*The left **fork** goes on to the village.*

### **forking**

The angle formed by the inner sides of the legs where they join the human trunk.

**leg**

A structure in animals that is similar to a human leg and used for locomotion.

A **leg** injury.

<b>accompanying</b>	Following or accompanying as a consequence. <i>Owning a home brings with it a horde of <b>accompanying</b> expenses.</i>
<b><u>complication</u></b>	Puzzling complexity. <i>There is a <b>complication</b> concerning ownership of the site.</i>
<b><u>concluded</u></b>	Having come or been brought to a conclusion.
<b>conclusion</b>	A proposition that is reached from given premises. <i>The <b>conclusion</b> of the peace treaty.</i>
<b>consequence</b>	Having important effects or influence. <i>That result is of no <b>consequence</b>.</i>
<b>consequent</b>	The second or imitating voice or part in a canon. <i>You've got a university place <b>consequent</b> on your exam results.</i>

<b><u>consequential</u></b>	Having important issues or results. <i>The new congress lacked <b>consequential</b> leaders.</i>
<b><u>culminate</u></b>	End, especially to reach a final or climactic stage. <i>Her book <b>culminated</b> a research project on the symmetry studies of Escher.</i>
<b>deciding</b>	Having the power or quality of deciding. <i>Taxes could be the <b>deciding</b> factor for millions of floating voters.</i>
<b><u>decisive</u></b>	Unmistakable. <i>The archers played a <b>decisive</b> part in the victory.</i>
<b>definitive</b>	A definitive postage stamp. <i>A <b>definitive</b> verdict.</i>
<b><u>dramatic</u></b>	Used of a singer or singing voice that is marked by power and expressiveness and a histrionic or theatrical style. <i><b>Dramatic</b> mountain peaks.</i>
<b>effects</b>	Property of a personal character that is portable but not used in business. <i>I watched over their <b>effects</b> until they returned.</i>
<b>ending</b>	The end of a word a suffix or inflectional ending or final morpheme. <i>The <b>ending</b> of warranty period.</i>
<b><u>experimentation</u></b>	The action or process of trying out new ideas, methods, or activities. <i>Not all <b>experimentation</b> is done in laboratories.</i>
<b>leverage</b>	Provide with leverage. <i>You can <b>leverage</b> your stock portfolio and diversify into real estate.</i>
<b>militate</b>	Have force or influence; bring about an effect or change. <i>These fundamental differences will <b>militate</b> against the two communities coming together.</i>
<b>moderating</b>	Lessening in intensity or strength.
<b><u>occurrence</u></b>	An instance of something occurring. <i>The <b>occurrence</b> of natural gas fields.</i>
<b>outcome</b>	Something that results. <i>It is the <b>outcome</b> of the vote that counts.</i>
<b><u>output</u></b>	The quantity of something (as a commodity) that is created (usually within a given period of time). <i>High voltage <b>output</b> 50 250 amps.</i>
<b>perilously</b>	In a dangerous manner. <i>Many came <b>perilously</b> close to starvation.</i>

<b>potentiate</b>	Increase the power, effect, or likelihood of (something, especially a drug or physiological reaction). <i>The glucose will <b>potentiate</b> intestinal absorption of sodium.</i>
<b>repercussion</b>	A movement back from an impact. <i>The move would have grave <b>repercussions</b> for the entire region.</i>
<b>result</b>	Have as a result or residue. <i>Anger may <b>result</b> from an argument.</i>
<b>sequent</b>	Following or accompanying as a consequence. <i>The period of tension and <b>consequent</b> need for military preparedness.</i>
<b>solution</b>	A homogeneous mixture of two or more substances frequently but not necessarily a liquid solution. <i>They were trying to find a peaceful <b>solution</b>.</i>
<u><b>synergy</b></u>	The interaction or cooperation of two or more organizations, substances, or other agents to produce a combined effect greater than the sum of their separate effects. <i>The <b>synergy</b> between artist and record company.</i>
<b>upshot</b>	A phenomenon that follows and is caused by some previous phenomenon. <i>The <b>upshot</b> of the meeting was that he was on the next plane to New York.</i>
<b>wrought</b>	(of metals) beaten out or shaped by hammering. <i>Well <b>wrought</b> pop music.</i>
