## Reassure as a Verb

### Definitions of "Reassure" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “reassure” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Cause to feel sure; give reassurance to.*
- *Give or restore confidence in; cause to feel sure or certain.*
- *Say or do something to remove the doubts or fears of (someone).*



## Synonyms of "Reassure" as a verb (12 Words)

[assure](#)

Assure somebody of the truth of something with the intention of giving the listener confidence.

*I **assured** him that traveling to Cambodia was safe.*

**bolster someone's confidence**

Prop up with a pillow or bolster.

**buoy up**

Float on the surface of water.

**cheer up**

Give encouragement to.

**dispel someone's fears**

Force to go away; used both with concrete and metaphoric meanings.

**encourage**

Stimulate the development of (an activity, state, or belief).

*We were **encouraged** by the success of this venture.*

<b>hearten</b>	Give encouragement to. <i>She was <b>heartened</b> to observe that the effect was faintly comic.</i>
<b>put someone at ease</b>	Attribute or give.
<b>put someone's mind at rest</b>	Cause (someone) to undergo something.
<b>raise someone's spirits</b>	Invigorate or heighten.
<b>restore someone's confidence</b>	Restore by replacing a part or putting together what is torn or broken.
<b>set someone's mind at rest</b>	Fix conclusively or authoritatively.

## Usage Examples of "Reassure" as a verb

- *Joachim reassured him that he was needed.*
- *He understood her feelings and tried to reassure her.*
- *The airline tried to reassure the customers that the planes were safe.*
- *I reassured him that we were safe.*

## Associations of "Reassure" (30 Words)

<b><u>appease</u></b>	Make peace with. <i>Amendments have been added to <b>appease</b> local pressure groups.</i>
<b>assurance</b>	Insurance, specifically life insurance. <i>He gave an <b>assurance</b> that work would begin on Monday.</i>
<b><u>assure</u></b>	Assure somebody of the truth of something with the intention of giving the listener confidence. <i>We guarantee to <b>assure</b> your life.</i>
<b>assured</b>	Characterized by certainty or security. <i>An extremely <b>assured</b> performance.</i>
<b><u>assuring</u></b>	Giving confidence.
<b>calm</b>	Cause to be calm or quiet as by administering a sedative to. <i>In the centre of the storm <b>calm</b> prevailed.</i>
<b><u>clarify</u></b>	Melt (butter) in order to separate out the water and milk solids. <i><b>Clarify</b> beer.</i>
<b><u>coax</u></b>	Gently and persistently persuade (someone) to do something. <i>Come on now I <b>coaxed</b>.</i>

<b>confidently</b>	In a self-assured way that expresses faith in oneself or one's abilities or qualities. <i>He <b>confidently</b> predicts a change of fortune.</i>
<b>convince</b>	Make (someone) agree, understand, or realize the truth or validity of something. <i>Robert's expression had obviously <b>convinced</b> her of his innocence.</i>
<b>cool</b>	Great coolness and composure under strain. <i>Youngsters are turning to smoking because they think it makes them appear <b>cool</b>.</i>
<b>encourage</b>	Persuade (someone) to do or continue to do something by giving support and advice. <i>His financial success <b>encouraged</b> him to look for a wife.</i>
<b>ensure</b>	Make certain of. <i>Only by researching stocks thoroughly can a client <b>ensure</b> against being misled.</i>
<b>foolproof</b>	Not liable to failure. <i>A <b>foolproof</b> security system.</i>
<b>grandiloquence</b>	High-flown style; excessive use of verbal ornamentation.
<b>guarantee</b>	A thing serving as security for a guarantee. <i>A demand that 100 000 be deposited to <b>guarantee</b> their costs.</i>
<b>holiday</b>	Characteristic of a holiday festive. <i>He is <b>holidaying</b> in Italy.</i>
<b>insure</b>	Be careful or certain to do something; make certain of something. <i>The company had <b>insured</b> itself against a fall of the dollar.</i>
<b>licensee</b>	The holder of a licence, especially to sell alcoholic drinks.
<b>loll</b>	Hang loosely or laxly. <i>The two girls <b>loll</b>ed in their chairs.</i>
<b>persuade</b>	Win approval or support for. <i>The cost of the manor's restoration <b>persuaded</b> them to take in guests.</i>
<b>reassurance</b>	The act of reassuring; restoring someone's confidence. <i>We have been given <b>reassurances</b> that the water is safe to drink.</i>
<b>relax</b>	Cause to feel relaxed. <i><b>Relax</b> the leg by bringing the knee towards the chest.</i>
<b>relaxing</b>	Reducing tension or anxiety. <i>The warm water was very <b>relaxing</b>.</i>
<b>relent</b>	Become less severe or intense. <i>The rain <b>relented</b>.</i>

<u>restful</u>	Having a quiet and soothing quality. <i>The rooms were cool and <b>restful</b>.</i>
<u>secure</u>	Furnish with battens. <b>Secure</b> from harm.
<u>slack</u>	Loosen (something, especially a rope). <b>Slack</b> the rope.
<u>vacation</u>	Spend or take a vacation. <i>We get two weeks of <b>vacation</b> every summer.</i>
<u>vouch</u>	Summon a vouchee into court to warrant or defend a title. <i>The explosive used is of my own formulation and I can <b>vouch</b> for its efficiency.</i>
