According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "radical" as a noun can have the following definitions:

- An atom or group of atoms with at least one unpaired electron; in the body it is usually an oxygen molecule that has lost an electron and will stabilize itself by stealing an electron from a nearby molecule.
- The root or base form of a word.



- Two or more atoms bound together as a single unit and forming part of a molecule.
- The form of a word after all affixes are removed.
- A quantity forming or expressed as the root of another.
- (mathematics) a quantity expressed as the root of another quantity.
- (linguistics) the form of a word after all affixes are removed.
- A character conveying the lexical meaning of a logogram.
- A person who has radical ideas or opinions.
- Any of the basic set of approximately 214 Chinese characters constituting semantically or functionally significant elements in the composition of other characters and used as a means of classifying characters in dictionaries.
- A person who advocates thorough or complete political or social change, or a member of a political party or section of a party pursuing such aims.
- A group of atoms behaving as a unit in a number of compounds.
- (chemistry) two or more atoms bound together as a single unit and forming part of a molecule.
- A quantity expressed as the root of another quantity.

According to the Oxford Dictionary of English, "radical" as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Relating to or forming the root of a number or quantity.*
- Arising from or going to the root or source.
- Advocating or based on thorough or complete political or social change; representing or supporting an extreme or progressive section of a political party.
- Denoting or relating to the roots of a word.
- Characterized by independence of or departure from tradition; innovative or unorthodox.
- Of, or springing direct from, the root or stem base of a plant.
- Belonging to an extreme section of the Liberal party during the 19th century.
- Of or relating to or constituting a linguistic root.
- (used of opinions and actions) far beyond the norm.
