- *Marked by excessive enthusiasm for and intense devotion to a cause or idea.*

- *Of or infected by rabies.*



Synonyms of "Rabid" as an adjective (13 Words)

extreme	Not usual; exceptional. <i>In extreme cases the soldier may be discharged.</i>
<u>extremist</u>	(used of opinions and actions) far beyond the norm. <i>Extremist political views.</i>
fanatic	Marked by excessive enthusiasm for and intense devotion to a cause or idea. <i>His eyes had a fanatic iciness.</i>
fanatical	Filled with excessive and single-minded zeal. <i>Her husband was fanatical about tidiness.</i>

<u>fervent</u>	Having or displaying a passionate intensity. <i>The fervent heat merely communicated a genial warmth to their half torpid systems.</i>
hydrophobic	Of or suffering from hydrophobia.
mad	Affected with madness or insanity. <i>Mad at his friend.</i>
<u>maniacal</u>	Suffering from mania. <i>A maniacal dictator.</i>
<u>overzealous</u>	Marked by excessive enthusiasm for and intense devotion to a cause or idea. <i>He s been overzealous in handing out parking tickets.</i>
passionate	Arising from intense feelings of sexual love. <i>He s passionate about football.</i>
<u>uncompromising</u>	Showing an unwillingness to make concessions to others, especially by changing one's ways or opinions. <i>The uncompromising ugliness of the era s buildings.</i>
violent	Marked by extreme intensity of emotions or convictions inclined to react violently fervid. <i>Her dress was a violent red.</i>
wild	Produced from wild animals or plants without cultivation. <i>Wild geese.</i>

<u>acute</u>	Denoting or designed for patients with an acute form of a disease. <i>The acute phase of the illness.</i>
<u>ardent</u>	Burning; glowing. <i>Ardent revolutionaries.</i>
crazy	Possessed by inordinate excitement. <i>A crazy scheme.</i>

delirium	Wild excitement or ecstasy. <i>A chorus of delirium from the terrace.</i>
enthusiasm	Something that arouses enthusiasm. <i>Enthusiasm for his program is growing.</i>

fanatic	A person motivated by irrational enthusiasm (as for a cause). <i>His eyes had a fanatic iciness.</i>
fanaticism	Excessive intolerance of opposing views. <i>The dangers of religious fanaticism.</i>
frantic	Marked by uncontrolled excitement or emotion. <i>Frantic attempts to resuscitate the girl.</i>
frenetic	Excessively agitated; distraught with fear or other violent emotion. <i>Frenetic screams followed the accident.</i>
frenzied	Affected with or marked by frenzy or mania uncontrolled by reason. <i>A frenzied look in his eye.</i>
frenzy	State of violent mental agitation. <i>Doreen worked herself into a frenzy of rage.</i>
fury	A feeling of intense anger. <i>Rachel shouted beside herself with fury.</i>
hysteria	An old-fashioned term for a psychological disorder characterized by conversion of psychological stress into physical symptoms (somatization) or a change in self-awareness (such as a fugue state or selective amnesia). <i>The anti Semitic hysteria of the 1890s.</i>
impassioned	Characterized by intense emotion. <i>She made an impassioned plea for help.</i>
lunatic	Insane and believed to be affected by the phases of the moon. <i>A ward of lunatic old ladies.</i>
mania	Mental illness marked by periods of great excitement or euphoria, delusions, and overactivity. <i>He had a mania for automobiles.</i>

manic	(in psychiatry) relating to or affected by mania. <i>Manic patients.</i>
overwrought	Deeply agitated especially from emotion. <i>She was too overwrought to listen to reason.</i>
passionate	Having, showing, or caused by strong feelings or beliefs. <i>A passionate kiss.</i>
psychosis	Any severe mental disorder in which contact with reality is lost or highly distorted. <i>The symptoms of psychosis.</i>
rampage	Act violently, recklessly, or destructively. <i>Youths went on the rampage and wrecked a classroom.</i>
raving	In a raving manner. <i>Raving mad.</i>
schizophrenia	Any of several psychotic disorders characterized by distortions of reality and disturbances of thought and language and withdrawal from social contact. <i>Gibraltar's schizophrenia continues to be fed by colonial pride.</i>
wild	In a wild or undomesticated manner. <i>Edible wild plants.</i>
zealot	A fervent and even militant proponent of something.
zealotry	Excessive intolerance of opposing views. <i>He expressed concern about religious zealotry playing an increasing role in politics.</i>
zealous	Marked by active interest and enthusiasm. <i>The council was extremely zealous in the application of the regulations.</i>
