- (of an action) characterized by great speed.

express	Not tacit or implied. An express shipment.

<u>fleeting</u>	Lasting for a very short time. For a fleeting moment I saw the face of a boy.
<u>flying</u>	Used in names of animals that can glide by using winglike membranes or other structures e g flying squirrel. <i>Paid a flying visit.</i>
high-speed	Operating at high speed.



<u>lightning</u>	Very quick. A lightning cure for his hangover.
lively	Full of spirit. A lively party.
meteoric	Relating to or denoting water derived from the atmosphere by precipitation or condensation. <i>Meteoric</i> or meteorological phenomena.
overnight	Done happening or for use overnight. Tom became an overnight celebrity.
prompt	(of a person) acting without delay. <i>The train is prompt.</i>
quick	Moving quickly and lightly. Was quick to make friends.
<u>speedy</u>	Characterized by speed; moving with or capable of moving with high speed. A speedy recovery.
<u>swift</u>	Moving very fast. <i>Swift</i> flight of an arrow.

airspeed	The speed of an aircraft relative to the air through which it is moving.
briskness	Liveliness and eagerness.
escalation	An increase in the intensity or seriousness of something; an intensification. <i>Cost</i> escalation s.
<u>expeditiously</u>	With efficiency; in an efficient manner. <i>The directors will move</i> expeditiously to reach a conclusion.
fast	Unwavering in devotion to friend or vow or cause- Campaign song for William Henry Harrison. A fast and powerful car.
fastness	A secure place well protected by natural features. A remote Himalayan mountain fastness .



hastily	With excessive speed or urgency; hurriedly. <i>He hastily</i> changed the subject.
hurried	Moving rapidly or performed quickly or in great haste. A hurried trip to the store.
hurriedly	In a hurried or hasty manner. He hurriedly packed his things and left.
hurry	A condition of urgency making it necessary to hurry. In my hurry to leave I knocked over a pile of books.
instantaneous	Occurring or done instantly. Measurement of the instantaneous velocity.
overhasty	Done with very great haste and without due deliberation- Shakespeare- Arthur Geddes. <i>Hard times are showing up overhasty mergers.</i>
overrun	The movement of a vehicle at a speed greater than is imparted by the engine. The northern frontier was overrun by invaders.
proliferate	Cause to grow or increase rapidly. <i>Cultured cells often proliferate indefinitely.</i>
prompt	The time limit for the payment of an account stated on a prompt note. She prompt ed me to call my relatives.
promptitude	The characteristic of doing things without delay. <i>He arranges everything with extraordinary</i> promptitude <i>and foresight.</i>
<u>promptly</u>	In a punctual manner. <i>I won my appeal but instead of reinstating me they</i> promptly <i>sacked me again.</i>
quick	Moving quickly and lightly. Was quick to respond.
quickly	With little or no delay. We moved quickly to deal with our auditor s questions.
rapidly	Very quickly; at a great rate. <i>The business is expanding rapidly</i> .
rush	Cause to move fast or to rush or race. I rush ed outside and hailed a taxi.
rushed	(of a person) short of time; hurrying. A rushed job.



scramble	Cook (eggs) by beating them with a little liquid and then cooking and stirring them gently. <i>The signal is scrambled into code.</i>
speedily	Quickly or promptly. Your claim will be dealt with as speedily as possible.
<u>speedy</u>	Accomplished rapidly and without delay. He has a right to a speedy trial.
suddenly	Quickly and without warning. He made up his mind suddenly .
<u>swift</u>	Swiftly. The swift est horse in his stable.
<u>swiftly</u>	In a swift manner. They acted swiftly in response to the invasion.
<u>zoom</u>	Cause a lens or camera to zoom in or out. The value of these stocks is zoom ing.
