<b>guerrilla</b>	A member of an irregular armed force that fights a stronger force by sabotage and harassment. <i>This town fell to the <b>guerrillas</b>.</i>
<b>iconoclast</b>	A person who attacks or criticizes cherished beliefs or institutions.
<b>insurgent</b>	A person fighting against a government or invading force; a rebel or revolutionary. <i>An attack by armed <b>insurgents</b>.</i>
<b>insurrectionist</b>	A person who takes part in an armed rebellion against the constituted authority (especially in the hope of improving conditions.
<b>johnny</b>	A condom. <i>The security <b>johnny</b> insists that you sign the visitors book.</i>
<b>johnny reb</b>	`Johnny' was applied as a nickname for Confederate soldiers by the Federal soldiers in the American Civil War; `greyback' derived from their grey Confederate uniforms.
<b>maverick</b>	Someone who exhibits great independence in thought and action. <i>He s the <b>maverick</b> of the senate.</i>
<b>mutineer</b>	A person, especially a soldier or sailor, who rebels or refuses to obey the orders of a person in authority. <i>Those who resisted were denounced as <b>mutineers</b> and treated accordingly.</i>
<b>mutinying</b>	Open rebellion against constituted authority (especially by seamen or soldiers against their officers.
<b>nonconformist</b>	A person who does not conform to prevailing ideas or practices in their behaviour or views. <i>She was a <b>nonconformist</b> an individualist.</i>
<b>reb</b>	`Johnny' was applied as a nickname for Confederate soldiers by the Federal soldiers in the American Civil War; `greyback' derived from their grey Confederate uniforms.
<b><u>revolutionary</u></b>	A person who advocates or engages in political revolution.
<b>revolutionist</b>	A radical supporter of political or social revolution.
<b><u>subversive</u></b>	A subversive person. <i>The government claimed we were <b>subversives</b> or terrorists.</i>

<b>arise</b>	Rise to one's feet. <i>New difficulties had <b>arisen</b>.</i>
<b>be at odds with</b>	Happen, occur, take place.
<b>be insubordinate</b>	Have an existence, be extant.
<b>challenge</b>	Issue a challenge to. <i>I <b>challenge</b> the Minister to deny these accusations.</i>
<b>defy</b>	Openly resist or refuse to obey. <i>Go now <b>defy</b> him to the combat.</i>

<b><u>mutiny</u></b>	Engage in a mutiny against an authority. <i>Thousands of the soldiers <b>mutinied</b> over the non-payment of wages.</i>
<b>oppose</b>	Contrast with equal weight or force. <i>A candidate to <b>oppose</b> the leader in the presidential contest.</i>
<b><u>recoil</u></b>	Spring back, as from a forceful thrust. <i>The rifle <b>recoiled</b>.</i>
<b>refuse to accept the authority of</b>	Refuse to accept.
<b>refuse to obey</b>	Refuse to let have.
<b>refuse to obey orders</b>	Show unwillingness towards.
<b><u>renegade</u></b>	Become a renegade. <i>Johnson had <b>renegaded</b> from the Confederacy.</i>
<b>repudiate</b>	Cast off. <i>The parents <b>repudiated</b> their son.</i>
<b><u>resist</u></b>	Stand up or offer resistance to somebody or something. <i>We will continue to <b>resist</b> changes to the treaty.</i>
<b><u>revolt</u></b>	Take violent action against an established government or ruler; rebel. <i>Tis just the main assumption reason most <b>revolts</b> at.</i>
<b><u>riot</u></b>	Take part in a riot disturb the public peace by engaging in a riot. <i>Another set of emotions <b>rioted</b> through him.</i>
<b>rise</b>	Rise in rank or status. <i>The sun had just <b>risen</b>.</i>
<b>rise up</b>	Rise up.
<b>rise up in arms</b>	Take part in a rebellion; renounce a former allegiance.
<b>show repugnance</b>	Finish third or better in a horse or dog race.
<b>stage a rebellion</b>	Plan, organize, and carry out (an event).
<b>take to the streets</b>	Ascertain or determine by measuring, computing or take a reading from a dial.

