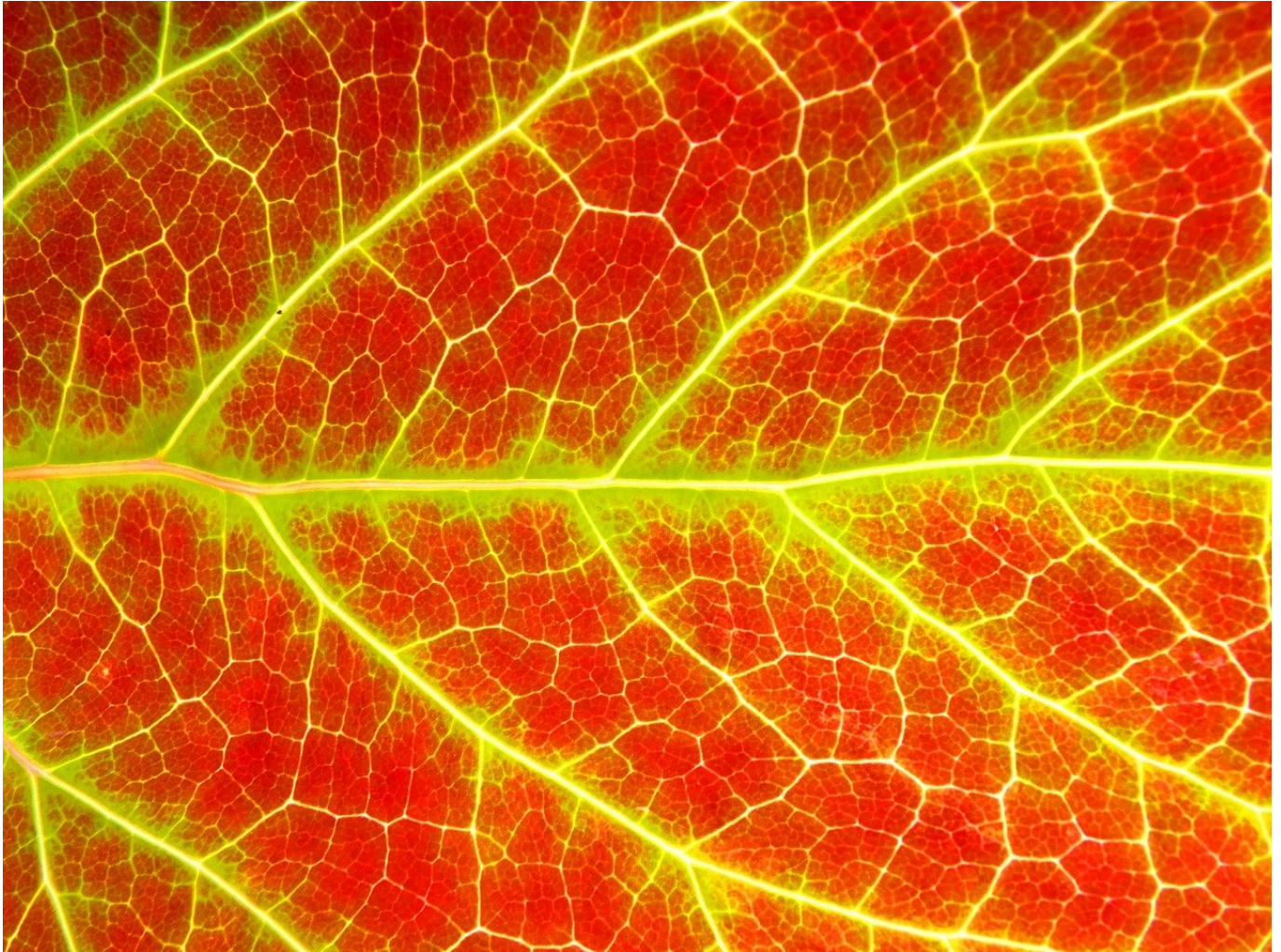

<b>fork</b>	A flash of forked lightning. <i>Turn right at the next <b>fork</b>.</i>
<b>forking</b>	The region of the angle formed by the junction of two branches.
<b>issue</b>	Supplies as food or clothing or ammunition issued by the government. <i>A point of <b>issue</b>.</i>
<b>leg</b>	A structure in animals that is similar to a human leg and used for locomotion. <i>A roast <b>leg</b> of lamb.</i>
<b>outcome</b>	Something that results. <i>It is the <b>outcome</b> of the vote that counts.</i>
<b>result</b>	Something that results. <i>Different approaches have been tried with somewhat mixed <b>results</b>.</i>
