| absolutely | Used to emphasize a strong or exaggerated statement. <i>He absolutely adores that car.</i> |
| approach | A way of dealing with a situation or problem. <i>The train approached the main line.</i> |
| arrival | Accomplishment of an objective. <i>He was dead on arrival at hospital.</i> |
| arrive | Reach a destination arrive by movement or progress. <i>The invitation arrived a few days later.</i> |
| away | An away match or win. <i>You must not allow a stranger into the house when your mother is away.</i> |
| by | So as to go past. <i>He let only a moment go by.</i> |
| coda | The concluding passage of a piece or movement, typically forming an addition to the basic structure. <i>The first movement ends with a fortissimo coda.</i> |
| conclusively | In a way that is achieved easily or by a large margin. <i>Wars are difficult to win conclusively.</i> |
| confront | Come face to face with (someone) with hostile or argumentative intent. <i>The new government was confronted with many profound difficulties.</i> |
| distal | Directed away from the midline or mesial plane of the body. <i>The distal zone is characterized by pyroclastic flow deposits.</i> |
| end | Have an end in a temporal spatial or quantitative sense either spatial or metaphorical. <i>To this end schools were set up for peasant women.</i> |
| eventually | In the end, especially after a long delay, dispute, or series of problems. <i>Eventually after midnight I arrived at the hotel.</i> |

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| exclude | Expel (a pupil) from school. <i>The public were excluded from the board meeting.</i> |
| <u>exhale</u> | Breathe out. <i>The jungle exhaled mists of early morning.</i> |
| extremity | The outermost or farthest region or point. <i>The extremity of the violence concerns us.</i> |
| <u>facade</u> | The face or front of a building. <i>Her flawless public facade masked private despair.</i> |
| <u>facing</u> | A protective covering that protects the outside of a building. <i>Two large front facing windows.</i> |
| <u>far</u> | Remote in time. <i>A far trek.</i> |
| finale | The last part of a piece of music, an entertainment, or a public event, especially when particularly dramatic or exciting. <i>The festival ends with a grand finale.</i> |
| <u>finally</u> | As the end result of a succession or process. <i>A referendum followed by local legislative and finally presidential elections.</i> |
| get | Take vengeance on or get even. <i>Did you get it.</i> |
| <u>gone</u> | Dead. <i>The bad old days are gone.</i> |
| <u>here</u> | In or at this place where the speaker or writer is. <i>I m getting out of here.</i> |
| home | Return home accurately from a long distance. <i>Deliver the package to my home.</i> |
| <u>lastly</u> | In the last place (used to introduce the last of a series of points or actions). <i>Lastly I would like to thank my parents.</i> |
| leave | In snooker croquet and other games the position in which a player leaves the balls for the next player. <i>At what time does your train leave.</i> |
| <u>outside</u> | Leading to or from the outside. <i>The outside lane.</i> |
| respire | (of a plant) carry out respiration, especially at night when photosynthesis has ceased. <i>Lichens respire at lower levels of temperature and moisture.</i> |
