- conversion** A change of religion.  
*He was found guilty of the fraudulent **conversion** of clients monies.*
- metempsychosis** The supposed transmigration at death of the soul of a human being or animal into a new body of the same or a different species.

- regeneration** Positive feedback.  
*The **regeneration** of inner cities.*
- reincarnation** A new version of something from the past.  
*The latest **reincarnation** of the hippie look.*
- renaissance** The period of European history at the close of the Middle Ages and the rise of the modern world; a cultural rebirth from the 14th through the middle of the 17th centuries.
- renascence** The revival of learning and culture.  
*The **renascence** of poetry as an oral art.*

<b>renewal</b>	The replacement or repair of something. <i>A <b>renewal</b> of hostilities.</i>
<b>restoration</b>	The restoration of the Bourbon monarchy in France in 1814 following the fall of Napoleon Louis XVIII was recalled from exile by Talleyrand. <i>The <b>restoration</b> looked exactly like the original.</i>
<u>resurgence</u>	Bringing again into activity and prominence. <i>A <b>resurgence</b> of interest in religion.</i>
<u>resurrection</u>	A revival from inactivity and disuse. <i>The story of the <b>resurrection</b> of Osiris.</i>
<u>revival</u>	A reawakening of religious fervour, especially by means of evangelistic meetings. <i>The Gothic <b>revival</b> in architecture.</i>
<b>spiritual rebirth</b>	A kind of religious song originated by Blacks in the southern United States.

<b>again</b>	Used to introduce a further point for consideration, supporting or contrasting with what has just been said. <i>I never saw any signs but then <b>again</b> maybe I wasn't looking.</i>
<b>conservation</b>	(physics) the maintenance of a certain quantities unchanged during chemical reactions or physical transformations. <i>The artworks in the collection need indexing and <b>conservation</b>.</i>
<b>cure</b>	A substance or treatment that cures a disease or condition. <i><b>Cure</b> hay.</i>
<b>karma</b>	Good or bad luck, viewed as resulting from one's actions.
<b>metempsychosis</b>	After death the soul begins a new cycle of existence in another human body. <i>The speaker perceives himself as an avatar in a sustained <b>metempsychosis</b>.</i>
<b>nirvana</b>	Any place of complete bliss and delight and peace. <i>The days of socialist <b>nirvana</b> in Europe are over.</i>
<b>phoenix</b>	A legendary Arabian bird said to periodically burn itself to death and emerge from the ashes as a new phoenix according to most versions only one phoenix lived at a time and it renewed itself every 500 years. <i>I'm that <b>phoenix</b> the old fashioned family doctor.</i>
<b>recover</b>	Get or find back recover the use of. <i>Only 13 per cent of CFC refrigerant was being <b>recovered</b> from domestic fridges.</i>
<b>recovery</b>	An object or amount of money recovered. <i>It is hoped that Lawrence can make a full <b>recovery</b>.</i>
<b>regenerate</b>	Amplify (an electron current) by causing part of the power in the output circuit to act upon the input circuit. <i>Methods were developed to <b>regenerate</b> the cellulose for use as fibres.</i>
<b>reincarnation</b>	Embodiment in a new form (especially the reappearance or a person in another form). <i>His <b>reincarnation</b> as a lion.</i>
<b>rejuvenate</b>	Develop youthful topographical features. <i>The exercise and fresh air <b>rejuvenated</b> me.</i>
<b>renaissance</b>	The revival of learning and culture.
<b>renew</b>	Resume (an activity) after an interruption. <i>My stay at the retreat has <b>renewed</b> me.</i>

<b>renewal</b>	An instance of resuming something after an interruption. <i>The call to continual spiritual <b>renewal</b>.</i>
<b>renovation</b>	The act of improving by renewing and restoring. <i>Older churches underwent major <b>renovations</b>.</i>
<b>resilience</b>	An occurrence of rebounding or springing back. <i>The often remarkable <b>resilience</b> of so many British institutions.</i>
<b><u>restitution</u></b>	The restoration of something to its original state. <i><b>Restitution</b> of the damaged mucosa.</i>
<b>restoration</b>	The restoration of the Bourbon monarchy in France in 1814 following the fall of Napoleon Louis XVIII was recalled from exile by Talleyrand. <i>The <b>restoration</b> of a democratic government.</i>
<b>resurge</b>	A further or fresh surge; a surge back or backwards. <i>His need for a meal <b>resurged</b>.</i>
<b><u>resurgence</u></b>	Bringing again into activity and prominence. <i>A <b>resurgence</b> of interest in religion.</i>
<b><u>resurrect</u></b>	Restore (a dead person) to life. <i>He queried whether Jesus was indeed <b>resurrected</b>.</i>
<b>resuscitate</b>	Return to consciousness. <i>Measures to <b>resuscitate</b> the ailing economy.</i>
<b>resuscitated</b>	Restored to life or consciousness.
<b>resuscitation</b>	The action of making something active or vigorous again. <i>Mouth to mouth <b>resuscitation</b>.</i>
<b><u>revert</u></b>	Convert to (the Islamic faith). <i>In the event of the building ceasing to become a school ownership would <b>revert</b> to the Church.</i>
<b><u>revitalize</u></b>	Imbue (something) with new life and vitality. <i>This food <b>revitalized</b> the patient.</i>
<b><u>revival</u></b>	A restoration to life or consciousness. <i>An economic <b>revival</b>.</i>
<b>revive</b>	Restore to life or consciousness. <i>Interest in ESP <b>revived</b>.</i>
<b>soul</b>	A person regarded with affection or pity. <i>She s a nice old <b>soul</b>.</i>