<b>sequel</b>	Something that takes place after or as a result of an earlier event. <i>This encouragement to grow potatoes had a disastrous <b>sequel</b> some fifty years later.</i>
<b>upshot</b>	A phenomenon that follows and is caused by some previous phenomenon. <i>The <b>upshot</b> of the meeting was that he was on the next plane to New York.</i>

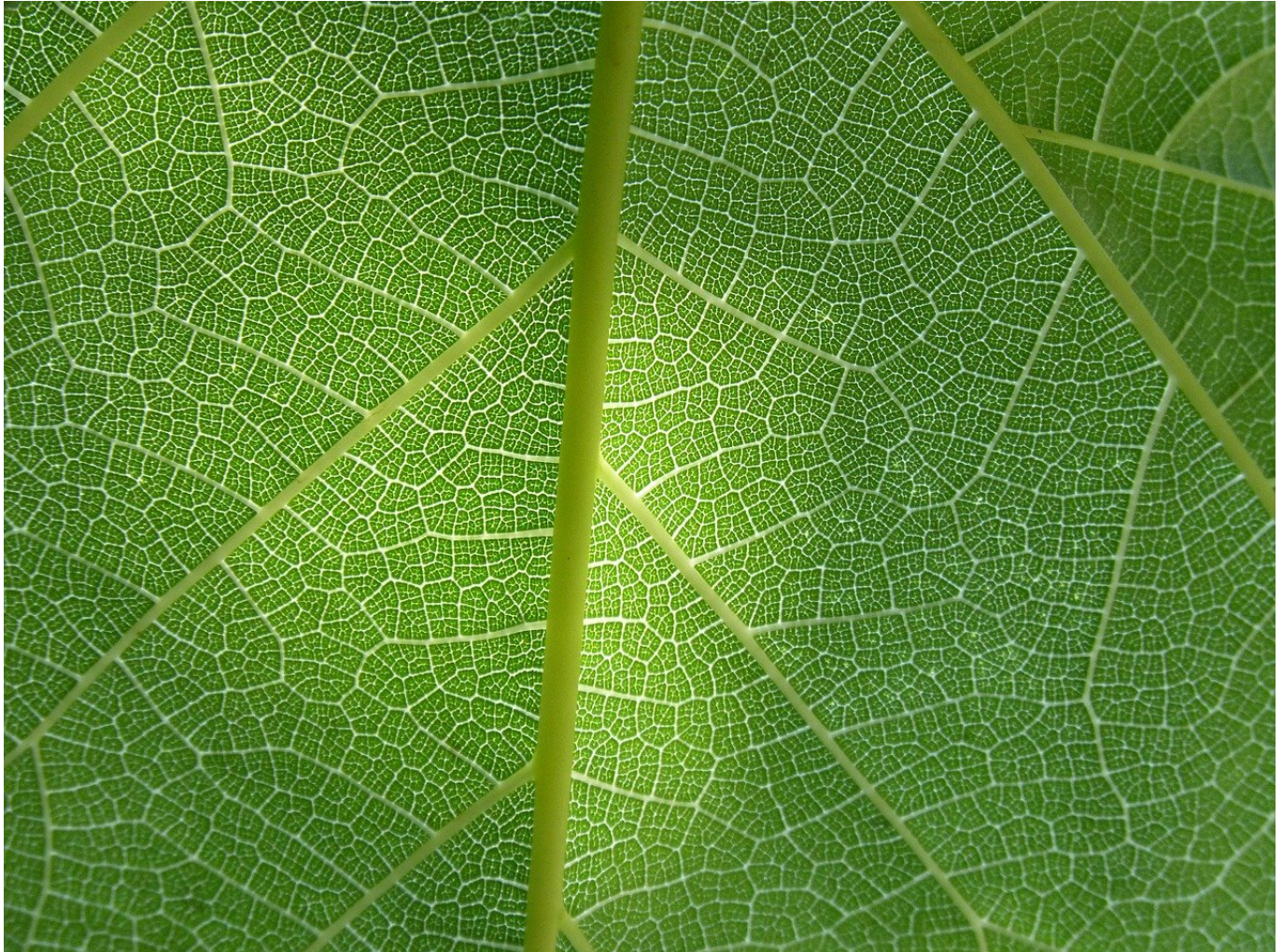




## Usage Examples of "Ramification" as a noun

- *Any change is bound to have legal ramifications.*
- *An extended family with its ramifications of neighbouring in-laws.*

