- metempsychosis** The supposed transmigration at death of the soul of a human being or animal into a new body of the same or a different species.

- regeneration** Positive feedback.
*The **regeneration** of inner cities.*
- reincarnation** A new version of something from the past.
*The latest **reincarnation** of the hippie look.*
- renaissance** The period of European history at the close of the Middle Ages and the rise of the modern world; a cultural rebirth from the 14th through the middle of the 17th centuries.
- renascence** The revival of learning and culture.
*The **renascence** of poetry as an oral art.*

renewal	The replacement or repair of something. <i>A renewal of hostilities.</i>
restoration	The restoration of the Bourbon monarchy in France in 1814 following the fall of Napoleon Louis XVIII was recalled from exile by Talleyrand. <i>The restoration looked exactly like the original.</i>
<u>resurgence</u>	Bringing again into activity and prominence. <i>A resurgence of interest in religion.</i>
<u>resurrection</u>	A revival from inactivity and disuse. <i>The story of the resurrection of Osiris.</i>
<u>revival</u>	A reawakening of religious fervour, especially by means of evangelistic meetings. <i>The Gothic revival in architecture.</i>
spiritual rebirth	A kind of religious song originated by Blacks in the southern United States.

conservation	(physics) the maintenance of a certain quantities unchanged during chemical reactions or physical transformations. <i>The artworks in the collection need indexing and conservation.</i>
cure	A substance or treatment that cures a disease or condition. <i>Cure hay.</i>
karma	Good or bad luck, viewed as resulting from one's actions.
metempsychosis	After death the soul begins a new cycle of existence in another human body. <i>The speaker perceives himself as an avatar in a sustained metempsychosis.</i>

recover	Get or find back recover the use of. <i>Only 13 per cent of CFC refrigerant was being recovered from domestic fridges.</i>
recovery	An object or amount of money recovered. <i>It is hoped that Lawrence can make a full recovery.</i>
regenerate	Amplify (an electron current) by causing part of the power in the output circuit to act upon the input circuit. <i>Methods were developed to regenerate the cellulose for use as fibres.</i>
reincarnation	Embodiment in a new form (especially the reappearance or a person in another form). <i>His reincarnation as a lion.</i>
rejuvenate	Develop youthful topographical features. <i>The exercise and fresh air rejuvenated me.</i>
renaissance	The revival of learning and culture.
renew	Resume (an activity) after an interruption. <i>My stay at the retreat has renewed me.</i>

renewal	An instance of resuming something after an interruption. <i>The call to continual spiritual renewal.</i>
renovation	The act of improving by renewing and restoring. <i>Older churches underwent major renovations.</i>
resilience	An occurrence of rebounding or springing back. <i>The often remarkable resilience of so many British institutions.</i>
<u>restitution</u>	The restoration of something to its original state. <i>Restitution of the damaged mucosa.</i>
restoration	The restoration of the Bourbon monarchy in France in 1814 following the fall of Napoleon Louis XVIII was recalled from exile by Talleyrand. <i>The restoration of a democratic government.</i>
resurge	A further or fresh surge; a surge back or backwards. <i>His need for a meal resurged.</i>
<u>resurgence</u>	Bringing again into activity and prominence. <i>A resurgence of interest in religion.</i>
<u>resurrect</u>	Restore (a dead person) to life. <i>He queried whether Jesus was indeed resurrected.</i>
resuscitate	Return to consciousness. <i>Measures to resuscitate the ailing economy.</i>
resuscitated	Restored to life or consciousness.
resuscitation	The action of making something active or vigorous again. <i>Mouth to mouth resuscitation.</i>
<u>revert</u>	Convert to (the Islamic faith). <i>In the event of the building ceasing to become a school ownership would revert to the Church.</i>
<u>revitalize</u>	Imbue (something) with new life and vitality. <i>This food revitalized the patient.</i>
<u>revival</u>	A restoration to life or consciousness. <i>An economic revival.</i>
revive	Restore to life or consciousness. <i>Interest in ESP revived.</i>
soul	A person regarded with affection or pity. <i>She s a nice old soul.</i>
