- *State again strongly.*
- *Confirm the validity of (something previously established).*
- *Affirm once again.*

Synonyms of "Reaffirm" as a verb (11 Words)

affirm	To declare or affirm solemnly and formally as true. <i>It is a rich and challenging motion picture that both affirms life and emphasizes its fragility.</i>
assert	Postulate positively and assertively. <i>The letter asserts a free society.</i>
assure someone	Inform positively and with certainty and confidence.
give an assurance	Manifest or show.
guarantee	Provide a guarantee for. <i>Guarantee to free the prisoners.</i>

pledge	Bind or secure by a pledge. <i>The Prime Minister pledged that there would be no increase in VAT.</i>
promise	Make a promise or commitment. <i>I promise you my best effort.</i>
reassert	Strengthen or make more firm. <i>He moved quickly to reassert his control.</i>
repeat	Repeat an earlier theme of a composition. <i>The first team in nineteen years to repeat as NBA champions.</i>
say again	State as one's opinion or judgement; declare.
state again	Express in words.

Usage Examples of "Reaffirm" as a verb

- *He reaffirmed his faith in the church.*
- *The prime minister reaffirmed his commitment to the agreement.*
- *He reaffirmed that it was essential to strengthen the rule of law.*
- *The election reaffirmed his position as leader.*

Associations of "Reaffirm" (30 Words)

admonitory	Giving or conveying a warning or reprimand. <i>The sergeant lifted an admonitory finger.</i>
analyst	A psychoanalyst.
breathalyzer	A device that measures chemicals (especially the alcohol content) in a person's expired breath.
cancel	Subject to political religious or moral censorship. <i>This magazine is censored by the government.</i>
check	A move by which a piece or pawn directly attacks the opponent's king and by which the king may be checkmated. <i>He paid all his bills by check.</i>
commitment	An engagement or obligation that restricts freedom of action. <i>His business commitments took him to London.</i>
confirm	Administer the religious rite of confirmation to. <i>The children were confirmed in their mother's faith.</i>
confirmation	Information that confirms or verifies. <i>Fossils provided further confirmation of the evolutionary theory.</i>

demographic	Relating to the structure of populations. <i>The demographic trend is towards an older population.</i>
encyclical	A letter from the pope sent to all Roman Catholic bishops throughout the world. <i>An encyclical letter.</i>
examination	The action or process of conducting an examination. <i>He scraped through the examinations at the end of his first year.</i>
inquiry	A search for knowledge. <i>All lines of inquiry are open.</i>
inspection	Careful examination or scrutiny. <i>On closer inspection it looked like a fossil.</i>
loyalty	The quality of being loyal. <i>They felt no loyalty to a losing team.</i>
monitor	Display produced by a device that takes signals and displays them on a television screen or a computer monitor. <i>A heart monitor.</i>
poll	Cut off the top of a tree or plant typically to encourage further growth pollard. <i>There were some beautiful willows and now the idiot Parson has polled them into wretched stumps.</i>
polygraph	A lie detector test carried out with a polygraph. <i>If he passed the polygraph of course it would authenticate his story.</i>
probe	Examine physically with or as if with a probe. <i>Hands probed his body from top to bottom.</i>
proctor	An invigilator at a university or college examination. <i>18 of the faculty reported that graduate assistants frequently proctored exams.</i>
prove	Prove formally demonstrate by a mathematical formal proof. <i>She displayed an ingenuousness which sprung from a yearning need to prove herself.</i>
reexamination	(law) questioning of a witness by the party that called the witness after that witness has been subject to cross-examination.
reexamine	Look at again; examine again.
review	Hold a review of troops. <i>The Director General s end of year review.</i>
scrutiny	A prolonged intense look. <i>Every aspect of local government was placed under scrutiny.</i>

statistic	A fact or piece of data obtained from a study of a large quantity of numerical data. <i>He was just another statistic.</i>
<u>substantiate</u>	Represent in bodily form. <i>The painting substantiates the feelings of the artist.</i>
substantiation	Additional proof that something that was believed (some fact or hypothesis or theory) is correct.
<u>survey</u>	A department carrying out the surveying of land. <i>A survey conducted by Gardening Which.</i>
verification	The establishment by empirical means of the validity of a proposition. <i>The verification of official documents.</i>
verify	Confirm the truth of. <i>Please verify that the doors are closed.</i>
