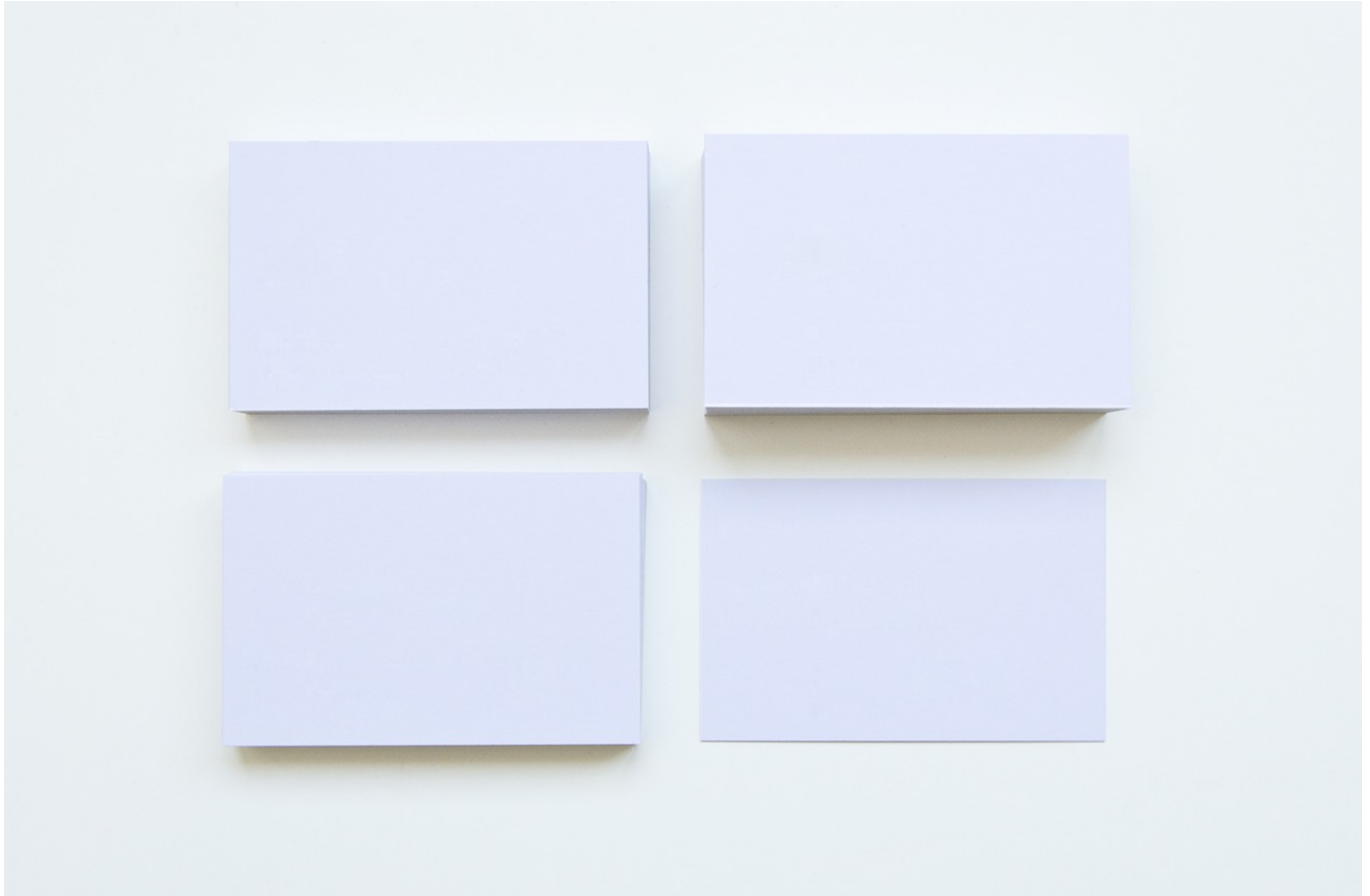

### Definitions of "Realistic" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “realistic” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Representing things in a way that is accurate and true to life.*
- *Having or showing a sensible and practical idea of what can be achieved or expected.*
- *Of or relating to the philosophical doctrine of realism.*
- *Representing what is real; not abstract or ideal.*
- *Aware or expressing awareness of things as they really are.*



## Synonyms of "Realistic" as an adjective (23 Words)

### achievable

Able to be brought about or reached successfully.  
*It was an ambitious goal but it seemed **achievable**.*

### attainable

Able to be attained; achievable.  
*An **attainable** target.*

### authentic

Conforming to fact and therefore worthy of belief.  
*The letter is now accepted as an **authentic** document.*

### **close**

Fitting closely but comfortably.  
*You re very **close** about your work aren t you.*

### **commonsensical**

Exhibiting native good judgment.  
*Unlearned and **commonsensical** countryfolk were capable of solving problems that beset the more sophisticated.*

### convincing

(of a victory or a winner) leaving no margin of doubt; clear.  
*There is no **convincing** evidence that advertising influences total alcohol consumption.*

