prostrate Lying stretched out on the ground with one's face downwards.

His wife was **prostrate** with shock.

sprawling Spreading out in different directions or distributed irregularly.

The **sprawling** suburbs.

straggling Spreading out in different directions or distributed irregularly.

The **straggling** crowd of refugees.

Growing or spreading sparsely or irregularly.

straggly Straggly hair.

twisting Marked by repeated turns and bends.

twisty

Marked by repeated turns and bends.

Had to steer the car down a **twisty** track.

verbose Using or expressed in more words than are needed.

Much academic language is obscure and **verbose**.

vining (of a plant) growing as a vine with climbing or trailing woody stems.

Of a path e.g.

wandering
His life followed a wandering course.

Following a twisting or spiral course.

winding Winding roads are full of surprises.

wordy
Using or expressed in rather too many words.

Newspapers of the day printed long **wordy** editorials.
