angry	Feeling or showing strong annoyance, displeasure, or hostility; full of anger. <i>Her skin was splotched with angry red burns.</i>
blazing	Without any attempt at concealment; completely obvious. <i>A blazing indiscretion.</i>
blustery	Noisily domineering; tending to browbeat others. <i>A blustery wind was sending flurries of rain against the window.</i>
enraged	Very angry; furious. <i>The enraged bull attached.</i>

excessive	Unrestrained, especially with regard to feelings. <i>He was drinking excessive amounts of brandy.</i>
extreme	Not usual; exceptional. <i>Extreme temperatures.</i>
flaming mad	Very intense.
fuming	Feeling, showing, or expressing great anger. <i>She wrote a fuming letter.</i>
furious	As if showing violent anger. <i>He was furious when he learned about it.</i>
hot	Good. <i>A hot car.</i>
huge	Extremely large; enormous. <i>This could be the start of something huge for you.</i>
incensed	Angered at something unjust or wrong. <i>Incensed at the judges unfairness.</i>
infuriated	Marked by extreme anger. <i>Infuriated onlookers charged the police who were beating the boy.</i>
<u>inordinate</u>	(of a person) unrestrained in feelings or behaviour. <i>A book of inordinate length.</i>
irate	Feeling or showing extreme anger. <i>Irate protesters.</i>
mad	Affected with madness or insanity. <i>It was a mad dash to get ready.</i>
ranting	Speaking at length in an angry and impassioned way. <i>Ranting shock jocks.</i>
raving	Used to emphasize a particular quality. <i>Have you gone raving mad.</i>
<u>seething</u>	Filled with or characterized by intense but unexpressed anger. <i>Lovers and madmen have such seething brains.</i>
<u>severe</u>	Severely simple. <i>The charges would have warranted a severe sentence.</i>
stormy	(especially of weather) affected or characterized by storms or commotion. <i>A long and stormy debate.</i>

strong	Relating to or denoting the strongest of the known kinds of force between particles which acts between nucleons and other hadrons when closer than about 10 cm so binding protons in a nucleus despite the repulsion due to their charge and which conserves strangeness parity and isospin. <i>Sing is a strong verb.</i>
tempestuous	Characterized by strong and turbulent or conflicting emotion. <i>A tempestuous wind.</i>
<u>turbulent</u>	Agitated vigorously; in a state of turbulence. <i>The country's turbulent history.</i>
very great	Being the exact same one; not any other.
violent	Marked by extreme intensity of emotions or convictions inclined to react violently fervid. <i>A violent attack.</i>
wild	Produced from wild animals or plants without cultivation. <i>A wild bullet.</i>
wrathful	Full of or characterized by intense anger. <i>Natural calamities seemed to be the work of a wrathful deity.</i>

acrimonious	Marked by strong resentment or cynicism. <i>An acrimonious dispute about wages.</i>
aggravate	Make (a problem, injury, or offence) worse or more serious. <i>Military action would only aggravate the situation.</i>
aggression	The action of attacking without provocation. <i>His chin was jutting with aggression.</i>
anger	Fill someone with anger provoke anger in. <i>She was angered by his terse answer.</i>
angry	Feeling or showing anger. <i>The wild angry sea.</i>
disaffection	Disloyalty to the government or to established authority. <i>There is growing disaffection with large corporations.</i>
enrage	Put into a rage; make violently angry. <i>The students were enraged at these new rules.</i>
enraged	Marked by extreme anger. <i>The enraged bull attached.</i>
exasperated	Intensely irritated and frustrated. <i>An exasperated expression.</i>
furious	Full of anger or energy; violent or intense. <i>Furious about the accident.</i>
furiously	In an extremely angry manner. <i>I was furiously opposed to the cuts.</i>
fury	A surge of violent anger or other strong feeling. <i>She was paddling with a new fury.</i>
hostility	Violent action that is hostile and usually unprovoked. <i>Their hostility to all outsiders.</i>
indignant	Angered at something unjust or wrong. <i>He was indignant at being the object of suspicion.</i>
inflammatory	Relating to or causing inflammation of a part of the body. <i>Inflammatory diseases.</i>
infuriate	Make (someone) extremely angry and impatient. <i>I was infuriated by your article.</i>
infuriated	Marked by extreme anger. <i>Infuriated onlookers charged the police who were beating the boy.</i>

irate	Feeling or showing extreme anger. <i>Irate protesters.</i>
ire	Anger. <i>The plans provoked the ire of conservationists.</i>
madden	Drive up the wall; go on someone's nerves. <i>His behavior is maddening.</i>
miff	Cause to be annoyed. <i>A doctor might be miffed by claims that the cure had no medical explanation.</i>
<u>outraged</u>	Angered at something unjust or wrong. <i>A look of outraged disbelief.</i>
ramp	Furnish with a ramp. <i>A rule against share price ramping which forbids a broker to account for more than 30 per cent of trading in a share.</i>
rancor	A feeling of deep and bitter anger and ill-will.
rancorous	Characterized by bitterness or resentment. <i>Sixteen miserable months of rancorous disputes.</i>
resentment	A feeling of deep and bitter anger and ill-will. <i>His resentment at being demoted.</i>
seethe	(of a liquid) boil or be turbulent as if boiling. <i>We cascaded down the stairs and seethed across the station.</i>
tantrum	An uncontrolled outburst of anger and frustration, typically in a young child. <i>She threw a tantrum.</i>
<u>temper</u>	Make more temperate acceptable or suitable by adding something else moderate. <i>She tempered her criticism.</i>
<u>wrath</u>	Intense anger (usually on an epic scale). <i>He hid his pipe for fear of incurring his father's wrath.</i>
