ravening Living by preying on other animals especially by catching living prey.

**Ravening** creditors.



**sharp-set** Extremely hungry.

**starved** Suffering from lack of food.

The family was **starved** and ragged.

**starving** Suffering or dying from hunger. *The world s starving children.* 

very hungry Being the exact same one; not any other.

Wanting or devouring great quantities of food.

**voracious**She s a **voracious** reader.

Resembling or likened to a wolf, especially in being rapacious, voracious, or

wolfish lascivious.

Wolfish rapacity.
