### Definitions of "Readily" as an adverb

- *Without delay or difficulty; easily.*
- *Without hesitation or reluctance; willingly.*
- *In a punctual manner.*
- *Without much difficulty.*

### Synonyms of "Readily" as an adverb (12 Words)

<b>cheerfully</b>	In a cheerful way. <i>He <b>cheerfully</b> admits to being the wrong side of fifty.</i>
<b>easily</b>	With ease easy is sometimes used informally for easily. <i>This china breaks very <b>easily</b>.</i>
<b>effortlessly</b>	In a manner requiring no physical or mental exertion. <i><b>Effortlessly</b> cool models.</i>
<b>gladly</b>	With pleasure or gratitude; happily. <i>I would have <b>gladly</b> paid for it.</i>

<b><u>happily</u></b>	In a happy way. <i>They shouted <b>happily</b>.</i>
<b><u>promptly</u></b>	Used to express surprise, and slight disapproval, when someone does something shortly after something else. <i>The rescue squad arrived <b>promptly</b>.</i>
<b>pronto</b>	In a punctual manner. <i>Put it in the refrigerator <b>pronto</b>.</i>
<b>ungrudgingly</b>	In a generous and ungrudging manner.
<b>unhesitatingly</b>	Without hesitation.
<b>voluntarily</b>	Of one's own free will. <i>He <b>voluntarily</b> attended a police station.</i>
<b><u>willingly</u></b>	Readily; of one's own free will. <i>I <b>willingly</b> accept.</i>
<b>with good grace</b>	In a good or proper or satisfactory manner or to a high standard ( `good' is a nonstandard dialectal variant for `well).

## Usage Examples of "Readily" as an adverb

- *Transport is readily available.*
- *He readily admits that the new car surpasses its predecessors.*

## Associations of "Readily" (30 Words)

<b><u>accessible</u></b>	Easy to get along with or talk to; friendly. <i>An <b>accessible</b> account of his theories.</i>
<b><u>alacrity</u></b>	Brisk and cheerful readiness. <i>She accepted the invitation with <b>alacrity</b>.</i>
<b>available</b>	Able to be used or obtained; at someone's disposal. <i>Refreshments will be <b>available</b> all afternoon.</i>
<b>avidity</b>	The overall strength of binding between an antibody and an antigen. <i>He read detective stories with <b>avidity</b>.</i>
<b>conveniently</b>	In a convenient manner. <i>This house is very <b>conveniently</b> located.</i>
<b>eagerness</b>	A positive feeling of wanting to push ahead with something. <i>The player showed <b>eagerness</b> to play.</i>
<b>easily</b>	With ease easy is sometimes used informally for easily. <i>She was <b>easily</b> excited.</i>

<b>easy</b>	With ease easy is sometimes used informally for easily. <i>Her <b>easy</b> and agreeable manner.</i>
<b>eloquent</b>	Fluent or persuasive in speaking or writing. <i>The bus journey alone is <b>eloquent</b> of class inequality.</i>
<b>enthusiasm</b>	Something that arouses enthusiasm. <i>The three <b>enthusiasms</b> of his life were politics religion and books.</i>
<b>facilitation</b>	Phenomenon that occurs when two or more neural impulses that alone are not enough to trigger a response in a neuron combine to trigger an action potential. <i>The response is dependent on the frequency of stimulation and on neuromuscular <b>facilitation</b>.</i>
<b>flowing</b>	(especially of long hair or clothing) hanging or draping loosely and gracefully. <i>The <b>flowing</b> curves of the lawn.</i>
<b>frankly</b>	(used as intensives reflecting the speaker's attitude) it is sincerely the case that. <i>She talks very <b>frankly</b> about herself.</i>
<b>fraternize</b>	Be on friendly terms with someone, as if with a brother, especially with an enemy. <i>She ignored Elisabeth's warning glare against fraternizing with the enemy.</i>
<b>freely</b>	In a free manner. <i>She drank <b>freely</b> to keep up her courage.</i>
<b>handy</b>	Easy to use. <i>A <b>handy</b> desktop encyclopedia.</i>
<b>immediately</b>	Near or close by. <i>She was sitting <b>immediately</b> behind me.</i>
<b>instantly</b>	Without any delay. <i>She fell asleep almost <b>instantly</b>.</i>
<b>just</b>	Of an opinion or appraisal well founded justifiable. <i>Simon really messed things up Didn't he <b>just</b>.</i>
<b>mere</b>	A small pond of standing water. <i>His stomach rebelled at the <b>mere</b> thought of food.</i>
<b>openly</b>	In an open way. <i>A lecturer who had <b>openly</b> criticized the government.</i>
<b>practical</b>	Guided by practical experience and observation rather than theory. <i>The idea had no <b>practical</b> application.</i>
<b>promptly</b>	With little or no delay. <i>He paid the fine <b>promptly</b>.</i>

<b><u>pushover</u></b>	A person who is easy to overcome or influence. <i>Colonel Moore was benevolent but no <b>pushover</b>.</i>
<b>redeemable</b>	Able to be recovered or saved from faults or bad aspects. <i>A <b>redeemable</b> sinner.</i>
<b><u>shortcut</u></b>	An alternative route that is shorter than the one usually taken. <i>They were taking a <b>shortcut</b> to town.</i>
<b>simple</b>	Of leaf shapes; of leaves having no divisions or subdivisions. <i>A <b>simple</b> white blouse.</i>
<b><u>simply</u></b>	Absolutely. <i>They lived very <b>simply</b>.</i>
<b>useful</b>	Having a useful function. <i>Aspirins are <b>useful</b> for headaches.</i>
<b>utilizable</b>	Capable of being put to a profitable or practical use.
