### **Definitions of "Rainbow" as a noun**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “rainbow” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *An arc of colored light in the sky caused by refraction of the sun's rays by rain.*
- *An illusory hope.*
- *A display of the colours of the spectrum produced by dispersion of light.*
- *A wide range of related and typically colourful things.*
- *An arch of colours visible in the sky, caused by the refraction and dispersion of the sun's light by rain or other water droplets in the atmosphere. The colours of the rainbow are generally said to be red, orange, yellow, green, blue, indigo, and violet.*
- *Many-coloured.*

## Associations of "Rainbow" (30 Words)

<b>aurora</b>	A natural electrical phenomenon characterized by the appearance of streamers of reddish or greenish light in the sky especially near the northern or southern magnetic pole The effect is caused by the interaction of charged particles from the sun with atoms in the upper atmosphere In northern and southern regions it is respectively called aurora borealis or Northern Lights and aurora australis or Southern Lights.
<b>azure</b>	Color azure. <i>The <b>azure</b> of the sky.</i>
<b>blue</b>	Heat metal so as to give it a greyish blue finish. <b>Blue</b> blood.
<b>bright</b>	Made smooth and bright by or as if by rubbing reflecting a sheen or glow. <i>The sun was <b>bright</b> and hot.</i>
<b>brighten</b>	Make more cheerful through the use of color. <i>Most of the country should <b>brighten</b> up later.</i>

<b>brilliantly</b>	In an impressive or outstanding way; very well. <i>He seems to be coping <b>brilliantly</b>.</i>
<b>celestial</b>	Belonging or relating to heaven. <i><b>Celestial</b> map.</i>
<b>chandelier</b>	Branched lighting fixture; often ornate; hangs from the ceiling.
<b>colorful</b>	Having color or a certain color; sometimes used in combination. <i><b>Colorful</b> autumn leaves.</i>
<b>cosmic</b>	Relating to the universe or cosmos, especially as distinct from the earth. <i>The <b>cosmic</b> void.</i>
<b>daylight</b>	An appreciable distance or difference between one person or thing and another. <i>She had been up before <b>daylight</b>.</i>
<b>firmament</b>	The heavens or sky. <i>Thunder shakes the <b>firmament</b>.</i>
<b>glimmer</b>	A faint sign of a feeling or quality, especially a desirable one. <i>There is one <b>glimmer</b> of hope for Becky.</i>
<b>glow</b>	Convey deep pleasure through one's expression or bearing. <i>The setting sun cast a deep red <b>glow</b> over the city.</i>
<b>illuminate</b>	Help to clarify or explain. <i>A flash of lightning <b>illuminated</b> the house.</i>
<b>iridescent</b>	Having a play of lustrous rainbow colors. <i>The drake s head has an <b>iridescent</b> purple sheen.</i>
<b>light</b>	The quality of being luminous emitting or reflecting light. <i><b>Light</b> idle chatter.</i>
<b>lighten</b>	Make or become more cheerful or less serious. <i><b>Lighten</b> the burden of caring for her elderly parents.</i>
<b>meteor</b>	A streak of light in the sky at night that results when a meteoroid hits the earth s atmosphere and air friction causes the meteoroid to melt or vaporize or explode.
<b>mirage</b>	Something illusory and unattainable. <i>The hope of sanctuary initially proved a <b>mirage</b>.</i>
<b>overcast</b>	Make overcast or cloudy. <i><b>Overcast</b> books.</i>
<b>polish</b>	A preparation used in polishing. <i>His poetry has clarity and <b>polish</b>.</i>
<b>polychrome</b>	Color with many colors make polychrome. <i>Painters gilded and <b>polychromed</b> the wooden carvings.</i>

- shimmer** Give off a shimmering reflection as of silk.  
*A pale **shimmer** of moonlight.*
- shine** Make a surface shine.  
*His shoes were **shined** to perfection.*
- sky** The atmosphere and outer space as viewed from the earth.  
*Hundreds of stars were shining in the **sky**.*
- spectrum** The components of a sound or other phenomenon arranged according to such characteristics as frequency, charge, and energy.  
*Self help books are covering a broader and broader **spectrum**.*
- stratosphere** The atmospheric layer between the troposphere and the mesosphere.  
*Her next big campaign launched her into the fashion **stratosphere**.*
- weather** Change under the action or influence of the weather.  
*Stone walls provide shelter from wind and **weather**.*
- welkin** The sky or heaven.
