- *A public lecturer at certain universities.*

***Subscribers** to the distress fund.*

commentator	A person who commentates on a sports match or other event. <i>The move electrified spectators and commentators alike.</i>
contributor	A causal factor in the existence or occurrence of something. <i>Australia is also a major contributor of development assistance to the region.</i>
critic	Someone who frequently finds fault or makes harsh and unfair judgments. <i>Critics of the new legislation say it is too broad.</i>
critique	An essay or article that gives a critical evaluation (as of a book or play). <i>A critique of Marxist historicism.</i>
disparagingly	In a disparaging manner. <i>These mythological figures are described disparagingly as belonging only to a story.</i>
interviewer	A person who interviews someone, especially as a job. <i>She took time to answer questions from radio interviewers.</i>
journal	Write in a journal or diary. <i>While abroad he had kept a journal.</i>
journalist	Someone who keeps a diary or journal. <i>Foreign journalists had been expelled from the area.</i>
magazine	A business firm that publishes magazines. <i>It takes several years before a magazine starts to break even or make money.</i>
mail	Send someone email. <i>Your mail is on the table.</i>
newspaper	Cheap paper made from wood pulp and used for printing newspapers. <i>Ms Henry joined the newspaper 10 months ago.</i>
observer	A person posted in an official capacity to an area to monitor political or military events. <i>Elections scrutinized by international observers.</i>
periodical	Occurring or appearing at intervals; occasional. <i>She took periodical gulps of her tea.</i>
publisher	The proprietor of a newspaper. <i>The publishers of Vogue.</i>
readership	The position of Reader at a university. <i>The magazine has a readership of just 65 000.</i>

referee	Act as the referee of. <i>He refereed two of the first round group matches.</i>
reviewer	A person who formally assesses something with a view to changing it if necessary. <i>A film reviewer.</i>
<u>subscribe</u>	Adopt as a belief. <i>He subscribed 400 to the campaign.</i>
subscriber	Someone who contracts to receive and pay for a service or a certain number of issues of a publication. <i>The company has 2 6 million subscribers to its digital service.</i>
telecast	Broadcast via television. <i>The programme will be telecast simultaneously to nearly 150 cities.</i>
unfavorably	Showing disapproval; in a disparaging way. <i>He reviewed the play unfavorably.</i>
<u>writer</u>	A person who is able to write and has written something. <i>The writer of the letter.</i>
