- blah** Pompous or pretentious talk or writing.  
*A case of the **blahs**.*
- bombast** High-sounding language with little meaning, used to impress people.  
*The **bombast** of gung ho militarism.*
- broadside** An advertisement (usually printed on a page or in a leaflet) intended for wide distribution.  
*The ship was **broadside** to the dock.*
- claptrap** Pompous or pretentious talk or writing.  
*Such sentiments are just pious **claptrap**.*
- diatribe** Thunderous verbal attack.  
*A **diatribe** against consumerism.*

**fustian** Thick, hard-wearing twilled cloth with a short nap, usually dyed in dark colours.  
*A smokescreen of **fustian** and fantasy.*

**harangue** A loud bombastic declamation expressed with strong emotion.  
*They were subjected to a ten minute **harangue** by two border guards.*

**ranting** Pompous or pretentious talk or writing.  
*The reactionary **rantings** of an embittered old man.*

**tirade** A long, angry speech of criticism or accusation.  
*A **tirade** of abuse.*

- *Speak or shout at length in an angry, impassioned way.*
- *Talk in a noisy, excited, or declamatory manner.*



## Synonyms of "Rant" as a verb (15 Words)

<b>bluster</b>	(of a storm, wind, or rain) blow or beat fiercely and noisily. <i>A southeaster <b>blustered</b> onshore.</i>
<b>declaim</b>	Speak against in an impassioned manner. <i>He <b>declaimed</b> against the wasteful ways of modern society.</i>
<b>deliver a tirade</b>	Relinquish possession or control over.
<b>fulminate</b>	Express vehement protest. <i>Thunder <b>fulminated</b> around the house.</i>
<b>go on and on</b>	Move away from a place into another direction.
<b>hold forth</b>	Have rightfully; of rights, titles, and offices.
<b>jabber</b>	Talk in a rapid, excited, and often incomprehensible way. <i>He <b>jabbered</b> on about football.</i>
<b>mouth off</b>	Express in speech.
<b>pontificate</b>	Talk in a dogmatic and pompous manner. <i>The new professor always <b>pontificates</b>.</i>
<b>rabbit on</b>	Hunt rabbits.
<b>rant and rave</b>	Talk in a noisy, excited, or declamatory manner.
<a href="#"><u>rave</u></a>	Attend a rave party. <i>Never mind how he feels Melissa <b>raved</b>.</i>
<b>sound off</b>	Appear in a certain way.
<b>spout</b>	Send out (liquid) forcibly in a stream. <i>Blood was <b>spouting</b> from the cuts on my hand.</i>
<b>trumpet</b>	Play or blow on the trumpet. <i>Elephants are <b>trumpeting</b>.</i>

## Associations of "Rant" (30 Words)

<b>bemoan</b>	Regret strongly. <i>It was no use <b>bemoaning</b> her lot.</i>
<b>bluster</b>	A violent gusty wind. <i>I don't care what he says I <b>blustered</b>.</i>
<b>boast</b>	An act of talking with excessive pride and self-satisfaction. <i>He <b>boasted</b> that he had taken part in the crime.</i>
<b>bombast</b>	High-sounding language with little meaning, used to impress people. <i>The <b>bombast</b> of gung ho militarism.</i>
<b>bombastic</b>	High-sounding but with little meaning; inflated. <i><b>Bombastic</b> music that drowned out what anyone was saying.</i>
<b>bragging</b>	Exhibiting or characterized by excessive pride or boastfulness. <i>A competitive <b>bragging</b> culture.</i>
<b>complain</b>	Express complaints, discontent, displeasure, or unhappiness. <i>Let the warbling flute <b>complain</b>.</i>
<b>deplore</b>	Feel or express strong disapproval of (something). <i>We <b>deplore</b> all violence.</i>



<b>exaggeration</b>	Extravagant exaggeration. <i>The dance involved a deliberate <b>exaggeration</b> of his awkwardness.</i>
<b>fustian</b>	Pompous or pretentious speech or writing. <i>A <b>fustian</b> jacket.</i>
<b>grandiloquent</b>	Pompous or extravagant in language, style, or manner, especially in a way that is intended to impress. <i>A <b>grandiloquent</b> celebration of Spanish glory.</i>
<b>growl</b>	The sound of growling as made by animals. <i>Keep out of this he <b>growled</b>.</i>
<b>harangue</b>	Deliver a harangue to address forcefully. <i>He <b>harangued</b> the public on their ignorance.</i>
<b>howl</b>	Make a howling sound. <i>The wind was <b>howling</b> in the trees.</i>
<b>hyperbole</b>	Exaggerated statements or claims not meant to be taken literally. <i>He vowed revenge with oaths and <b>hyperboles</b>.</i>
<b>impressionism</b>	A style or movement in painting originating in France in the 1860s, characterized by a concern with depicting the visual impression of the moment, especially in terms of the shifting effect of light and colour.
<b>jabber</b>	Talk in a rapid, excited, and often incomprehensible way. <i>He <b>jabbered</b> on about football.</i>
<b>lament</b>	A mournful poem a lament for the dead. <i>He was <b>lamenting</b> the death of his infant daughter.</i>
<b>loud</b>	Used chiefly as a direction or description in music loud with force. <i>His voice is <b>loud</b> and challenging.</i>
<b>magnification</b>	The magnifying power of an instrument. <i>At this <b>magnification</b> the pixels making up the image become visible.</i>
<b>maximum</b>	A maximum permitted custodial sentence for an offence. <i>An offence which carries a <b>maximum</b> of 14 years.</i>
<b>overestimate</b>	Form too high or favourable an estimate of. <i>His influence cannot be <b>overestimated</b>.</i>
<b>overstatement</b>	The action of stating something too strongly; exaggeration. <i>A classic piece of <b>overstatement</b>.</i>
<b>pompous</b>	Affectedly grand, solemn, or self-important. <i>Processions and other <b>pompous</b> shows.</i>
<b>rave</b>	Attend a rave party. <i><b>Raves</b> are very popular in Berlin.</i>

- shout** Prevent someone from speaking or being heard by shouting.  
*I **shouted** out a warning.*
- spout** The plume of water vapour ejected from the blowhole of a whale.  
*The **spout** of an occasional whale.*
- superficial** Hasty and without attention to detail; not thorough.  
*A **superficial** mind.*
- tirade** A speech of violent denunciation.  
*A **tirade** of abuse.*
