nonconformist	A person who does not conform to prevailing ideas or practices in their behaviour or views. <i>She was a nonconformist an individualist.</i>

insurgent	Rising in active revolt. <i>An attack by armed insurgents.</i>
mutinous	(of a soldier or sailor) refusing to obey the orders of a person in authority. <i>The men became mutinous and insubordinate.</i>
perfidious	Tending to betray; especially having a treacherous character as attributed to the Carthaginians by the Romans. <i>A perfidious lover.</i>
perfidy	Betrayal of a trust. <i>Hapsburg perfidy.</i>
quisling	Someone who collaborates with an enemy occupying force. <i>He had the Quisling owner of the factory arrested.</i>
<u>rebellious</u>	Discontented as toward authority. <i>A rebellious crew.</i>
<u>renegade</u>	Become a renegade. <i>Renegade supporters of the usurper.</i>
restive	Impatient especially under restriction or delay. <i>The crowd had been waiting for hours and many were becoming restive.</i>
<u>revolt</u>	Organized opposition to authority; a conflict in which one faction tries to wrest control from another. <i>A revolt over tax increases.</i>
<u>revolutionary</u>	Markedly new or introducing radical change. <i>The revolutionary army.</i>
seditious	Inciting or causing people to rebel against the authority of a state or monarch. <i>The letter was declared seditious.</i>
<u>subversive</u>	A subversive person. <i>The government claimed we were subversives or terrorists.</i>

<u>traitor</u>	A person who betrays someone or something, such as a friend, cause, or principle. <i>He was a traitor to his own class.</i>
<u>traitorous</u>	Having the character of, or characteristic of, a traitor. <i>A lying traitorous insurrectionist.</i>
<u>treacherous</u>	Tending to betray especially having a treacherous character as attributed to the Carthaginians by the Romans. <i>Treacherous winding roads.</i>
<u>treachery</u>	The quality of being deceptive. <i>The treachery of language.</i>
<u>treason</u>	Disloyalty by virtue of subversive behavior. <i>They were convicted of treason.</i>
<u>treasonable</u>	Having the character of, or characteristic of, a traitor. <i>There was no evidence of treasonable activity.</i>
<u>turncoat</u>	A person who deserts one party or cause in order to join an opposing one. <i>They denounced him as a turncoat.</i>
<u>unfaithful</u>	Not trustworthy. <i>An unfaithful reproduction.</i>