- concluded** Having come or been brought to a conclusion.
- conclusion** A proposition that is reached from given premises.  
*Each research group came to a similar **conclusion**.*
- consequence** A result or effect, typically one that is unwelcome or unpleasant.  
*Many have been laid off from work as a **consequence** of government policies.*

<b>consequent</b>	Logically consistent. <i>You've got a university place <b>consequent</b> on your exam results.</i>
<b><u>consequential</u></b>	Having important issues or results. <i>The year's only really <b>consequential</b> legislation.</i>
<b><u>culminate</u></b>	Bring to a head or to the highest point. <i>Weeks of violence <b>culminated</b> in the brutal murder of a magistrate.</i>
<b>deciding</b>	Having the power or quality of deciding. <i>Cast the <b>deciding</b> vote.</i>
<b><u>decisive</u></b>	Unmistakable. <i>Two factors had a <b>decisive</b> influence.</i>
<b>definitive</b>	A definitive postage stamp. <i>The <b>definitive</b> biography of Prince Charles.</i>
<b><u>dramatic</u></b>	(of a person or their behaviour) intending or intended to create an effect; theatrical. <i>With a <b>dramatic</b> gesture she put a hand to her brow.</i>
<b>effects</b>	Property of a personal character that is portable but not used in business. <i>I watched over their <b>effects</b> until they returned.</i>
<b>ending</b>	The end of a word a suffix or inflectional ending or final morpheme. <i>His death marked the <b>ending</b> of an era.</i>
<b><u>experimentation</u></b>	The action or process of trying out new ideas, methods, or activities. <i>It was a period of innovation and <b>experimentation</b> with new decorative techniques.</i>
<b>leverage</b>	Provide with leverage. <i>Relatively small groups can sometimes exert immense political <b>leverage</b>.</i>
<b>militate</b>	(of a fact or circumstance) be a powerful or conclusive factor in preventing. <i>These fundamental differences will <b>militate</b> against the two communities coming together.</i>
<b>moderating</b>	Lessening in intensity or strength.
<b><u>occurrence</u></b>	The fact of something existing or being found in a place or under a particular set of conditions. <i>A disease of frequent <b>occurrence</b>.</i>
<b>outcome</b>	A phenomenon that follows and is caused by some previous phenomenon. <i>It is the <b>outcome</b> of the vote that counts.</i>



<b>output</b>	The quantity of something (as a commodity) that is created (usually within a given period of time. <i>The <b>output</b> of certain hormones under stress.</i>
<b>perilously</b>	In a dangerous manner. <i>Many came <b>perilously</b> close to starvation.</i>
<b>potentiate</b>	Increase the effect of or act synergistically with (a drug or a physiological or biochemical phenomenon. <i><b>Potentiate</b> the drug.</i>
<b>repercussion</b>	The recoil of something after impact. <i>His declaration had unforeseen <b>repercussions</b>.</i>
<b>result</b>	Have as a result or residue. <i>He listened for the <b>results</b> on the radio.</i>
<b>sequent</b>	In regular succession without gaps. <i>The period of tension and <b>consequent</b> need for military preparedness.</i>
<b>solution</b>	The action of separating or breaking down dissolution. <i>Gum tragacanth in <b>solution</b> is best used thinly on paper.</i>
<b>synergy</b>	The working together of two things (muscles or drugs for example) to produce an effect greater than the sum of their individual effects. <i>The <b>synergy</b> between artist and record company.</i>
<b>upshot</b>	The final or eventual outcome or conclusion of a discussion, action, or series of events. <i>The <b>upshot</b> of the meeting was that he was on the next plane to New York.</i>
<b>wrought</b>	Made or fashioned in the specified way. <i>The <b>wrought</b> silver bracelet.</i>
