social occasion	A party of people assembled to promote sociability and communal activity.
soirée	A party of people assembled in the evening (usually at a private house).
tribute	Payment extorted by gangsters on threat of violence. <i>The video is a tribute to the musicals of the 40s.</i>
warehouse party	A storehouse for goods and merchandise.

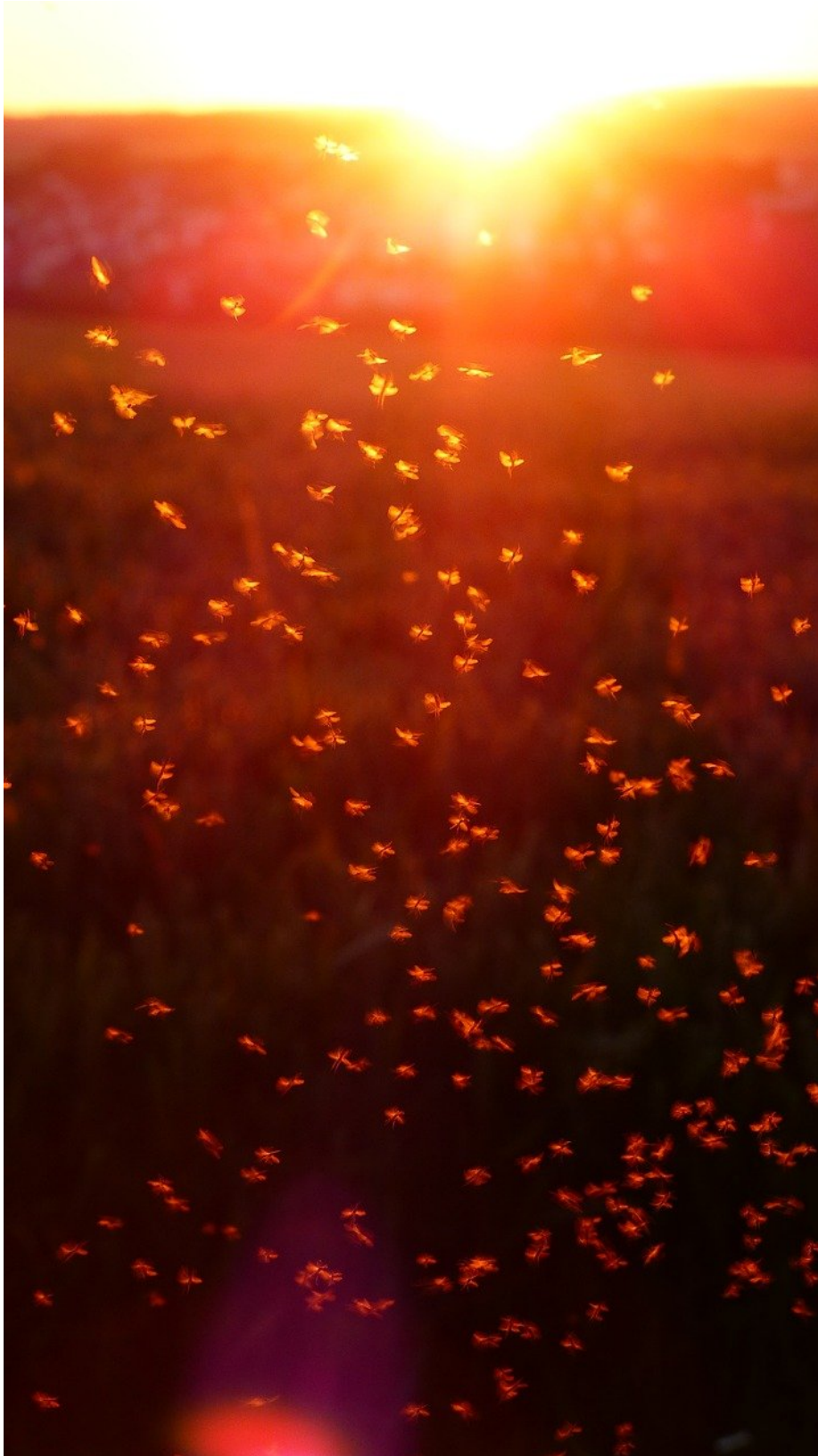


Rave as a Verb

- *Praise enthusiastically.*
- *Speak or write about someone or something with great enthusiasm or admiration.*
- *Address someone in an angry, uncontrolled way.*
- *Talk in a noisy, excited, or declamatory manner.*

Cause to feel enthusiasm.

Perform as expected when applied.