<b><u>apostate</u></b>	A disloyal person who betrays or deserts his cause or religion or political party or friend etc. <i>After fifty years as an <b>apostate</b> he returned to the faith.</i>
<b>betray</b>	Give away information about somebody. <i>She drew a deep breath that <b>betrayed</b> her indignation.</i>
<b><u>betrayal</u></b>	An act of deliberate betrayal. <i>These developments represented a <b>betrayal</b> of democracy.</i>
<b>betrayed</b>	A person who says one thing and does another.
<b>cheat</b>	An act of cheating a fraud or deception. <i>She <b>cheats</b> on her husband.</i>
<b>deceive</b>	Fail to admit to oneself that something is true. <i>The insurance company <b>deceived</b> me when they told me they were covering my house.</i>

<b>defector</b>	A person who has abandoned their country or cause in favour of an opposing one. <i>Staff interviewed escapees and <b>defectors</b> to the West.</i>
<b><u>disloyal</u></b>	Deserting your allegiance or duty to leader or cause or principle. <i><b>Disloyal</b> aides revealed his indiscretions to the papers.</i>
<b>faithless</b>	Having the character of, or characteristic of, a traitor. <i>They were ungodly and <b>faithless</b>.</i>
<b>fraud</b>	A person who makes deceitful pretenses. <i>Mediums exposed as tricksters and <b>frauds</b>.</i>
<b>insurgent</b>	Rising in active revolt. <i>An attack by armed <b>insurgents</b>.</i>
<b>mutinous</b>	(of a soldier or sailor) refusing to obey the orders of a person in authority. <i>The men became <b>mutinous</b> and insubordinate.</i>
<b>perfidious</b>	Tending to betray; especially having a treacherous character as attributed to the Carthaginians by the Romans. <i>A <b>perfidious</b> lover.</i>
<b>perfidy</b>	Betrayal of a trust. <i>Hapsburg <b>perfidy</b>.</i>
<b>quisling</b>	Someone who collaborates with an enemy occupying force. <i>He had the <b>Quisling</b> owner of the factory arrested.</i>
<b><u>rebellious</u></b>	Discontented as toward authority. <i>A <b>rebellious</b> crew.</i>
<b><u>renegade</u></b>	Become a renegade. <i><b>Renegade</b> supporters of the usurper.</i>
<b>restive</b>	Impatient especially under restriction or delay. <i>The crowd had been waiting for hours and many were becoming <b>restive</b>.</i>
<b><u>revolt</u></b>	Organized opposition to authority; a conflict in which one faction tries to wrest control from another. <i>A <b>revolt</b> over tax increases.</i>
<b><u>revolutionary</u></b>	Markedly new or introducing radical change. <i>The <b>revolutionary</b> army.</i>
<b>seditious</b>	Inciting or causing people to rebel against the authority of a state or monarch. <i>The letter was declared <b>seditious</b>.</i>
<b><u>subversive</u></b>	A subversive person. <i>The government claimed we were <b>subversives</b> or terrorists.</i>

<b><u>traitor</u></b>	A person who betrays someone or something, such as a friend, cause, or principle. <i>He was a <b>traitor</b> to his own class.</i>
<b><u>traitorous</u></b>	Having the character of, or characteristic of, a traitor. <i>A lying <b>traitorous</b> insurrectionist.</i>
<b><u>treacherous</u></b>	Tending to betray especially having a treacherous character as attributed to the Carthaginians by the Romans. <i><b>Treacherous</b> winding roads.</i>
<b><u>treachery</u></b>	The quality of being deceptive. <i>The <b>treachery</b> of language.</i>
<b><u>treason</u></b>	Disloyalty by virtue of subversive behavior. <i>They were convicted of <b>treason</b>.</i>
<b><u>treasonable</u></b>	Having the character of, or characteristic of, a traitor. <i>There was no evidence of <b>treasonable</b> activity.</i>
<b><u>turncoat</u></b>	A person who deserts one party or cause in order to join an opposing one. <i>They denounced him as a <b>turncoat</b>.</i>
<b><u>unfaithful</u></b>	Not trustworthy. <i>An <b>unfaithful</b> reproduction.</i>
