- *The act of securing possession of the rebounding basketball after a missed shot.*
- *A recovery of possession of a missed shot.*
- *(in sporting contexts) a ball or shot that bounces back after striking a hard surface.*

### **recoil**

The action of recoiling.  
*His body jerked with the **recoil** of the rifle.*

### **repercussion**

- *Bounce back through the air after hitting something hard.*
- *Recover in value, amount, or strength after a decrease or decline.*
- *Gain possession of a missed shot after it bounces off the backboard or basket rim.*
- *(of an event or action) have an unexpected adverse consequence for (someone, especially the person responsible for it).*
- *Spring back; spring away from an impact.*

## Synonyms of "Rebound" as a verb (23 Words)

<b>be self-defeating for</b>	To remain unmolested, undisturbed, or uninterrupted — used only in infinitive form.
<b>boomerang</b>	Return to the initial position from where it came like a boomerang. <i>Misleading consumers about quality will eventually <b>boomerang</b> on a car maker.</i>
<b>bounce</b>	Hit something so that it bounces. <i>The ball <b>bounced</b> away and he chased it.</i>
<b>bounce back</b>	Eject from the premises.
<b><a href="#">bound</a></b>	Move forward by leaps and bounds. <i>Shares <b>bounded</b> ahead in early dealing.</i>
<b>cause one to be hoist with one's own petard</b>	Give rise to; cause to happen or occur, not always intentionally.

<b>glance</b>	Throw a glance at take a brief look at. <i>She only <b>glanced</b> at the paper.</i>
<b>have an adverse effect on</b>	Serve oneself to, or consume regularly.
<b>have unwelcome repercussions for</b>	Receive willingly something given or offered.

<b>make a comeback</b>	Earn on some commercial or business transaction; earn as salary or wages.
<b>make a recovery</b>	Form by assembling individuals or constituents.
<b>misfire on</b>	Fail to fire or detonate.
<b>pick up</b>	Look for and gather.
<b>rally</b>	Drive in a rally. <i>We re driving off to Spain to <b>rally</b>.</i>
<b>recoil</b>	Spring back; spring away from an impact. <i>He <b>recoiled</b> in horror.</i>
<b>recover</b>	Get or find back recover the use of. <b>Recover</b> a chair.
<b>resile</b>	Return to the original position or state after being stretched or compressed. <i>The rubber tubes <b>resile</b>.</i>
<b>reverberate</b>	Treat, process, heat, melt, or refine in a reverberatory furnace. <i>The hall <b>reverberated</b> with laughter.</i>
<b>ricochet</b>	Appear to move with a series of ricochets. <i>They fired off a couple of rounds <b>ricocheting</b> the bullets against a wall.</i>
<b>spring</b>	Move rapidly or suddenly from a constrained position by or as if by the action of a spring. <i>Madness and creativity could <b>spring</b> from the same source.</i>
<b>spring back</b>	Spring back spring away from an impact.
<b>take a hop</b>	Receive willingly something given or offered.

- *The Share Index rebounded to show a twenty-point gain.*

<b>ball</b>	Form into a ball by winding or rolling. <i>Play <b>ball</b>.</i>
<b>bounce</b>	Hit something so that it bounces. <i>The government should beware being <b>bounced</b> into any ill considered foreign gamble.</i>
<b>bumpy</b>	Causing or characterized by jolts and irregular movements. <i>The car jolted on the <b>bumpy</b> road.</i>
<b>cower</b>	Crouch down in fear. <i>Children <b>cowered</b> in terror as the shoot out erupted.</i>
<b>creep</b>	(of a plastic solid) undergo gradual deformation under stress. <i>The mines were unworkable because of <b>creep</b>.</i>
<b>cringe</b>	Show submission or fear. <i>I <b>cringed</b> at the fellow s stupidity.</i>
<b>duck</b>	A female duck. <i>Before he could <b>duck</b> another stone struck him.</i>
<b>far</b>	At or to or from a great distance in space. <i>The <b>far</b> reaches of the universe.</i>
<b>flinch</b>	An act of flinching. <i>Don t call me that he said with a <b>flinch</b>.</i>
<b>forth</b>	From a particular thing or place or position forth is obsolete. <i>From that time <b>forth</b>.</i>
<b>further</b>	To or at a greater distance in time or space farther is used more frequently than further in this physical sense. <i>They are <b>further</b> along in their research than we expected.</i>
<b>hop</b>	The act of hopping jumping upward or forward especially on one foot. <i>The society s regular fortnightly <b>hop</b>.</i>
<b>huddle</b>	Crowd or draw together. <i>He controls the <b>huddle</b> and the team better than anybody else.</i>
<b>jump</b>	Jump down from an elevated point. <i>She will make a sponsored <b>jump</b> at Thruxton Airfield.</i>
<b>leap</b>	The distance leaped or to be leaped. <i>Amid the notes a couple of items <b>leap</b> out.</i>

*The paper **pounced** on her admission that she is still a member of CND.*
- provoke** Evoke or provoke to appear or occur.  
*A teacher can **provoke** you into working harder.*
- recoil** The action of recoiling.  
*If man upsets his planetary ecosystem it will automatically **recoil** upon him.*
- resurface** Put a new coating on or re-form (a surface, especially a road).  
*I helped my mother to **resurface** the kitchen floor.*
- shrink** A psychiatrist.  
*The metal is unsuitable for **shrinking** on to wooden staves.*
- skip** Cause to skip over a surface.  
*Marian **skipped** half heartedly through the book.*
- skulk** Move stealthily.  
*The **skulk** howls away into the night.*
- slide** Slide guitar.  
*Use an ice axe to halt a **slide** on ice and snow.*
- spring** Spring back spring away from an impact.  
*We decided to **spring** a surprise on them.*
- swoop** Seize or catch with a swooping motion.  
*She **swooped** up the hen in her arms.*
- waylay** Stop or interrupt (someone) and detain them in conversation or trouble them in some other way.  
*He waylaid me on the stairs.*
- wince** Draw back, as with fear or pain.  
*She **winc**ed when she heard his pompous speech.*
