### Definitions of "Rabbit" as a noun

- *A runner who acts as pacesetter in the first laps of a race.*
- *A hare.*
- *The fur of the rabbit.*
- *The fur of a rabbit.*
- *The flesh of the rabbit as food.*
- *Any of various burrowing animals of the family Leporidae having long ears and short tails; some domesticated and raised for pets or food.*
- *Flesh of any of various rabbits or hares (wild or domesticated) eaten as food.*

- A gregarious burrowing plant-eating mammal, with long ears, long hind legs, and a short tail.

- consultation** The act of referring or consulting.  
***Consultations** between all sections of the party.*
- cony** Any of various burrowing animals of the family Leporidae having long ears and short tails; some domesticated and raised for pets or food.

<b>dialogue</b>	A conversation between two or more people as a feature of a book, play, or film. <i>The book consisted of a series of <b>dialogues</b>.</i>
<b>discussion</b>	A detailed treatment of a topic in speech or writing. <i>The book contains an excellent <b>discussion</b> of modal logic.</i>
<b>exchange</b>	A move or short sequence of moves in which both players capture material of comparable value or particularly the exchange in which one captures a rook in return for a knight or bishop. <i>Deductible losses on sales or <b>exchanges</b> of property are allowable.</i>
<b>gossip</b>	A person given to gossiping and divulging personal information about others. <i>The divorce caused much <b>gossip</b>.</i>
<b>hare</b>	A dummy hare propelled around the track in greyhound racing.
<b>head-to-head</b>	The pressure exerted by a fluid.
<b>heart-to-heart</b>	A playing card in the major suit that has one or more red hearts on it.
<b>lapin</b>	The fur of a rabbit.
<b>parley</b>	A conference between opposing sides in a dispute, especially a discussion of terms for an armistice. <i>A <b>parley</b> is in progress and the invaders may withdraw.</i>
<b>talk</b>	Discussion talk about is a less formal alternative for discussion of. <i>There is <b>talk</b> of an armistice.</i>
<b>tête-à-tête</b>	A private conversation between two people.

- *Hunt rabbits.*
- *Move quickly; run away.*



## Synonyms of "Rabbit" as a verb (14 Words)

<b>babble</b>	Utter something rapidly and incoherently. <i>He <b>babbled</b> to another convict while he was in jail.</i>
<b>chatter</b>	Make noise as if chattering away. <i>She was <b>chattering</b> about her holiday.</i>
<b><u>converse</u></b>	Carry on a conversation. <i>She was withdrawn and preoccupied hardly able to <b>converse</b> with her mother.</i>
<b>engage in conversation</b>	Consume all of one's attention or time.
<b>go on</b>	Begin or set in motion.
<b>gossip</b>	Engage in gossip. <i>They would start <b>gossiping</b> about her as soon as she left.</i>
<b>have a conversation</b>	Undergo (as of injuries and illnesses).

<b>jabber</b>	Talk in a rapid, excited, and often incomprehensible way. <i>He <b>jabbered</b> on about football.</i>
<b>prate</b>	Speak (about unimportant matters) rapidly and incessantly. <i>I heard him <b>prate</b> on for at least an hour and a half.</i>
<b>prattle</b>	Speak (about unimportant matters) rapidly and incessantly. <i>She began to <b>prattle</b> on about her visit to the dentist.</i>
<b>run on</b>	Move about freely and without restraint, or act as if running around in an uncontrolled way.
<b>speak</b>	Give a speech to. <i>Insufficient air circulates for the pipes to <b>speak</b>.</i>
<b>talk</b>	Persuade or cause someone to do something by talking. <i>You ll have the whole school <b>talking</b>.</i>
<b>tittle-tattle</b>	Speak (about unimportant matters) rapidly and incessantly.



## Usage Examples of "Rabbit" as a verb

- *He rabbited as soon as he saw us coming.*
- *Stop rabbiting on, will you, and go to bed!*
- *Locate the area where you can go rabbiting.*

- boar**      The flesh of the wild boar as food.
- buck**      Of a horse to perform a buck.  
*A **buck** private.*
- burrow**      Hide underneath or press close to something.  
*Moles **burrowing** away underground.*
- cat**      Feline mammal usually having thick soft fur and no ability to roar domestic cats wildcats.  
*His mother called me an old **cat**.*



<b>coyote</b>	Small wolf native to western North America. <i>At the bus station there were <b>coyotes</b> offering to drive us to Los Angeles.</i>
<b>deer</b>	Distinguished from Bovidae by the male's having solid deciduous antlers.
<b>doe</b>	A female hare, rabbit, rat, ferret, or kangaroo. <i><b>Doe</b> rabbits.</i>
<b>dog</b>	Used in names of dogfishes e.g. sandy dog spur dog. <i>Your historian is a dull <b>dog</b>.</i>
<b>ferret</b>	Hunt with ferrets. <i>She had the ability to <b>ferret</b> out the facts.</i>
<b>fox</b>	The fur of a fox. <i>The abbreviation <b>foxed</b> me completely.</i>
<b>hare</b>	Run quickly like a hare. <i>He <b>hared</b> down the hill.</i>
<b>kangaroo</b>	A large plant-eating marsupial with a long powerful tail and strongly developed hindlimbs that enable it to travel by leaping, found only in Australia and New Guinea.
<b>mammal</b>	A warm-blooded vertebrate animal of a class that is distinguished by the possession of hair or fur, females that secrete milk for the nourishment of the young, and (typically) the birth of live young.
<b>marmot</b>	A heavily built, gregarious burrowing rodent of mountainous country in both Eurasia and North America.
<b>marsupial</b>	Relating to the marsupials.
<b>mole</b>	The molecular weight of a substance expressed in grams the basic unit of amount of substance adopted under the Systeme International d Unites. <i>A well placed <b>mole</b> was feeding them the names of operatives.</i>
<b>mouse</b>	In general use any small mammal similar to a mouse such as a shrew or vole. <i>A <b>mouse</b> takes much more room than a trackball.</i>
<b>munch</b>	A large bite. <i>Russell <b>munched</b> his breakfast toast.</i>
<b>pouched</b>	Having a pouch.
<b>raccoon</b>	An omnivorous nocturnal mammal native to North America and Central America.
<b>rat</b>	Hunt or kill rats. <i>Kill the <b>rat</b>.</i>
<b>rodent</b>	Relatively small placental mammals having a single pair of constantly growing incisor teeth specialized for gnawing.

- shrew** A small insectivorous mammal resembling a mouse, with a long pointed snout and tiny eyes.  
*Hold your nagging tongue you miserable old **shrew**.*
- snowman** A representation of a human figure created with compressed snow.
- sow** Plant (a piece of land) with seed.  
*The field used to be **sown** with oats.*
- squirrel** The fur of the squirrel.  
*They were **squirrelling** around in the woods in search of something.*
- tortoise** A slow-moving typically herbivorous land reptile of warm climates, enclosed in a scaly or leathery domed shell into which it can retract its head and thick legs.
- warren** An enclosed piece of land set aside for breeding game, especially rabbits.  
*A **warren** of narrow gas lit streets.*
- wolf** Used in names of mammals similar or related to the wolf e.g maned wolf  
Tasmanian wolf.  
*The teenager **wolfed** down the pizza.*
