<b>critique</b>	An essay or article that gives a critical evaluation (as of a book or play). <i>A <b>critique</b> of Marxist historicism.</i>
<b>disparagingly</b>	In a disparaging manner. <i>These mythological figures are described <b>disparagingly</b> as belonging only to a story.</i>
<b>interviewer</b>	A person who interviews someone, especially as a job. <i>She took time to answer questions from radio <b>interviewers</b>.</i>
<b>journal</b>	Write in a journal or diary. <i>While abroad he had kept a <b>journal</b>.</i>
<b>journalist</b>	Someone who keeps a diary or journal. <i>Foreign <b>journalists</b> had been expelled from the area.</i>
<b>magazine</b>	A business firm that publishes magazines. <i>It takes several years before a <b>magazine</b> starts to break even or make money.</i>
<b>mail</b>	Send someone email. <i>Your <b>mail</b> is on the table.</i>
<b>newspaper</b>	Cheap paper made from wood pulp and used for printing newspapers. <i>Ms Henry joined the <b>newspaper</b> 10 months ago.</i>
<b>observer</b>	A person posted in an official capacity to an area to monitor political or military events. <i>Elections scrutinized by international <b>observers</b>.</i>
<b>periodical</b>	Occurring or appearing at intervals; occasional. <i>She took <b>periodical</b> gulps of her tea.</i>
<b>publisher</b>	The proprietor of a newspaper. <i>The <b>publishers</b> of Vogue.</i>
<b>readership</b>	The position of Reader at a university. <i>The magazine has a <b>readership</b> of just 65 000.</i>

<b>referee</b>	Act as the referee of. <i>He <b>refereed</b> two of the first round group matches.</i>
<b>reviewer</b>	A person who formally assesses something with a view to changing it if necessary. <i>A film <b>reviewer</b>.</i>
<b><u>subscribe</u></b>	Adopt as a belief. <i>He <b>subscribed</b> 400 to the campaign.</i>
<b>subscriber</b>	Someone who contracts to receive and pay for a service or a certain number of issues of a publication. <i>The company has 2 6 million <b>subscribers</b> to its digital service.</i>
<b>telecast</b>	Broadcast via television. <i>The programme will be <b>telecast</b> simultaneously to nearly 150 cities.</i>
<b>unfavorably</b>	Showing disapproval; in a disparaging way. <i>He reviewed the play <b>unfavorably</b>.</i>
<b><u>writer</u></b>	A person who is able to write and has written something. <i>The <b>writer</b> of the letter.</i>
