Definitions of "Reassure" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “reassure” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Cause to feel sure; give reassurance to.*
- *Give or restore confidence in; cause to feel sure or certain.*
- *Say or do something to remove the doubts or fears of (someone).*



Synonyms of "Reassure" as a verb (12 Words)

[assure](#)

Assure somebody of the truth of something with the intention of giving the listener confidence.

*I **assured** him that traveling to Cambodia was safe.*

bolster someone's confidence

Prop up with a pillow or bolster.

buoy up

Float on the surface of water.

cheer up

Give encouragement to.

dispel someone's fears

Force to go away; used both with concrete and metaphoric meanings.

encourage

Stimulate the development of (an activity, state, or belief).

*We were **encouraged** by the success of this venture.*

hearten	Give encouragement to. <i>She was heartened to observe that the effect was faintly comic.</i>
put someone at ease	Attribute or give.
put someone's mind at rest	Cause (someone) to undergo something.
raise someone's spirits	Invigorate or heighten.
restore someone's confidence	Restore by replacing a part or putting together what is torn or broken.
set someone's mind at rest	Fix conclusively or authoritatively.

Usage Examples of "Reassure" as a verb

- *Joachim reassured him that he was needed.*
- *He understood her feelings and tried to reassure her.*
- *The airline tried to reassure the customers that the planes were safe.*
- *I reassured him that we were safe.*

<u>appease</u>	Make peace with. <i>Amendments have been added to appease local pressure groups.</i>
assurance	Insurance, specifically life insurance. <i>He gave an assurance that work would begin on Monday.</i>
<u>assure</u>	Assure somebody of the truth of something with the intention of giving the listener confidence. <i>We guarantee to assure your life.</i>
assured	Characterized by certainty or security. <i>An extremely assured performance.</i>
<u>assuring</u>	Giving confidence.
calm	Cause to be calm or quiet as by administering a sedative to. <i>In the centre of the storm calm prevailed.</i>
<u>clarify</u>	Melt (butter) in order to separate out the water and milk solids. <i>Clarify beer.</i>
<u>coax</u>	Gently and persistently persuade (someone) to do something. <i>Come on now I coaxed.</i>

confidently	In a self-assured way that expresses faith in oneself or one's abilities or qualities. <i>He confidently predicts a change of fortune.</i>
convince	Make (someone) agree, understand, or realize the truth or validity of something. <i>Robert's expression had obviously convinced her of his innocence.</i>
cool	Great coolness and composure under strain. <i>Youngsters are turning to smoking because they think it makes them appear cool.</i>
encourage	Persuade (someone) to do or continue to do something by giving support and advice. <i>His financial success encouraged him to look for a wife.</i>
ensure	Make certain of. <i>Only by researching stocks thoroughly can a client ensure against being misled.</i>
foolproof	Not liable to failure. <i>A foolproof security system.</i>
grandiloquence	High-flown style; excessive use of verbal ornamentation.
guarantee	A thing serving as security for a guarantee. <i>A demand that 100 000 be deposited to guarantee their costs.</i>
holiday	Characteristic of a holiday festive. <i>He is holidaying in Italy.</i>
insure	Be careful or certain to do something; make certain of something. <i>The company had insured itself against a fall of the dollar.</i>
licensee	The holder of a licence, especially to sell alcoholic drinks.
loll	Hang loosely or laxly. <i>The two girls lolled in their chairs.</i>
persuade	Win approval or support for. <i>The cost of the manor's restoration persuaded them to take in guests.</i>
reassurance	The act of reassuring; restoring someone's confidence. <i>We have been given reassurances that the water is safe to drink.</i>
relax	Cause to feel relaxed. <i>Relax the leg by bringing the knee towards the chest.</i>
relaxing	Reducing tension or anxiety. <i>The warm water was very relaxing.</i>
relent	Become less severe or intense. <i>The rain relented.</i>

<u>restful</u>	Having a quiet and soothing quality. <i>The rooms were cool and restful.</i>
<u>secure</u>	Furnish with battens. Secure from harm.
<u>slack</u>	Loosen (something, especially a rope). Slack the rope.
<u>vacation</u>	Spend or take a vacation. <i>We get two weeks of vacation every summer.</i>
<u>vouch</u>	Summon a vouchee into court to warrant or defend a title. <i>The explosive used is of my own formulation and I can vouch for its efficiency.</i>
