<b>extreme</b>	Not usual; exceptional. <i>In <b>extreme</b> cases the soldier may be discharged.</i>
<b>extremist</b>	(used of opinions and actions) far beyond the norm. <i><b>Extremist</b> political views.</i>
<b>fanatic</b>	Marked by excessive enthusiasm for and intense devotion to a cause or idea. <i>His eyes had a <b>fanatic</b> iciness.</i>
<b>fanatical</b>	Filled with excessive and single-minded zeal. <i>Her husband was <b>fanatical</b> about tidiness.</i>

<b><u>fervent</u></b>	Having or displaying a passionate intensity. <i>The <b>fervent</b> heat merely communicated a genial warmth to their half torpid systems.</i>
<b>hydrophobic</b>	Of or suffering from hydrophobia.
<b>mad</b>	Affected with madness or insanity. <i><b>Mad</b> at his friend.</i>
<b><u>maniacal</u></b>	Suffering from mania. <i>A <b>maniacal</b> dictator.</i>
<b><u>overzealous</u></b>	Marked by excessive enthusiasm for and intense devotion to a cause or idea. <i>He s been <b>overzealous</b> in handing out parking tickets.</i>
<b>passionate</b>	Arising from intense feelings of sexual love. <i>He s <b>passionate</b> about football.</i>
<b><u>uncompromising</u></b>	Showing an unwillingness to make concessions to others, especially by changing one's ways or opinions. <i>The <b>uncompromising</b> ugliness of the era s buildings.</i>
<b>violent</b>	Marked by extreme intensity of emotions or convictions inclined to react violently fervid. <i>Her dress was a <b>violent</b> red.</i>
<b>wild</b>	Produced from wild animals or plants without cultivation. <i><b>Wild</b> geese.</i>

<b>enthusiastically</b>	In a way that shows intense and eager enjoyment, interest, or approval. <i>The audience applauded <b>enthusiastically</b>.</i>
<b>fanatic</b>	A person motivated by irrational enthusiasm (as for a cause). <i>His eyes had a <b>fanatic</b> iciness.</i>
<b>fanaticism</b>	Excessive intolerance of opposing views. <i>The dangers of religious <b>fanaticism</b>.</i>
<b>frantic</b>	Marked by uncontrolled excitement or emotion. <i><b>Frantic</b> attempts to resuscitate the girl.</i>
<b>frenetic</b>	Excessively agitated; distraught with fear or other violent emotion. <i><b>Frenetic</b> screams followed the accident.</i>
<b>frenzied</b>	Affected with or marked by frenzy or mania uncontrolled by reason. <i>A <b>frenzied</b> look in his eye.</i>
<b>frenzy</b>	State of violent mental agitation. <i>Doreen worked herself into a <b>frenzy</b> of rage.</i>
<b>fury</b>	A feeling of intense anger. <i>Rachel shouted beside herself with <b>fury</b>.</i>
<b>hysteria</b>	An old-fashioned term for a psychological disorder characterized by conversion of psychological stress into physical symptoms (somatization) or a change in self-awareness (such as a fugue state or selective amnesia). <i>The anti Semitic <b>hysteria</b> of the 1890s.</i>
<b>impassioned</b>	Characterized by intense emotion. <i>She made an <b>impassioned</b> plea for help.</i>
<b>lunatic</b>	Insane and believed to be affected by the phases of the moon. <i>A ward of <b>lunatic</b> old ladies.</i>
<b>mania</b>	Mental illness marked by periods of great excitement or euphoria, delusions, and overactivity. <i>He had a <b>mania</b> for automobiles.</i>

<b>manic</b>	(in psychiatry) relating to or affected by mania. <i>Manic patients.</i>
<b>overwrought</b>	Deeply agitated especially from emotion. <i>She was too <b>overwrought</b> to listen to reason.</i>
<b>passionate</b>	Having, showing, or caused by strong feelings or beliefs. <i>A <b>passionate</b> kiss.</i>
<b>psychosis</b>	Any severe mental disorder in which contact with reality is lost or highly distorted. <i>The symptoms of <b>psychosis</b>.</i>
<b>rampage</b>	Act violently, recklessly, or destructively. <i>Youths went on the <b>rampage</b> and wrecked a classroom.</i>
<b>raving</b>	In a raving manner. <i><b>Raving</b> mad.</i>
<b>schizophrenia</b>	Any of several psychotic disorders characterized by distortions of reality and disturbances of thought and language and withdrawal from social contact. <i>Gibraltar's <b>schizophrenia</b> continues to be fed by colonial pride.</i>
<b>wild</b>	In a wild or undomesticated manner. <i>Edible <b>wild</b> plants.</i>
<b>zealot</b>	A fervent and even militant proponent of something.
<b>zealotry</b>	Excessive intolerance of opposing views. <i>He expressed concern about religious <b>zealotry</b> playing an increasing role in politics.</i>
<b>zealous</b>	Marked by active interest and enthusiasm. <i>The council was extremely <b>zealous</b> in the application of the regulations.</i>
