. <i>I <b>instanced</b> Bob as someone whose commitment had certainly got things done.</i>
<b>iterate</b>	Perform or utter repeatedly. <i>The bird s call is a monotonously <b>iterated</b> single note.</i>
<b>make reference to</b>	To compose or represent.
<b>mention</b>	Make mention of. <i>His name was <b>mentioned</b> in connection with the invention.</i>
<b><u>name</u></b>	Give a name to. <i>The dead man has been <b>named</b> as John Mackintosh.</i>
<b>offer</b>	Present or proffer something for someone to accept or reject as desired. <i>The hotel <b>offers</b> private meeting rooms.</i>
<b>parrot</b>	Repeat mechanically. <i>Encouraging students to <b>parrot</b> back information.</i>
<b><u>recite</u></b>	Recite in elocution. <i>She <b>recited</b> a poem.</i>
<b>refer to</b>	Use a name to designate.
<b><u>repeat</u></b>	Repeat an earlier theme of a composition. <i>A watch <b>repeater</b> that <b>repeats</b> hours and quarters.</i>
<b>reproduce</b>	Have offspring or produce more individuals of a given animal or plant. <i>These bacteria <b>reproduce</b>.</i>
<b><u>restate</u></b>	To say, state, or perform again. <i>He <b>restated</b> his opposition to abortion.</i>

<b>retell</b>	Render verbally. <i>Walker <b>retells</b> the history of the world from the black perspective.</i>
<b>say again</b>	Report or maintain.
<b>set</b>	Set to a certain position or cause to operate correctly. <i>The ringer gradually increases the swing until the bell is balanced or <b>set</b>.</i>
<u><b>specify</b></u>	Specify as a condition or requirement in a contract or agreement make an express demand or provision in an agreement. <i>The agency failed to <b>specify</b> that the workers were not their employees.</i>
<b>state</b>	Specify the facts of (a case) for consideration. <i>People will be invited to <b>state</b> their views.</i>
<u><b>tender</b></u>	Make tender or more tender as by marinating pounding or applying a tenderizer. <i><b>Tenderize</b> meat.</i>

<b>advert</b>	An advertisement.
<b>aforementioned</b>	Denoting a thing or person previously mentioned. <i>Songs from the <b>aforementioned</b> album.</i>
<b>aforesaid</b>	Being the one previously mentioned or spoken of.
<a href="#">allusion</a>	The practice of making allusions. <i>An <b>allusion</b> to Shakespeare.</i>
<a href="#">annotate</a>	Provide interlinear explanations for words or phrases. <i>The scholar <b>annotated</b> the early edition of a famous novel.</i>

<b>annotation</b>	A comment or instruction (usually added). <i><b>Annotation</b> of prescribed texts.</i>
<b><u>aphorism</u></b>	A short pithy instructive saying. <i>The opening sentence of the first <b>aphorism</b> of Hippocrates.</i>
<b><u>article</u></b>	The definite or indefinite article. <i>He is already in <b>articles</b>.</i>
<b><u>axiom</u></b>	(logic) a proposition that is not susceptible of proof or disproof; its truth is assumed to be self-evident. <i>The <b>axiom</b> that sport builds character.</i>
<b>citation</b>	Thoroughbred that won the triple crown in 1948. <i>This journal contains <b>citations</b> from all jurisdictions.</i>
<b><u>cite</u></b>	Advance evidence for. <i>The writ <b>cited</b> only four of the signatories of the petition.</i>
<b>comment</b>	Turn part of a program into a comment so that the computer ignores it when running the program. <i>The company would not <b>comment</b> on the venture.</i>
<b><u>denote</u></b>	Stand as a name or symbol for. <i>This mark <b>denotes</b> purity and quality.</i>
<b><u>descriptive</u></b>	Describing or classifying in an objective and non-judgemental way. <i>The text contains some good <b>descriptive</b> passages.</i>
<b><u>dictum</u></b>	An opinion voiced by a judge on a point of law not directly bearing on the case in question and therefore not binding. <i>The old <b>dictum</b> might is right.</i>
<b>enunciation</b>	The articulation of speech regarded from the point of view of its intelligibility to the audience.
<b><u>maxim</u></b>	English inventor (born in the United States) who invented the Maxim gun that was used in World War I (1840-1916). <i>The <b>maxim</b> that actions speak louder than words.</i>
<b>mention</b>	Make mention of. <i>His name was <b>mentioned</b> in connection with the invention.</i>
<b>motto</b>	A short sentence or phrase chosen as encapsulating the beliefs or ideals of an individual, family, or institution. <i>The family <b>motto</b> is Faithful though Unfortunate.</i>
<b>notation</b>	A note or annotation. <i>He noticed the <b>notations</b> in the margin.</i>
<b>ostensive</b>	Represented or appearing as such; pretended.

<b>proverb</b>	A short, well-known pithy saying, stating a general truth or piece of advice.
<b>quotation</b>	A passage or expression that is quoted or cited. <i>Ensure you receive a written <b>quotation</b> covering all aspects of the job.</i>
<b><u>refer</u></b>	Of a word phrase or symbol describe or denote have as a referent. <b>Refer</b> a patient to a specialist.
<b>reference</b>	Provide (a book or article) with citations of sources of information. <i>Each chapter should have <b>references</b> to books covering the subject in greater depth.</i>
<b>remark</b>	Make or write a comment on. <i>The judges <b>remarked</b> on the high standard of the entries.</i>
<b>saying</b>	A word or phrase that particular people use in particular situations. <i>This is stated in the <b>sayings</b> of the Prophet.</i>
<b><u>specify</u></b>	Specify as a condition or requirement in a contract or agreement make an express demand or provision in an agreement. <i>The coup leader promised an election but did not <b>specify</b> a date.</i>
<b>tin</b>	A vessel box can pan etc made of tinfoil and used mainly in baking. <i>The copper pans are <b>tinned</b> inside.</i>