Blend or harmonize.

go into raptures over

Stretch out over a distance, space, time, or scope; run or extend between two points or beyond a certain point.

gush

Gush forth in a sudden stream or jet.

*The tanker began to **gush** oil from its damaged hull.*

gush about

Praise enthusiastically.

gush over

Gush forth in a sudden stream or jet.

heap praise on

Arrange in stacks.

jabber

Talk in a rapid, excited, and often incomprehensible way.

*He **jabbered** on about football.*

lose control

Suffer the loss of a person through death or removal.

lose one's temper

Fail to make money in a business; make a loss or fail to profit.

maunder

Talk in a rambling manner.

*Dennis **maundered** on about the wine.*

mouth off	Touch with the mouth.
praise enthusiastically	Express approval of.
praise to the skies	Express approval of.
rabbit on	Hunt rabbits.
rage	Feel or express violent uncontrollable anger. <i>The great cholera epidemic which raged across Europe in 1831.</i>
ramble	(of a plant) put out long shoots and grow over walls or other plants. <i>Roses climbed rambled hung over walls.</i>
<u>rant</u>	Talk in a noisy, excited, or declamatory manner. <i>She was still ranting on about the unfairness of it all.</i>
rant and rave	Talk in a noisy, excited, or declamatory manner.
rhapsodize over	Recite a rhapsody.
sing the praises of	Produce tones with the voice.
spout	Gush forth in a sudden stream or jet. <i>Volcanoes spouted ash and lava.</i>
<u>storm</u>	Attack by storm attack suddenly. <i>Chester stormed back with two goals in five minutes.</i>
talk wildly	Divulge confidential information or secrets.
throw bouquets at	Convey or communicate; of a smile, a look, a physical gesture.
wax lyrical about	Increase in phase.

acclaim	Enthusiastic approval. <i>The book met with modest acclaim.</i>
acclamation	Loud and enthusiastic approval. <i>The tackle brought the supporters to their feet in acclamation.</i>
admire	Regard with respect or warm approval. <i>I admire your courage.</i>
admonish	Admonish or counsel in terms of someone's behavior. <i>She admonished me for appearing at breakfast unshaven.</i>
bemoan	Regret strongly. <i>It was no use bemoaning her lot.</i>
bombast	Pompous or pretentious talk or writing. <i>The bombast of gung ho militarism.</i>

commend	Present as suitable for approval or acceptance recommend. <i>He was commended by the judge for his courageous actions.</i>
complain	Express complaints discontent displeasure or unhappiness. <i>The plaintiff's lawyer complained that the defendant had physically abused his client.</i>
compliment	Say something to someone that expresses praise. <i>Prince George expected to be complimented with a seat in the royal coach.</i>

exaggeration	Extravagant exaggeration. <i>He was prone to exaggeration.</i>
fury	The hideous snake-haired monsters (usually three in number) who pursued unpunished criminals. <i>She was paddling with a new fury.</i>
fustian	Thick, hard-wearing twilled cloth with a short nap, usually dyed in dark colours. <i>A smokescreen of fustian and fantasy.</i>
harangue	Deliver a harangue to address forcefully. <i>They were subjected to a ten minute harangue by two border guards.</i>
indignation	Anger or annoyance provoked by what is perceived as unfair treatment. <i>The letter filled Lucy with indignation.</i>
jabber	Talk in a noisy, excited, or declamatory manner. <i>He jabbered on about football.</i>
lament	A mournful poem a lament for the dead. <i>He was lamenting the death of his infant daughter.</i>
laud	Praise, glorify, or honor. <i>The obituary lauded him as a great statesman and soldier.</i>
overestimate	An excessively high estimate. <i>His influence cannot be overestimated.</i>
praise	Offering words of homage as an act of worship. <i>They sang a hymn of praise to God.</i>
rancor	A feeling of deep and bitter anger and ill-will.
rancorous	Characterized by bitterness or resentment. <i>Sixteen miserable months of rancorous disputes.</i>
rancour	A feeling of deep and bitter anger and ill-will. <i>He spoke without rancour.</i>

*His **rants** against organized religion.*
- regret** Express with regret.
*She immediately **regretted** her words.*
- resentment** Bitter indignation at having been treated unfairly.
*His **resentment** at being demoted.*
- seethe** Cook (food) by boiling it in a liquid.
*The grey ocean **seethed**.*
- shout** Prevent someone from speaking or being heard by shouting.
*His words were interrupted by warning **shouts**.*
- spout** (of a liquid) flow out forcibly in a stream.
*A teapot with a chipped **spout**.*
- tirade** A long, angry speech of criticism or accusation.
*A **tirade** of abuse.*
