- The root or base form of a word.

- A quantity forming or expressed as the root of another.
- (mathematics) a quantity expressed as the root of another quantity.
- (linguistics) the form of a word after all affixes are removed.
- A character conveying the lexical meaning of a logogram.
- A person who has radical ideas or opinions.
- Any of the basic set of approximately 214 Chinese characters constituting semantically or functionally significant elements in the composition of other characters and used as a means of classifying characters in dictionaries.
- A person who advocates thorough or complete political or social change, or a member of a political party or section of a party pursuing such aims.
- A group of atoms behaving as a unit in a number of compounds.
- (chemistry) two or more atoms bound together as a single unit and forming part of a molecule.
- A quantity expressed as the root of another quantity.
- A radical sign.

### Definitions of "Radical" as an adjective

- Advocating or based on thorough or complete political or social change; representing or supporting an extreme or progressive section of a political party.
- Denoting or relating to the roots of a word.
- Characterized by independence of or departure from tradition; innovative or unorthodox.
- Of, or springing direct from, the root or stem base of a plant.
- Belonging to an extreme section of the Liberal party during the 19th century.

entire	Constituting the undiminished entirety lacking nothing essential especially not damaged Bacon. An <b>entire</b> town devastated by an earthquake.
essential	Absolutely necessary; vitally necessary. It is <b>essential</b> to keep up to date records.

<u>total</u>	Complete in extent or degree and in every particular. A <b>total</b> disaster.

misogynist	Relating to or characteristic of a misogynist. A <b>misogynist</b> attitude.
<u>pacifist</u>	Holding the belief that war and violence are unjustifiable. She was a committed <b>pacifist</b> all her life.
<u>progressive</u>	A progressive tense or aspect. <i>Classic <b>progressive</b> albums.</i>
<u>proletariat</u>	Working-class people regarded collectively (often used with reference to Marxism. <i>The growth of the industrial <b>proletariat</b>.</i>
<u>protest</u>	The act of protesting a public often organized manifestation of dissent. The many <b>protest</b> ations did not stay the execution.
reformer	An apparatus that reforms the molecular structure of hydrocarbons to produce richer fuel. <i>A radical social <b>reformer</b></i> .
