- Having a lush and unchecked growth.
- (of an animal) represented standing on one hind foot with its forefeet in the air (typically in profile, facing the dexter side, with right hind foot and tail raised.
- (of a plant) lush in growth; luxuriant.
- Rearing on left hind leg with forelegs elevated and head usually in profile.
- *Unrestrained in action or performance.*
- Unrestrained and violent.

unchecked (especially of something undesirable) not controlled or restrained.

An unchecked temper.

upended Set or turned on its end or upside down.

An **upended** box.

upright Upright in position or posture.

vertical Relating to the crown of the head.

Strong and active physically or mentally.