<b><u>faithful</u></b>	Not having sexual relations with anyone except your husband or wife, or your boyfriend or girlfriend. <i>Her husband was <b>faithful</b> to her.</i>
<b>feasible</b>	Capable of being done with means at hand and circumstances as they are. <i>The most <b>feasible</b> explanation.</i>
<b><u>genuine</u></b>	Being or reflecting the essential or genuine character of something. <i><b>Genuine</b> emotion.</i>
<b><u>graphic</u></b>	Describing nudity or sexual activity in graphic detail. <i>A <b>graphic</b> presentation of the data.</i>
<b>lifelike</b>	Evoking lifelike images within the mind. <i>The artist had etched a <b>lifelike</b> horse.</i>
<b><u>logical</u></b>	Marked by an orderly logical and aesthetically consistent relation of parts. <i>The polar expedition is a <b>logical</b> extension of his Arctic travels.</i>
<b>naturalistic</b>	Representing what is real; not abstract or ideal. <i>A <b>naturalistic</b> rock garden.</i>
<b>practicable</b>	Capable of being done with means at hand and circumstances as they are. <i>The measures will be put into effect as soon as is reasonably <b>practicable</b>.</i>
<b><u>practical</u></b>	Guided by practical experience and observation rather than theory. <i>For all <b>practical</b> purposes she s his girlfriend.</i>
<b><u>pragmatic</u></b>	Relating to pragmatics. <i>A <b>pragmatic</b> approach to politics.</i>
<b>reasonable</b>	As much as is appropriate or fair; moderate. <i>A restaurant serving excellent food at <b>reasonable</b> prices.</i>
<b>representational</b>	Relating to or denoting art which aims to depict the physical appearance of things. <i><b>Representational</b> images.</i>
<b>sensible</b>	Aware intuitively or intellectually of something sensed. <i>I am <b>sensible</b> that the mention of such a circumstance may appear trifling.</i>
<b>true</b>	Of a compass bearing measured relative to true north. <i>It is undesirable to believe a proposition when there is no ground whatever for supposing it <b>true</b>.</i>
<b>truthful</b>	Expressing or given to expressing the truth. <i>Gave <b>truthful</b> testimony.</i>

**viable**

Capable of life or normal growth and development.  
**Viable** seeds.

**workable**

Capable of producing the desired effect or result; practicable; feasible.  
A **workable** peace settlement.

<b>cyberspace</b>	A computer network consisting of a worldwide network of computer networks that use the TCP/IP network protocols to facilitate data transmission and exchange. <i>I stayed in <b>cyberspace</b> for just a few minutes.</i>
<b>down-to-earth</b>	Once thought to be one of four elements composing the universe (Empedocles).
<b>earthy</b>	Conspicuously and tastelessly indecent. <i>Their good natured vulgarity and <b>earthy</b> humour.</i>
<b>harsh</b>	Sharply disagreeable; rigorous. <i>A time of <b>harsh</b> military discipline.</i>
<b>heathen</b>	Relating to heathens. <i>A chance of salvation for the <b>heathen</b>.</i>
<b>indecent</b>	Not conforming with generally accepted standards of behaviour, especially in relation to sexual matters. <i>An earthy but not <b>indecent</b> story.</i>
<b>indecorous</b>	Lacking propriety and good taste in manners and conduct. <i>A pub crawl with sundry <b>indecorous</b> adventures.</i>
<b>irreligious</b>	Hostile or indifferent to religion. <i>An <b>irreligious</b> man.</i>
<b>lifelike</b>	Evoking lifelike images within the mind. <i>A <b>lifelike</b> pose.</i>
<b>now</b>	Without delay or hesitation; with no time intervening. <i>We can hardly send her back <b>now</b> can we.</i>
<b>obscene</b>	Offensive to the mind. <i>The <b>obscene</b> massacre at Wounded Knee.</i>
<b>pagan</b>	Relating to pagans or their beliefs. <i>A <b>pagan</b> god.</i>
<b>pictorial</b>	A newspaper or periodical with pictures as a main feature. <i><b>Pictorial</b> perspective.</i>
<b>practical</b>	Having or put to a practical purpose or use. <i><b>Practical</b> applications of calculus.</i>
<b>pragmatic</b>	Relating to pragmatics. <i>A matter of fact or <b>pragmatic</b> approach to the problem.</i>
<b>pragmatist</b>	A person who takes a practical approach to problems and is concerned primarily with the success or failure of her actions. <i>American <b>pragmatists</b> have influenced a great deal of recent philosophy of many types.</i>

<b>present</b>	Bring forward and present to the mind. <i>The verbs are all in the <b>present</b>.</i>
<b>realism</b>	The doctrine that universals or abstract concepts have an objective or absolute existence The theory that universals have their own reality is sometimes called Platonic realism because it was first outlined by Plato s doctrine of forms or ideas. <i>The summit was marked by a new mood of <b>realism</b>.</i>
<b>reality</b>	Relating to reality TV. <i>Youth when death has no <b>reality</b>.</i>
<b>realized</b>	Successfully completed or brought to an end. <i>The joy of a <b>realized</b> ambition overcame him.</i>
<b>ridiculously</b>	So as to cause surprise or disbelief. <i>It had been <b>ridiculously</b> easy to track him down.</i>
<b>salacious</b>	Characterized by lust. <i><b>Salacious</b> limericks.</i>
<b>unbecoming</b>	(especially of clothing or a colour) not flattering. <i>It was <b>unbecoming</b> for a university to do anything so crass as advertising its wares.</i>
<b>unseemly</b>	Not in keeping with accepted standards of what is right or proper in polite society. <i>An <b>unseemly</b> squabble.</i>
<b>virtual</b>	Existing in essence or effect though not in actual fact. <i>A <b>virtual</b> revolution.</i>
