### **Definitions of "Rattled" as an adjective**

## Synonyms of "Rattled" as an adjective (3 Words)

### **flustered**

Thrown into a state of agitated confusion; ('rattled' is an informal term.  
*I found myself starting to feel hot and **flustered**.*

**hot and bothered** Very good; often used in the negative.

### **perturbed**

Thrown into a state of agitated confusion; ('rattled' is an informal term.  
*She didn't seem **perturbed** about the noises around her.*



## Associations of "Rattled" (30 Words)

### **brassy**

Tastelessly showy or loud in appearance or manner (typically used of a woman).

*Audience members are tapping their feet to the **brassy** music of the band.*

### **chirp**

(of a small bird or an insect) make a short, sharp, high-pitched sound.

*The birds were **chirping** in the bushes.*

<b>clatter</b>	Fall or move with a clatter. <i>She <b>clattered</b> cups and saucers on to a tray.</i>
<b>commotion</b>	A state of confused and noisy disturbance. <i>She was distracted by a <b>commotion</b> across the street.</i>
<b>crackle</b>	Having the surface decorated with a network of fine cracks as in crackleware. <i>The blazing sun <b>crackled</b> the desert sand.</i>
<b>creak</b>	A squeaking sound. <i>The <b>creak</b> of a floorboard broke the silence.</i>
<b>croak</b>	A sound resembling a croak. <i>The frogs settled in the shade <b>croaking</b> happily.</i>
<b>din</b>	A loud harsh or strident noise. <i>He <b>dinned</b> the lessons into his students.</i>
<b>dissonance</b>	A conflict of people's opinions or actions or characters. <i>A session full of jangling <b>dissonances</b>.</i>
<b>groan</b>	Be oppressed by. <i>Marty <b>groaned</b> and pulled the blanket over his head.</i>
<b>hiss</b>	Express disapproval of someone by hissing. <i>The performers could not be heard over the <b>hissing</b> of the audience.</i>
<b>hubbub</b>	A busy, noisy situation. <i>A <b>hubbub</b> of laughter and shouting.</i>
<b>loud</b>	Used chiefly as a direction or description in music loud with force. <i>She spoke <b>loudly</b> and angrily.</i>
<b>noise</b>	Emit a noise. <i>Vibration and <b>noise</b> from traffic.</i>
<b>racket</b>	A snowshoe resembling a racket. <i>A squash <b>racket</b>.</i>
<b>raucous</b>	Disturbing the public peace; loud and rough. <i><b>Raucous</b> youths.</i>
<b>screech</b>	Make a high pitched screeching noise. <i>Mary tried to drown her <b>screeches</b> by shaking her.</i>
<b>shake</b>	Shake or vibrate rapidly and intensively. <i>I couldn't <b>shake</b> the feeling that everyone was laughing at me.</i>
<b>shriek</b>	(of something inanimate) make a high-pitched screeching sound. <i>The patterned carpets <b>shrieked</b> at Blanche from the shabby store.</i>
<b>sibilant</b>	A sibilant speech sound. <i>His <b>sibilant</b> whisper.</i>

<b>snarl</b>	An act or sound of snarling. <i>I used to <b>snarl</b> at anyone I disliked.</i>
<b>sound</b>	Emit or cause to emit sound. <b>Sound</b> <i>the rhymes clearly.</i>
<b>squawk</b>	The noise of squawking. <i>With a startled <b>squawk</b> the rook flew off.</i>
<b>squeak</b>	Make a high-pitched sound or cry. <i>I didn't hear a <b>squeak</b> from him for months.</i>
<b>tumult</b>	A loud, confused noise, especially one caused by a large mass of people. <i>A <b>tumult</b> of shouting and screaming broke out.</i>
<b>twitter</b>	A series of short, high-pitched calls or sounds. <i>The swallows were settling to roost with a good deal of <b>twittering</b>.</i>
<b>uproar</b>	A state of commotion and noise and confusion. <i>It caused an <b>uproar</b> in the press.</i>
<b>warble</b>	A lumpy abscess under the hide of domestic mammals caused by larvae of a botfly or warble fly. <i>He <b>warbled</b> in an implausible soprano.</i>
<b>whine</b>	A feeble or petulant complaint. <i>A constant <b>whine</b> about the quality of public services.</i>
<b>whisper</b>	A soft or confidential tone of voice a whispered word or phrase. <i>The thunder of the surf became a muted <b>whisper</b>.</i>
