### Definitions of "Raging" as an adjective

- *Very severe.*
- *Characterized by violent and forceful activity or movement; very intense.*
- *Continuing with great force or intensity.*



## Synonyms of "Raging" as an adjective (28 Words)

### angry

Feeling or showing strong annoyance, displeasure, or hostility; full of anger.  
*Her skin was splotched with **angry** red burns.*

### blazing

Without any attempt at concealment; completely obvious.  
*A **blazing** indiscretion.*

### blustery

Noisily domineering; tending to browbeat others.  
*A **blustery** wind was sending flurries of rain against the window.*

### enraged

Very angry; furious.  
*The **enraged** bull attached.*

<b>excessive</b>	Unrestrained, especially with regard to feelings. <i>He was drinking <b>excessive</b> amounts of brandy.</i>
<b>extreme</b>	Not usual; exceptional. <i><b>Extreme</b> temperatures.</i>
<b>flaming mad</b>	Very intense.
<b>fuming</b>	Feeling, showing, or expressing great anger. <i>She wrote a <b>fuming</b> letter.</i>
<b>furious</b>	As if showing violent anger. <i>He was <b>furious</b> when he learned about it.</i>
<b>hot</b>	Good. <i>A <b>hot</b> car.</i>
<b>huge</b>	Extremely large; enormous. <i>This could be the start of something <b>huge</b> for you.</i>
<b>incensed</b>	Angered at something unjust or wrong. <i><b>Incensed</b> at the judges unfairness.</i>
<b>infuriated</b>	Marked by extreme anger. <i><b>Infuriated</b> onlookers charged the police who were beating the boy.</i>
<b><u>inordinate</u></b>	(of a person) unrestrained in feelings or behaviour. <i>A book of <b>inordinate</b> length.</i>
<b>irate</b>	Feeling or showing extreme anger. <i><b>Irate</b> protesters.</i>
<b>mad</b>	Affected with madness or insanity. <i>It was a <b>mad</b> dash to get ready.</i>
<b>ranting</b>	Speaking at length in an angry and impassioned way. <i><b>Ranting</b> shock jocks.</i>
<b>raving</b>	Used to emphasize a particular quality. <i>Have you gone <b>raving</b> mad.</i>
<b><u>seething</u></b>	Filled with or characterized by intense but unexpressed anger. <i>Lovers and madmen have such <b>seething</b> brains.</i>
<b><u>severe</u></b>	Severely simple. <i>The charges would have warranted a <b>severe</b> sentence.</i>
<b>stormy</b>	(especially of weather) affected or characterized by storms or commotion. <i>A long and <b>stormy</b> debate.</i>

<b>strong</b>	Relating to or denoting the strongest of the known kinds of force between particles which acts between nucleons and other hadrons when closer than about 10 cm so binding protons in a nucleus despite the repulsion due to their charge and which conserves strangeness parity and isospin. <i>Sing is a <b>strong</b> verb.</i>
<b>tempestuous</b>	Characterized by strong and turbulent or conflicting emotion. <i>A <b>tempestuous</b> wind.</i>
<b><u>turbulent</u></b>	Agitated vigorously; in a state of turbulence. <i>The country's <b>turbulent</b> history.</i>
<b>very great</b>	Being the exact same one; not any other.
<b>violent</b>	Marked by extreme intensity of emotions or convictions inclined to react violently fervid. <i>A <b>violent</b> attack.</i>
<b>wild</b>	Produced from wild animals or plants without cultivation. <i>A <b>wild</b> bullet.</i>
<b>wrathful</b>	Full of or characterized by intense anger. <i>Natural calamities seemed to be the work of a <b>wrathful</b> deity.</i>

## Associations of "Raging" (30 Words)

<b>acrimonious</b>	Marked by strong resentment or cynicism. <i>An <b>acrimonious</b> dispute about wages.</i>
<b>aggravate</b>	Make (a problem, injury, or offence) worse or more serious. <i>Military action would only <b>aggravate</b> the situation.</i>
<b>aggression</b>	The action of attacking without provocation. <i>His chin was jutting with <b>aggression</b>.</i>
<b>anger</b>	Fill someone with anger provoke anger in. <i>She was <b>angered</b> by his terse answer.</i>
<b>angry</b>	Feeling or showing anger. <i>The wild <b>angry</b> sea.</i>
<b>disaffection</b>	Disloyalty to the government or to established authority. <i>There is growing <b>disaffection</b> with large corporations.</i>
<b>enrage</b>	Put into a rage; make violently angry. <i>The students were <b>enraged</b> at these new rules.</i>
<b>enraged</b>	Marked by extreme anger. <i>The <b>enraged</b> bull attached.</i>
<b>exasperated</b>	Intensely irritated and frustrated. <i>An <b>exasperated</b> expression.</i>
<b>furious</b>	Full of anger or energy; violent or intense. <i><b>Furious</b> about the accident.</i>
<b>furiously</b>	In an extremely angry manner. <i>I was <b>furiously</b> opposed to the cuts.</i>
<b>fury</b>	A surge of violent anger or other strong feeling. <i>She was paddling with a new <b>fury</b>.</i>
<b>hostility</b>	Violent action that is hostile and usually unprovoked. <i>Their <b>hostility</b> to all outsiders.</i>
<b>indignant</b>	Angered at something unjust or wrong. <i>He was <b>indignant</b> at being the object of suspicion.</i>
<b>inflammatory</b>	Relating to or causing inflammation of a part of the body. <i><b>Inflammatory</b> diseases.</i>
<b>infuriate</b>	Make (someone) extremely angry and impatient. <i>I was <b>infuriated</b> by your article.</i>
<b>infuriated</b>	Marked by extreme anger. <i><b>Infuriated</b> onlookers charged the police who were beating the boy.</i>



<b>irate</b>	Feeling or showing extreme anger. <i><b>Irate</b> protesters.</i>
<b>ire</b>	Anger. <i>The plans provoked the <b>ire</b> of conservationists.</i>
<b>madden</b>	Drive up the wall; go on someone's nerves. <i>His behavior is <b>maddening</b>.</i>
<b>miff</b>	Cause to be annoyed. <i>A doctor might be <b>miffed</b> by claims that the cure had no medical explanation.</i>
<u><b>outraged</b></u>	Angered at something unjust or wrong. <i>A look of <b>outraged</b> disbelief.</i>
<b>ramp</b>	Furnish with a ramp. <i>A rule against share price <b>ramping</b> which forbids a broker to account for more than 30 per cent of trading in a share.</i>
<b>rancor</b>	A feeling of deep and bitter anger and ill-will.
<b>rancorous</b>	Characterized by bitterness or resentment. <i>Sixteen miserable months of <b>rancorous</b> disputes.</i>
<b>resentment</b>	A feeling of deep and bitter anger and ill-will. <i>His <b>resentment</b> at being demoted.</i>
<b>seethe</b>	(of a liquid) boil or be turbulent as if boiling. <i>We cascaded down the stairs and <b>seethed</b> across the station.</i>
<b>tantrum</b>	An uncontrolled outburst of anger and frustration, typically in a young child. <i>She threw a <b>tantrum</b>.</i>
<u><b>temper</b></u>	Make more temperate acceptable or suitable by adding something else moderate. <i>She <b>tempered</b> her criticism.</i>
<u><b>wrath</b></u>	Intense anger (usually on an epic scale). <i>He hid his pipe for fear of incurring his father's <b>wrath</b>.</i>
